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By-Laws :

PASSED AT THE NINTH ANNUAL MEETING OF
THE SOCIETY, IN CHARLOTTETOWN,
DECEMBER 28, 1852, AND SINCE AMENDED,

1st. His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, for the time being, if a member of the United Church of England and Ireland, shall be respectfully requested to be joint Patron of this Society, as now incorporated by Act of Colonial Parliament with the Societies for the Propagation of the Gospel, and for promoting Christian knowledge.

2d. The Bishop of the Diocese shall be President of the Society ; and his approval shall be necessary for the confirmation, revocation, and alteration of any of the By-Laws and for making any addition to them.

3d. All members of the Church are invited to unite with this Society as Subscribers. Any sum, however small, paid in advance, shall qualify a person to be a member for a year ; and Ten Pounds, at one payment, shall entitle one to be a member for life.

4th. The Annual General Meeting of the Society shall take place in Charlottetown, on the first Wednesday in February, when a Report of the proceedings of the past year, and the Treasurer's Account, shall be presented, and all officers chosen. A Special General Meeting may be called at any time, when the President—or, in his absence, two or more Vice-Presidents—or the Executive Committee, shall consider it desirable.

5th. The Committee Meetings shall be held on the third Tuesday in April, July, and October ; on the fourth Wednesday in January, and on the day previous to the Annual Meeting—(seven members to constitute a quorum)

and Special Meetings on such other days as the President, or one of the Vice-Presidents, and five members of the Committee may deem advisable; and all applications for Money Grants shall be in writing, and sent to the Secretary a month previous to the Committee Meeting to be held on the day previous to the Annual Meeting, at which all appropriations shall be made.

6th. The Quarterly meeting held in January shall be open to the attendance of two Committee members of each Country Association; at which meeting all Resolutions will be framed, and all notices of motions, about to be brought forward at the General Meeting, sent in.

7th. All Meetings of the Society, or its Committees, shall be opened with the form of prayer at present used by the D. C. S. of Nova Scotia.

8th. There shall be two or more Vice-Presidents, of whom the Archdeacon of the Island, for the time being, shall be the first; and the others, with such officers as may be required for the proper working of the Society, shall be nominated by the Executive Committee,—such nomination to be subject to the approval of the Annual General Meeting.

9th. That where District Committees are formed in country parts of the Island, the Clergymen of those Districts be requested to furnish to the Secretary of this Society, one month previous to the Quarterly Meeting in January, all such matters as they may think advisable to be embodied in the Annual Report,—a draft of which shall be laid before the Committee for its approval.

10th. The Accounts of the Society shall be closed on the 1st of January, and be audited previous to the Annual Meeting.

11th. No change in the By-laws of this Society shall be proposed at a General Meeting unless the proposed alteration shall have been previously fully canvassed (at least) at two Quarterly Meetings of the Committee.

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12th. The principal objects which shall engage the attention of the Society shall be as follows:—

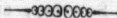
1. The employment of Missionary Clergymen in the Island.
2. Assistance to the Endowment of Parishes.
3. Assistance to the Erection or Enlargement of Churches or Chapels, or Parsonage-houses belonging to the United Church of England and Ireland.
4. Aid to Sunday and other Schools, in which due attention is paid to instruction in the principles of the Established Church.
5. Aid to the widows and orphans of deceased Clergymen, such aid being afforded by persons contributing to that especial object.

To these purposes generally the contributions will be applied; while those who desire it may have their subscriptions appropriated to any one or more of these objects, as they think fit.

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Diocesan Church Society,



The Twenty-ninth Annual General Meeting of the Diocesan Church Society was held in St. Paul's Schoolroom on Wednesday evening, 5th February, 1873—His Honor the Lieutenant Governor in the chair.

The meeting was opened by singing and prayer, when His Honor delivered a short and appropriate address.

The Clerical Secretary then read the Annual Report, and gave the financial statement for the past year.

The Chairman then called upon the following gentlemen to bring forward the Resolutions entrusted to their care :

Moved by Mr. Charles Palmer, seconded by Hon. Jas. Warburton, and supported by Hon. Frederick Brecken :

That the Report now read be adopted, and printed under the direction of the Committee : that the thanks of the meeting be given to the Collectors.

Moved by Rev. W. Dyer, and seconded by Hon. Edward Palmer, and supported by Mr. Edward Hodgson and Mr. Louis Davies, M. P. P. :

That this meeting desires to acknowledge, with thankfulness, the many mercies vouchsafed to this Island by Almighty God during the past year, and also to express their gratitude to the Venerable Society for the propagation of the Gospel, and the Colonial and Continental Church Society, for the continued and efficient aid they have so willingly afforded us."

Moved by the Rev. George Hodgson, seconded by the Hon. T. H. Haviland, and supported by Hon. D. Davies and Mr. B. R. FitzGerald : -

That while fully aware of the obligation that lies upon us of extending the Gospel to other lands, and thus maintaining the missionary character of the Church, we feel also called upon not to neglect the interests of the Church at home ; therefore this Meeting pledges itself to renewed exertions to carry out one, if not both, of these objects.

Moved by the Venerable the Archdeacon, and seconded by Mr. Thomas DesBrisay :

That the thanks of this meeting be given to Mr. H. J. Cundall, who for many years efficiently filled the office of Treasurer and Assistant Secretary, and that Mr. Robert DeBlois be appointed in his stead, and that the Rev. D. FitzGerald be the Clerical Secretary.

The Resolutions were well and ably spoken to, and the Room was well filled with a large and respectable audience.

The Hon. Mr. Palmer being called to the Chair, the thanks of the meeting were tendered to His Honor for his able and impartial conduct in the Chair, to which he briefly and suitably replied.

A collection was then taken up, the Doxology sung, and the meeting dismissed with the usual benediction.

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REPORT.

YOUR COMMITTEE now present you with their Report of the D. C. S. for the past year; and it is with thankfulness to Almighty God that they recognize the many mercies vouchsafed to our Church and Nation during that period.

In a small community like our own, we cannot expect to chronicle a great variety of events, as one year, in its general results of Church work, is much the same as another. It may, therefore, be the more advisable to extend our remarks to the operations of the Church in general.

If there are signs of progress, or otherwise, our people should be made fully aware how matters stand with regard to our present and future prospects.

The Committee would mention the loss which the Church in Charlottetown has recently sustained by the removal of the Rev. D. B. Parnter to the Rectory of St. Jude's, Carleton, in the Diocese of Fredericton; and that Georgetown has at length been supplied with a resident Clergyman, the Rev. J. P. Sargent, the late Missionary at Crapaud, which Mission the Committee regret to state is now vacant.

The last year, being the regular time for the Bishop's triennial visit, His Lordship arrived at Georgetown on the 1st of August, and left the Island on the 11th of September. During his stay all the Churches were visited, and 156 persons received the Apostolic Rite of Confirmation. The Church at the Barrens, and the addition to the Burial Ground at Georgetown, were Consecrated.

One of the chief events that marked the year was the

Day of Intercession for the increase of Missionaries, which was generally observed in our Churches throughout the world. It was suggested by the Venerable Society for the Propagation of the Gospel; responded to by the Church Missionary Society; approved of and recommended by His Grace the Archbishop of Canterbury, and the Bishops of our Church in England, Ireland, Scotland, the Colonies, and also by the Bishops of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the United States; and it is gratifying to remark that many of the Non-conformist Churches in the Parent Kingdom united with us in the observance of the 20th day of December, 1872.

From the many earnest and united Prayers offered to the Great Lord of the Harvest, we may look for an abundant blessing on the Church of God in raising up a band of faithful laborers, who will be instrumental, under the Divine Blessing, in gathering from the world's wastes a multitude of precious souls, as golden sheaves for the Harvest which Angel Reapers shall bring into the Heavenly Garner; and it is much to be desired that a day should be annually observed for bringing before our people the extensive Missionary operations of the Church.

It is gratifying to your Committee to notice an increase in the staff of Colonial and Missionary Bishops.

During the past year four new Sees have been established, viz: at Moose, North China, Madagascar, and Algoma, to which Bishops have been appointed; and it is with special satisfaction your Committee mention the election of the first Missionary Bishop, by the Canadian Church, to the latter District, whilst several other Bishops are required for our Church in the four quarters of the Globe.

Among those whom God has called from the Church on Earth, special mention should be made of Bishop Pattison, of Melanesia, whom, dying at the hands of the Heathen, the Church may honor as a Martyr; and Robert Gray, of Cape Town, the lion-hearted Metropolitan of South Africa,

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who contended nobly for the integrity of the Faith under very trying circumstances.

Nor would your Committee forget to express their deep gratitude to the Church Societies in the parent country—the venerable S. P. G. and the Colonial and Continental Church Society. To the former we are indebted for the planting and nourishing the Church in this Island for many years; and to the latter we owe a debt of obligation for aiding us in later times. Nor can your Committee close their eyes to the fact that the support hitherto given to this Society is altogether inadequate for the work which might be accomplished. The Members of our Church should feel that it is not enough to sustain our present Missions. We ought, with God's blessing, to go forward and occupy new ground.

The Subscriptions to our Church Society are not what they should be, if we compare the returns for the last five years, which would average £180 a year; and your Committee feel confident that this year's contributions might have been trebled without serious inconvenience.

Let us resolve, by God's help, to give more. Let each Subscriber double, or treble his Subscription, or, at least, increase it, as of the ability which God has given, remembering "there is that giveth and yet increaseth; and there is that withholdeth more than is meet, and it tendeth to poverty."

Before concluding the Report, your Committee mention, with sorrow, the lamented deaths of two of their Members, who took a warm interest in the work of the Church; and they offer their sincere Christian sympathy and condolence to the bereaved relatives.

Your Committee now present you with a detailed account of Church work during the past financial year, as given in by the several Clergy in the Archdeaconry, that you may know what has been done in the cause, which we should daily pray God to prosper and bless.

CHARLOTTETOWN.

St. Paul's.

WITH regard to St. Paul's Church, I have to report that, during the past year, upwards of 200 Services have been held, 530 Pastoral and other visits paid, and there have been 31 Baptisms—1 of these an Adult—16 Marriages and 20 Burials.

There have been 15 public and 13 private celebrations of the Sacrament of the Lord's Supper. The largest number in attendance at one time has been 130, and 20 new Communicants have been added within the year.

The number of children on the Sunday School Register is 222, to 60 of the most attentive and diligent of whom suitable rewards have been given.

In the course of last Summer the Bishop paid his usual visit to the Island, when 12 young persons received the rite of Confirmation, 10 of whom became full Members of the Church.

The Sunday Services, both morning and evening, are well attended by large and regular congregations. The Collections taken up in the Church for various purposes have been better than on many former occasions, and, in some cases, larger than they ever have been.

The Singing has been improved, and would be much better and more general had the Choir a more suitable place, either in the body of the Church or Chancel, when their voices would be heard to greater advantage, and more readily mingle with those of the Congregation.

The Bible Classes for the young are regularly held on every Sunday afternoon, and presided over by valued and efficient Teachers; and while several gladly avail themselves of the means of instruction thus afforded, there is room for many more, especially of our young men, who would find it to their advantage to join their companions in so good and laudable an object.

Among the most interesting events of the year I would notice the Day of Intercession, as recommended for the

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observance of our Church throughout the world by His Grace the Archbishop of Canterbury and other Dignitaries of the Church, when special Prayers were offered up to the Lord of the Harvest that He would send forth more laborers into His Harvest; the Sacrament of the Lord's Supper administered, and a Collection taken up in aid of the Funds of the S. P. G.

Several young persons, unsolicited, have sent in generous contributions for Church purposes; and two members of the congregation have given a large and handsome Bible, and a Prayer Book, with the New Table of Lessons, for the use of the Church. These and other gifts, and the increasing demand for sittings, as well as the enlarged attendance on our usual Services, justify me in believing that the good old doctrines and time-honored observances of our Reformed and Protestant Church have still a hold on the hearts and affections of the people.

It is with regret that I have to state the loss which the Congregation has sustained by the death of some of its oldest, most steady and attached Members; but, while mourning relatives lament their loss, they sorrow not as those without hope. The suddenness of the removal of two of those who took a prominent part in the affairs of the Church, is a loss not easily replaced, and is a call to every Member of the Congregation to work while it is called to-day, for the night cometh when no man can work.

St. Peter's.

I am thankful to be able to report that during the past year our Services have been continued without interruption. The following are the Statistics from Advent, 1871, to Advent, 1872:—

Services, 861—of these 96 have been celebrations of the Holy Communion.

Baptisms, 10. Marriages, 1. Burials, 3.

Last Summer, having been the regular year for the Bishop's visit to this Island, I have again to record a

Confirmation held in our Church. Although it was less than twelve months since the last, there were 13 Confirmed last August.

The Church has not yet been opened for four years, but Confirmation has been four times administered—the total number Confirmed being 73.

The day of general intercession for the increase of the Ministry was observed by a celebration of the Holy Communion, with that intention, on the morning of the day, and by a special service of intercession in the evening. The very unfavorable state of the weather made the congregations smaller than they would otherwise have been; but there were many more than enough to enable us to claim the promised presence of our Lord in the gatherings of His people.

In my last Report I mentioned the establishment of our Boys' School. I can now speak of its continued progress. There have been from 25 to 30 scholars in attendance during the year, of whom the majority, though by no means all, belong to our own congregation. The grant received from the Glebe Fund is of great assistance, as it places the financial condition of the School on a satisfactory footing. Thankful that we have this School, I still feel that, without a Girls' School, our work is incomplete. Were it not that we are hampered with a debt which, though reduced, is still heavy, I believe that we should soon be able to supply this want.

The Sewing Society, Sunday School, and other Agencies still continue their useful work; and the Musical Services are led by our volunteer Organist and Choir.

MILTON AND RUSTICO.

WITH but few exceptions the ordinary work of the Parish has been continued, under God's blessing, through the year that has just closed.

The Sunday Services and Schools have kept up their usual attendance; and the contributions for Church purposes have been about the same as other years.

I regret that the Lord's Table has not gathered around it a larger number of Communicants for the strengthening and refreshing of those who worthily partake of the Lord's Supper; and I would hope that this year will be marked by a revival of Spiritual Life among us.

I have also to regret the loss of several Members of the Milton Congregation, who have left the Parish—a loss which is seriously felt in country Districts.

One of the most noticeable events in the year was the Bishop's visit, when 18 persons received their Baptismal obligation, in the Apostolic rite of Confirmation, at Milton and Rustico. A much larger number had been prepared, but they were absent from Milton Church in the morning, on account of a very heavy rain storm.

The Bishop, however, kept his appointment; and it is to be regretted, both on account of the absent Candidates and the Congregation generally, that they were deprived of listening to His Lordship's Address and Sermon, which were excellent. The weather cleared in the afternoon, and although a large number had congregated at Rustico, many more would have been present but for the unpropitious state of the weather in the morning.

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I would also mention the Public Tea which was got up by the Ladies of Milton, whose persevering energy and zeal in Church matters deserve the highest praise. There was a very numerous attendance, both from town and country, among whom were our esteemed Lieutenant-Governor and Mrs. Robinson, who kindly patronized the Tea; and a large sum was raised for the purchase of a new Organ, and for putting a new Fence around the Burial Ground.

The Day of Intercession was very generally observed in the Province; and we trust that the united Prayers of our Brethren throughout the Christian world, for the increase of Missionaries, will be speedily answered in hastening the consummation, when "God's way shall be known upon earth, His saving health among all Nations."

ST. ELEANOR'S.

THE Rector of St. Eleanor's and Summerside reports that there were held by him (with a few exceptions, due to stormy weather or a temporary absence from the Island) three Services, with Sermons, on each Sunday, together with such occasional week-day ones as pastoral visiting and local circumstances permitted. The Holy Communion was administered fortnightly. One of the three Sunday Schools in operation, and which have been very well attended, was regularly superintended by him.

On Sundays, and during the week, Confirmation Classes were held through the greater part of the year. One adult, a married lady, was admitted to Baptism. Nineteen, including the latter, having, of their own free choice, renewed their Baptismal vows, received the Apostolic Rite of the laying on of hands. The greater part of these have testified their sincerity in this public profession of Christ, both by their Christian deportment and their

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Much time has been spent each week in Pastoral Visitation (generally including the reading of a portion of Scripture, and Prayer with the family)—a mode of carrying on God's work, which, with our village and scattered country population, seems to be more blessed than Public Services and Sermons in the awakening of the careless and the deepening of the spiritual life in the hearts of God's children.

Missionary Sermons and Addresses were delivered at Epiphany, Whitsuntide, and during the Advent Ember Week. The great needs of our Missionary Societies—especially the need of more laborers—were commended to the private and public intercession of the Lord's people; and although the daily Missionary Prayer Services of that week, including the more solemn services of Friday, were not numerous attended, yet he trusts that many earnest and effectual prayers were united with those of our brethren throughout the world for the enlargement of our Redeemer's Kingdom.

The Church at Kensington has, with the consent of the Bishop, been transferred to the New London Parish—St. Eleanor's receiving a service every Sunday afternoon; Summerside every Sunday evening; the morning service being held alternately at each place.

The Rector regrets that, owing to the unfavorable nature of the Spring, and the necessity of meeting other local demands, there has been a smaller amount than usual contributed to the D. C. S. He believes, however, that were the Committee to apply its funds, or a portion of them, to the support of a travelling Missionary on the Island, and the increase of the present number of the Clergy, thus affording more numerous and regular services to the people in many places than they can now possibly have, a much greater interest would be felt in the work of the Society, and larger and more generous subscriptions placed at its disposal.

NEW LONDON.

THE principal events of the past year in this Mission were His Lordship's visit and Confirmation at St. Stephen's Church, on the 2d of September, and the transference of the Kensington Church to this Parish from that of St. Eleanor's, to which it had been formerly attached. The visit of our chief Pastor was quite a pleasant and memorable one. There were twenty-four who received the Apostolic rite of laying on of hands, a number of whom were well advanced in years.

On the 1st of June last I began holding occasional services in the small Church at Kensington, but did not assume the entire charge of this Church until the middle of September, when, in accordance with the desire and consent, both of the people and of their former Rector, the Rev. J. W. Forsythe, its charge was wholly transferred to this Mission, since which time services have been held regularly in that Church twice a month. At the Annual Easter Meeting a change was made in the order of the Sunday Services in St. Thomas' and St. Stephen's. Instead of alternating with the morning and evening service on each Sunday, the alternation has taken place monthly. This change was made for the better accommodation of those living in the more remote districts, who were frequently disappointed in coming to Church at the wrong time for the service. This new arrangement has been found to work more satisfactorily. Since the annexation, however, of Kensington, it has been, to a certain extent, interrupted.

Holy Communion has been administered once a month in St. Stephen's Church, and in St. Thomas' occasionally.

Sunday Schools were sustained during the Summer in both these Churches.

A number of useful Books were added to the Libraries. Over 100 Religious Monthly Periodicals have been circulated in the Mission, and are, I believe, exerting a

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salutary influence, especially upon the young people of the Mission.

Monthly Evening Services have been kept up throughout the year, for the most part at three stations, namely, at the Third Ponds, Fermoy, and at Hardinge's Creek. At these services, which are in general well attended, cent collections have been made in aid of Missions. Public notices were given for the observance of the Day of Intercession, on the 21st of December, but, owing to the storm and a Funeral, which took place on that day, no services were held on this Mission.

In August a Sunday School Festival came off at Burlington, which gave much satisfaction to all present.

Very much time has been occupied in visiting the sick, and from house to house.

A few of the Sunday and Week Day Services have been omitted, in consequence of bad roads and stormy weather.

At the close of the year I was presented by the Members of St. Stephen's Congregation with a valuable Buffalo Robe.

ALBERTON AND KILDARE.

THE time having arrived to send to the Diocesan Church Society a statistical account of the Mission of Alberton and Kildare, I am happy to report that, by the blessing of God, the good and glorious work of the Church's Mission, in this part of God's Vineyard, has been going on throughout the past year regularly, and, I trust, progressing in all the ten stations where I have preached and performed the Church's Service.

At Saint Peter's, Alberton, as usual, the alternate Sabbath Service has been well and fully attended throughout the year. To this is added a visit from the chief Pastor of the Church, who, on the 5th of September last, admitted a number of young persons to the Apostolic Rite of Confirmation, to whom the Bishop gave a very solemn and excellent address, which, I pray God, may have had a deep and lasting impression on all present. Afterwards he delivered, before a respectable congregation, a good Evangelical Sermon, and concluded with his blessing on us all. There is another pleasing feature connected with Saint Peter's, Alberton. Having had a Tea during the past summer, at which we realized (although the day was a wet day) about \$230, we are now in a position to put a nice fence round the Graveyard, and also to finish the lower flat of the Church Tower, which will greatly add to the appearance of the entrance of the Church, as well as make it more comfortable, and also warmer. I am sorry to say that we have not as yet been able to accomplish our long-cherished wish, namely, to open Saint Peter's, Alberton, every Sunday for Divine Service, which is so desirable for the fuller attendance of the congregation. I am happy to say that the Holy Communion at Saint Peter's, during the past year, has been well attended, and the Offertory larger than any previous year. The Sunday School in connection with Saint Peter's during the past Summer, and conducted by Mrs. Oliver, one of the Wardens, and Mrs. Dyer, has been fairly attended, the children making good progress. With

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the help of the Loan Library I rejoice to say that, though last winter was so stormy, the snow so deep, and the road so generally filled up with drifts, as well as through a very wet and stormy summer, I have been able to attend, regularly, every alternate Sabbath, both the services at Tignish and at Christ Church, Kildare Capes, throughout the past year. Holy Communion was regularly administered at the Capes, and pretty well attended by the consistent members of our Church. Here, too, (namely Christ Church) as well as at Saint Peter's, Alberton, the Bishop, on the 6th of September last, admitted a number of young persons, one of whom was previously a Roman Catholic, and another the daughter of a Methodist, to the solemn rite of Confirmation, with his usual excellent address to the Candidates. The whole congregation was very attentive, and considerably large, considering the service was held on a week day, in a busy time. The Sunday School at Christ Church, Capes, has been in full operation during the past season, conducted by the good members of the Church. I am sorry to add that the Sunday School at Tignish has been, during the past summer, (owing to the absence of Mr. C. Reid, the District Teacher,) suspended, as well as the alternate Sunday Service of the Church, which he usually performed at the Western Road, Lots 2 and 3. Our Monthly Service at Montrose, and at Cascumpec Village, has been well attended, especially at the latter, where the School-room is sometimes overcrowded. I have good hope that a good work is going on in the hearts of some who attend this service. They all (though half who attend belong to other denominations) seem really to appreciate the Church's Service. The Bloomfield and the Lot 6 Monthly Services have been very encouraging, and well attended. With regard to Lots 7 and 8 I have visited a few times during the past year. The attendance was pretty good; but I find that the distance is too great, and the roads often so very bad that I shall not be able to attend to this part of the Mission but very seldom. To supply twelve Stations regularly is really more than I am able to perform; still I am willing, for the glory of God, the good

of the Church, and the salvation of souls, to do all I can (unto my life's end).

Our Services and Prayer Meetings, as usual, at Upper and Lower Kildare, Western Road, Lots 2 and 3, are, and have been, well attended, and, I trust, with blessed results. Oh! that all of our services may prove a blessing to all for Christ's sake.

CHERRY VALLEY.

THE past year is, I think I may venture to say, one which, as to the fortunes of this Mission, has not been without a good deal to thank God for, and to cheer and encourage one for the future. It has not been marked by any large accession of numbers, or any very conspicuous development of religious life.

Indeed, our little jars and jungles have not been wanting, for a man can't please everybody; but, on the whole, good will and oneness have marked the intercourse which I and my people have had together. We have got to understand and love one another; and I find in them a promising readiness to respond to any effort or appeal that God may give me grace to make for their spiritual good.

There is, I feel, much to be done—a quickening of religious life that is now too torpid; an infusion of Church principles where is now, perhaps, a dangerous indifference, and a widening of Christian sympathies that have now too confined a sphere. But a beginning, I trust, has been made; the foundation laid of mutual understanding and good will, without which no sound work for Christ can be accomplished.

The principal event of the year has been the visitation of our good Bishop, for Confirmation, and other purposes.

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I presented to him 18 Candidates for Confirmation—12 at Cherry Valley, and 6 at Mount Stewart; and, at the Barrens, His Lordship Consecrated the Little Church, which, with the help of kind friends in Charlottetown, we have been enabled to furnish. His Lordship's visit was, I believe, a satisfactory one—pleasing to us, and not without pleasure to him.

I have to report, what I suppose every Country Clergyman will have to report, an unfortunate year for travelling. With the roads choked with snow, and the unfortunate preference which the severest of our weather seems to have had for Sundays and Holydays, distant appointments could not always be kept. One's nearest Church sometimes could not be reached; or, when, with great difficulty, reached, was found without a congregation. This has diminished somewhat the number of services during the year; but a man, under such circumstances, can do no more than his best.

PORT HILL.

Through the past year Services have been held regularly in the three Districts of my Mission, excepting on some of the intensely cold days of the early part of the year, and of the late Christmas Season.

Owing to the want of a constant Teacher, I regret that the Lot 11 Sunday School has not been so regularly held; but the attendance at the Port Hill School has been half as large again as in former years.

The Missionary Collections, made by the Scholars, have, consequently, increased.

Confirmation Classes were held weekly, from May to September, and 17 Candidates were Confirmed.

Four Adults have been Baptized through the year. His Lordship the Bishop expressed his pleasure at the improved appearance of the Parsonage, after that £15 had

been expended on its repairs by the Parishioners. Though the Week of Intercession, for the Missions of our Church, was one of severe weather, we collected, including our Sunday School Subscriptions, \$13 for the S. P. G.

We have, at last, got our Eucharistic Vessels for the Church at Lot 11.

For the kind co-operation in my work, given by Sunday School Teachers, Choirs, Collectors of D. C. S. Subscriptions, and the Ladies who provided Tea for the Scholars at the breaking up of Sunday School, my sincere thanks are due.
