There will this year be two Eclipses of the Sun aud two of the Moon.

March 25-There will be a total Eelipse of the Sun, invisible in the Canadas and the United States.

April 9th-A partial Eclipse of the Moon will take place,

This will be the greatest Solar Eclipse that has taken place since the total Eclipse of 1806. It will be anular over the western part of Upper Canada, nearly the whole of Michigan, a great part of Ohio, the southwestern part of Pennsylvania, the District of Columbia, and in several of the Atlantic States.

Latitude of Herschel about 46 minutes south this year. This being the maximum of Herschel's latitude, it will continue about the same minute until 1842, when it will begin to diminish perceptibly.
