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## BOARD OF DIRECTORS OF THE GRAND RIVER NAVIGATION COMPANY,

FOR THE YEAR ENDING THE FOURTH DAY OF MAY, 1849.

THE Board of Directors of the Grand River Navigation Company, in making their Annual Report, have great pleasure in being able to state for the benefit of the Stockholders (especially those living at a distance), that during the past year, they were enabled to fulfil the promise of the former Board of opening the Brantford Cut, and thus, for all practical purposes, completing the whole Line as originally contemplated.

It will be seen by the Engineer's Report on the present state of the Works-hereto appended, that there is still a little work to be done before the Canal will be fully completed: but this is of so trifling a nature as scarcely to be worth mentioning.

The former Board in their Report, suggested that a special and detailed report should be made out, on the completion of the Canal, of the financial affairs of the Company, but, as there are still some unsettled accounts with Contractors, the Directors are not yet in a position to make such a report.

The Board of Directors considered it their duty, in consequence of the completion of the Canal having cost a much larger sum then the entire Stock of the Company, and thus involving them in a debt of some £15,000, to apply during the present Session to the Legislature, for an increase of £20,000 to their Capital Stock: so that in the event of its being taken up, either by the present Stockholders or by the Government, the debt could be cancelled and the navigation improved to four feet water.

'The Board were of opinion, that by an increase of Stock and it being taken up, their successors would be in a position at once to commence declaring dividends to the Stockholders of the profits, instead of being compelled to make a sinking fund of all profits, so as

to pay the debts at the time agreed upon.

Notwithstanding that the past year was an unfavorable one, and one of general stagnation in business, the Directors are happy that they are enabled to state, that there was a slight increase over the previous year to the gross amount of tolls collected, as will be seen by reference to the appendix,—there being an increase in almost every article except Timber, and a very large increase in Wheat passing through the Navigation, and that the Rental of the Company continues in a highly satisfactory state—with the certainty of a speedy and considerable increase—to be derived from the privileges obtained by the completion of the Brantford Cut, which undoubtedly will give a most beneficial impetus to the commerce on the entire Work.

N Conformity with an Order of the Board of Directors relative to the state of the Navigation and the Company's Works generally:

I beg leave to report that the Locks, Dams and other Works below Bunnell's Landing, are in good order and have sustained no damage from freshets or otherwise, during the past year: and also, that the Canal and Locks in Brantford are now in full operation, and will be fully completed when the swing-bridges are finished, as also some levelling and other small matters in and about the Locks, which however, it will require a very small sum to complete: and, I would further recommend two additional Waste-Weirs on the Brantford Canal-to ensure its permanent safety, the cost of which will be about £75.

I beg further to report—that notwithstanding the lateness of the season, at which the Brantford Canal was opened last Fall, the tolls on the Navigation show an increase during the past year as compared with the previous one, and the revenue from Mill and other Rents has also materially increased, and I estimate the increase of revenue during the present year, to exceed the past by £600, and anticipate a proportionate advance in each succeeding year.

I beg leave to recommend that the Dredging Machine be em-

ployed to deepen the channel of the River below the tail of Lock No. 2, and also Lock No. 5, which will give a sufficiency of water in the navigation from Lock No. 1, to the Town of Brantford.

I farther beg leave to report-with regret-that during the last Month, a breach was made in the embankment of the Canal, at Brantford, in consequence of some person opening the guard-gates at the head of the Canal, in the evening, after the man in charge and the workmen had left off work, and during my absence-for a few hours only, in directing some repairs on the towing-path and Bridges below Brantford, but, I do not believe that the gates were opened with any malicious or evil intent: the breach was forthwith repaired under my superintendence, having caused ten days' detention to the navigation, on the upper level only.
