BLOW TO THE ROSS GOVERNMENT.

The the strength of the parties in the Ontario legislature is not affected by the result of the by-elections in Muskoka and Sault Ste. Marie, the

verdict of the electors deals a hard blow to the government. Pathetic appeals were made to the two constituencies to strengthen the Ross government. The Ross government has not been strengthened. By means of methods which for boldness are almost unexampled in the history of this province, Sault Ste. Marle was won by the government. Muskoka, on the other hand, which did not offer the same field for such tactics, converted a Liberal majority of 86 into a Conservative majority ranging between 150 and 200.

The result in Muskoka stands out clearly as the feature of the byelections. It cannot be denied that R. R. Gamey was a factor and an important factor in this fight. The government, buoyed up with the report of the Royal Commission, endeavored to place Hon. J. R. Stratton before the Muskoka electors as a victim of gross slander. Mr. Gamey accepted the issue, and the outcome is fatal to the theory that Ontario is estimat-

ing the Provincial Secretary in the light of the Royal Commission's report. Mr. Ross and his colleagues, aided by The Globe, insisted upon make ing Mr. Gamey an issue in the Muskoka fight. Their forces have been completely routed. While the majority pulled for Mr. Mahaffy, does not necessarily mean that Muskoka regards R R. Gamey as a spotless character, it does mean that Muskoka believes the charges made against the Provincial Secretary, Sir John Boyd and Chief Justice Falconbridge to the contrary notwithstanding. The government made it evident that it feared Gamey as a political force in the Muskoka by-election. The result shows that the fear was based on substantial grounds.

R. R. Gamey is to-day a force in Ontario politics that must be reck. oned with. It may not be desirable that real party issues should be obscured by a trial of strength between those who believe in R. R. Gamey and those who believe in J. R. Stratton. The fact remains, however, that the Gamey charges were a factor in the Muskoka by-elections. They will be a factor in future contests. It is obvious that the report of the Royal Commission far from being a finality, respected by the people of Ontario, has no weight whatever as a judicial deliverance. If, as 'The Globe says, Muskoka was pronouncing on the relative merits of R. R. Gamey and the Royal Commission, it must be admitted the latter can absorb scant comfort from the verdict.

The contest in Sault Ste. Marie resulted in the return of the Liberal candidate by a good majority. Bare-faced appeals were made to the electors of the Soo to support the government in consideration of time cheques guaranteed, practical favors and tempting promises. Even the ministers who took part in the campaign did not rise above these appeals, and if the election of Mr. C. A. Smith cannot be voided on the remarkable speech delivered by James Conmee, M.L.A., the Ontario Elec-

The result in Sault Ste. Marie is not to the discredit of Mr. Miscampbell, and it certainly does no credit to the Ross government. Taking advantage of the embarrassment of an army of employes, the government followed up a simple act of duty with the writs for a by-election, thus connecting the two with a shameless disregard of its own dignity and the independence of the men it aided. APPEALS TO THE WORKERS WITH CHEAPER FOOD CRY

Chamberlain Addresses Monster Meet ing of Workingmen's Conservative Association.

Liverpool, Oct. 27.-Joseph Chamberain, addressed another monster meeting in the Hippodrome here to-night, under the auspices of the Workingmen's Conervative Association. Mr. Chamberlain was given a tremendous reception. The eeting was organized as an offset to the recent action of representatives of bor unions in denouncing Mr. Cham-

berlain's proposals.

Dumphobia Ideas

Mr. Chamberlain devoted the first portion of his speech to the "dumpins" of the manufactures of the United States and Germany in this country, which, he said, must result in depression. With regard to the cry of "dearer food," he pledged himself that his

er food," he pledged himself that his proposals would not add anything to the cost of living; on the contrary, they would decrease the cost of living to the porest families in the country.

The speaker devoted the greater part of his speech, which lasted an hour and a half, to a powerful argument addressed to the working classes of the United Kingdom. He pointed out that when the movement for free trade was carried, the working classes were neither represented nor consulted, but it was a movement of the manufacturers and the middle class. Now that the working classes were represented in parliament their support was absolutely essential to the carrying out of his proposals which, he said, meant more employment.

Can't Be Reconciled.

Can't Be Reconciled.

Emphasizing the statement that it was impossible to reconcile free trade with trade unionism, Mr. Chamberlain pointed out the inconsistency of supporting a policy which admitted the product of the cheapest kind of labor without taxation. He said he believed the working classes of the United Kingdom were more advanced than many of their leaders, and said if this were true, he was confident his proposals would win.

Mr. Chamberlain dwelt especially upon the shipping industry. He pointed out the greater growth of foreign shipbuilding as compared with that of Great Britain. He referred pointedly to Great Britain's loss of trade with Cuba, where, he said, British conditions of trade had not been respected. Can't Be Reconciled.

"All our representations have been ruitless, and America proposes preferential arrangements, treating Cuba exactly as I want you to freat Canada," In conclusion, Mr. Chamberlain design of the design of the said the said the adoption of his policy would encourage and stimulate the colonial shipping trade, and would not prevent the development of foreign trade. May Have Gone Somewhere to Begin Life Anew, Instead of Committing Suicide-

Oakville, Oct. 27 .- (From Our Man the Spot.)-A collection of the strangest and most mysterious circumstances shrouds the disappearance of D. McGregor, the former manager of the Bank of Commerce of Galt, who four weeks ago came to this place to live. The finding of the missing man's coat on the lake shore just south of the house where he boarded, a mile and a half out of Oakville, points strongly to suicide, but other facts unearthed to-night tend to discredit this theory. It was stated to night to The World man that he had been seen on Monday, Oct. 19, the morning after he left his boarding house without re-

Geo. Hillmer, a 'bus driver, stated that on the morning in question he saw Mr. McGregor at the station with his joat on a few minutes before the arrivals of the eastern and western trains. As this would be about 7.39, this is possible, as he left the home of Mr. Walsh, where he boarded, a few, minutes before 6 am. Hillmer states that he noticed Mr. McGregor granding on the western end of the platform, and wondered af the time that he had not taken the bus, as had been has habit. This fact explodes the theory that went straight from the western the bus, as had been has habit. This fact explodes the theory that he went straight from the house to the lake shore, took on his coat and threw himself into the water.

Motive for Suicide.

That there was a motive for his loing away with himself, however, has been established. The week previous to this fateful Monday morning Mr. McGregor received a demand to meet obligations for several thousand dollars more than he was able to meet. It is stated this demand came from the Ontario and Saskatchewan Land Corporation, of which he was a stoskholder and secretary. It was to raise this money that he intended leaving for Galt and London, where his business friends resided. That financial trouble was bettering him for some time past, is shown by the fact that he had put all his money in his wife's name a short time ago.

Mrs. McGregor is prostrated with the shock, the result of the finding of the coat, and the fact that she has not yet heard anything definite from her husband. She is of the belief that he must have done away with himself, in support of which theory she asserts that never during their married life had he gone away without writing her daily.



BARN LANTERN EXPLODED

Aunt of J. N. Murray, Near Hagersville, Perishes When Building Burns Down.

Hagersville, Oct. 27.—The large barns of J. U. Murray, who lives on the hill at the west end of Grand River bridge, about ten miles east of Hagersville, were destroyed by fire last night, and Miss Maggie Short, Mr. Murray's aunt, was burned in the building. It is presumed that in her first enorts to extinguish the blaze her ciothing caught on fire, and before she could find her way out she was overcome by the smoke and flames. The barn was filled with straw, grain and implements, and no one could get inside to rescue the unfortunate woman. Nothing but a few bones was found when the search was made for her remains this morning. She was between 35 and 40 years of age.
