

TO BE ANSWERED IN NEXT YEAR'S ALMANACK.

1—If from half the square of the sum of the length and breadth of any rectangle there be taken half the square of the diagonal, prove, geometrically, that the remainder will be equal to the area of the rectangle.

2—A spherical segment my bowl is I know,

5—Having to survey a rectangular field, the following dimensions were all that could be taken, on account of obstructions, viz. the length of a line from one of the angles to the opposite side, equal to 10.58 chains, and from the adjacent angle of the trapezium thus formed, the length of the perpendicular to the former 5.98 chains. From these data it is required to determine the area of the field.
