FUTURE OF DAWSON CITY

Gold Output Falling Off and Hope of Town Lies in Possible Quartz Finds.

THE CITY IS CROWDED WITH IDLERS

Cost of Living High—Mr. George H. Hees Gives Some Interesting Information.

"A manufacturer's impressions of Dawson City" is the title of a paper contributed by Mr. George H. Hees of this city.

Mr. Hees, who is one of Toronto's leading manufacturers, is chairman of the Commercial Intelligence Committee of the Canadian Manufacturers' Association, and the information he has set down will prove interesting and valuable to many readers.

Following are extracts from Mr. Hees' paper: I quoted to Governor Ross the remarks recently made in Toronto by Mr. Wade in lecture before the Canadian Club, which was afterwards published in pamphlet form and scattered broadcast through Canada.
