AUSTRALIA OPENS FIRST

GREAT STEEL PLANT Sydney, Australia, (Correspondence), June 10—An iron and steel works, representing an outlay of more than \$7,000,000 has just been opened at Port Waratah, near Newcastle, New South Wales, by means of which Australia hopes eventually to become independent of foreign countries in the matter of iron and steel.



Toronto, July 14—The first Canadian-trained flight sub-lieutenants for the Royal Navy Air Service have left for Ottawa to report to Admiral Kingsmill, who will grant them their commissions in the imperial service. The two aviators are Lieut. Homer Smith, formerly of the Queen's Own Rifles, and later of the Divisional Cyclist Corps, and Strachan Ince, a son of William Ince, Jr., and a brother of Lieut. W. Ince, of the 85th battalion C. E. F. The two aviators completed their tests for pilot's certificates at the Long Branch aviation course in the presence of Capt. Ross Hume and A. S. Penton.

In order to quality for their certificates, the two students were required to fly the machines without an instructor on board. The tests comprised a flight in which five figure eights were made by the candidate around two poles 500 yards apart, a landing being made within 150 feet of a spot previously determined. This was followed by a second flight, in which five more figure eights were made, and the candidate then rose to a height of at least \$28 feet, and cutting off his motor, was required to volplane, making a landing with engine shut off within the 150 foot space.





Heroic Exploits of 1st Ontario Battalion Related by Sir Max Aitken, Canadian Record Officer—Lieut. Kelly of St. John is Mentioned

Ottawa, July 13—A thrilling account of the exploits of the 1st Ontario battalion of the Canadian repeditionary forces is given in the eye-witness natrative compiled by Sir Max Aitken, the Canadian record officer at the front. Individual instances of splendid heroism and gallantry are told of by the observer.

The narrative, which is a continuation of the story of the orchard battle, begins with the fighting in the middle of June. The narrative follows:

Out the Canadian Retail to Data the Listower Business College. History relates he was singing the trench version of "I wonder how the old folks are at home," when the mine exploded and he was buried. By the time he had dug himself out he discovered that all his world, including his rifle, had disappeared. But his business training told him that there was an active demand for bombs for the German trenches a few score yards away. So Private Smith festoconed himself with bombs from the dead and wounded bomb-throwers around him, and set out, mainly on all fours, to supply that demand. He did if five times. He was not himself a bomb-thrower, but a mere middleman.


