FOR WANT OF SUGAR
London, Dec. 8.—An investigation into the increasing infant mortality in Berlin has established that the rising death rate is due to an insufficient sugar allowance, according to an Amsterdam dispatch to the Exchange Telegraph Company.

The dispatch says that it has been decided that each child born after Dec. 1 shall receive an additional half pound monthly of sugar, the rations of the rest of the population being proportionately reduced. The allowance up to this time has been 750 grams monthly for each baby.

regards Canadian trade

It is not generally understood that although copies of the list are on file in the Canadian Trade and Commerce Department it does not apply in any sense to Canada and that Canadian firms are free to trade unrestricted with whomsoever they will.

So far as can be learned there is no intention on the part of the government to make any change in this arrangement, with which Canadian merchants are well satisfied. No Canadian blacklist has yet been established and such action will not be taken without careful consideration.



system which had beaten her she disappeared, so far as the knowledge of the police was concerned.

Formerly she had lived in a city upstate, what one, nobody knows. "The difference of taste between it and butter is rather in the absence of the aroma that we find in the best butter, than in any disagreeable flavor present. Indeed, although each person thinks to the contrary in regard to himself, few people are able to distinguish it from butter by taste. It may be used in almost every way as a butter substotute. It is perfectly satisfactory to use in the making of sauces or upon vegetables or meat. It does not make so light a cake as butter, and is not as satisfactory for this purpose, except that in a plain cake if may be substituted for part of the butter. 



Below are printed some interesting extracts from further letters received from Lieut. Guy L. Short, of the 47th Battalion, which took part in one of the recent severe engagements, and kept up the reputation of the Canadians as

His account of holding the trenches in the wet weather is very graphic and shows what hardships the soldiers who are lighting for us have to bear. Extracts follow:

I have seen some great sights, but one I saw yesterday was really the most wonderful yet. My company was in the line, but I came out about midday to take over billets, I walked by communication trenches for over two miles and then went overland, being on top of the highest ridge in that part of the country. Looking back I saw spread out in front of me the whole panorama of trenches. Here and there around me the Huns' shells were bursting, high explosives sending up great jets of blue smoke and a shower of mud, or in the air shrapnel was spreading leaden pellets along a communication trench. Away across the valley below our shells were tearing up Fritz's lines and our shrapnel was, I hope, making Heine crouch down in a wet trench and pray for the war to end. I could see little parties of our men in twos and threes going back and forth behind our lines in plain view of Fritz all right, but too far away for rifle shot and too small to waste shrapnel on. As I looked, a barrage startnational service is getting ready distinctive badges in connection with the campaign now being inaugurated.

The principal distinctions will be. ed. The crack and boom of our guns grew into a war in which the sound of an individual gun was indistinguishable and far over to the left a line of smoke appeared above the German lines. It was our deadly shrapnel barrage, battery after battery, firing at its highest rate, sending Fritz skulking into his dugouts and making his machine gunners leave their guns. Behind it, no doubt, our infantry was crawling nearer and nearer to his trenches ready to dash forward the second the barrage lifted, and hop into the trench before Herr Bosche could collect his wits or his ammunition. I tell you it was a great sight. We had done the same thing a few nights before, only we did it in the dark.

> I cannot say much about our recent attack, at least not yet. One of my sergeants has been recommended very highly, partly by myself, as his conduct was exemplary. The value of the example he set the men, and the way he made them work cannot be exaggerated. One of my boys (only sixteen) picked up a machine gun after the crew had been knocked out, found a crew of his own, and when I came upon him was coolly making an emplacement and getting ready for a counter-attack. These are the kind of things that help us (the officers) so much. All my time was taken up in getting in touch with our





FLOUR UP AGAIN

After falling off minety cents a barrel from its original highest level, flour turned the tables yesterday, and resumed its upward march; making up thirty cents of its falling off. The advance was confined to the Manitoba grades, which are now selling for \$10.90. Ontario is quoted at \$9.95. Oatmeal has shown a sympathetic decline of twenty-five cents, and is now quoted at \$8.25 a barrel against \$6.50 for last week. The standard grades are now nine dollars instead of \$0.25.

Cornmeal and barley, governed to a great extent by the movements of the wheat market, have been advanced slightly. Barley is now \$5.60 a bag, and cornmeal \$7.50, compared with seven dollars, for last week. Lard is continually soaring. For the past six weeks it has shown a steady conservative advance, and there seems but little likelihood of its being checked.




