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Westminster Gazette Montreal Traders Want Canadian Port Expansion

representative of The Telegraph Journal and The Evening Times-who is now on an active canvass of Canadian importers and exporters in behalf of the more general use of Canadian ports.

MONTREAL, Sept. 15-During the last week I have talked with me MONTREAL, Sept. 15—During the last week I have talked with men who represent a fairly representative eross-section of Montreal import and export trade. Three distinct impressions have been made on my mind. First, that they all desire to handle their trade through Canadian channels; second, that more or less business is done through American ports; and, third, that lack of tonnage when needed, to or from Canadian ports, or an unfavorable-rate, is responsible for this diversion to American channels. Of course it goes without saying that the Canadian National Railways do not fret about shipments made by way of Portland, but they do not make a lower rate, and it is open to the shipper of the majority to name the route.

George Bonner, of The Bonner Leather Co., Ltd., gave an illustration of how the railways could help our ports. His company are importers of hides and he told of a case where J. G. Galley, of the Canadian Pacific import freight department, by whom I was introduced to him, had got in touch with a foreign shipper, pointed out that a Canadian port could be utilized without loss, and as a result the Bonner Company was able to use a home port. Mr. Bonner believed the railways, by getting after the foreign shipper, and making a competitive rate, could capture more business for our ports. His

J. C. Stephenson, of the Montreal Leather Co., Ltd., was just as strong for Canadian ports, but pointed out that we have no adequate steamship service to South America, whence they import hides. This business is now handled chiefly by brokers in New York and Boston. Large quantities come there and are sorted. The Americans are large buyers, and most purchases for Canada come that way. If Canadian tanners got together and brought their supplies at the same time it might be possible to have cargoes brought to Canadian ports.

President Williams, of the St. Lawrence Flour Milling Co., Ltd., informed me they made all possible use of Canadian ports for exports, but could not always get cargo space at Saint John or Halifax for ports on the other side to which they must send shipments. Here again the matter of inadequate steamship service presents itself.

With regard to a flour mill at Saint John, Mr. Williams pointed out that no mill can afford to ship the product back toward the wheat fields, and said Saint John could not, with the long grain haul, compete for export business, while its local market would be too small, under competition, to enable it to flourish.

E. Cronch, of the Congoleum Com pany of Canada, said his company used Canadian ports, and he added that their shipments this winter would be through Halifax to the Antipodes, because the service by the New Zealand line from Saint John last winter was too slow.

Mr. Campbell, of the Consumers Cordage Company, said that some of their raw material from the Far Bast comes by way of Halifax and some via Boston. In the latter case it was because there was no steamship service from certain ports to Halifax or Saint John. Mr. Stott, of the Woods Manufacturing Company, Ltd., in the same line of business/gave similar information. It is another case of using an American port cause there is no choice. Both companies use our ports whenever pos-

Mr. Shortt, of the Montreal Flour Milling Co., Ltd., said they would prefer to use only Canadian ports, but had to use Portland because there was not an adequate service for their needs through Saint John

President MacFarlane and Manager Lang of The Canada Milling Company, said they would do considerable business through Saint John this winter. They desired to do all their business through Canadian

Mr. Lawes, of the Montreal Shipping Company, has returned from a visit to Portland. Halifax and Saint John, in the interests of a service this winter by the Floyd Mediterranean-Italian steamship service. The company desires to have a monthly and if possible a more frequent service. #### BISHOP DECLARES French Cabinet Stakes All On Debt Parleys REPORT IS UNTRUE

Ontario Prelate Speaks of Kings ton Statement—Resignation Dealt With Next Week.

OTTAWA, Sept. 16 —"My reply to the memorial does not ask for a reconsideration, nor have I said that I thought that they acted hastily," said Bishop Bidwell here in reply to the executive, in which he suggests that that body acted hastily in accepting his resignation and asked that the matter be reconsidered.

Bishop Bidwell is in Ottawa to attend the annual meetings of the standing committees of the Church of England in Canada and the meetings of the House of Bishops to be held here next week.

He was indignant over the Kingston report and characterized it as most untrue.

Findlay, Montreal, in his presidential address at Toronto last week wherein he deplored supplying needless equipment to amateur athletes and the frequency with which amateur officials ignored the amateur spirit if not the letter of the law. The Montreal man talked considerably in generalities and it is a bit difficult to follow his line of reasoning. In one breath he lamented the lack of the real amateur spirit and in the next inhalation, he pleaded for a lessening of the drastic punishment laws of the amateur body.

If Mr. Findlay means to say that it is not right to supply an athlete with a baseball shirt or a pair of shoes or not to present him with some token of appreciation of his work during the season, his suggestions will find little sympathy among the rank and file of amateur officials. The vast majority of the boys who take part in amateur sport are not the sons of millionaires or others with a bankroll even half as. big as that and if the public wants clean, amateur sport it certainly does not expect to get it for nothing. And if the public foots the bills is it not right that those bills should be for the legitimate expenses of the sport. If the money does not go in this direction, where will it go? It may be argued that in the good old days it was not thus. But conditions in the world of sport now and then have changed considerably in the matter of equipment alone. This business of promoting modern sport is anything but an easy financial affair. Ask any organization in the city if we are not correct in this view and it might surprise you to hear of heavy losses sustained.

TWO YEARS AGO at the annual meeting of the C. A. A. U., a resolution was passed fixing the value of any article presented to an amateur athlete at note exceeding \$100. This year, we are informed, a resolution was introduced aimed to cut that figure down to \$35 and among its strongest proponents was Mr. Findlay. It was quickly thrown out. And why? We cannot read the minds of those who opposed it but at least they must have been animated by a broad spirit of tolerance and appreciation for these young men, who spend much of their spare time in providing clean amusement. And the best part of it is that this time is given freely and whole-heartedly simply because they like to do it. And if that is not the real amateur spirit, what is? They don't go into so much for the trophies or prizes but they do go because they like the game and the spirit of competition and they expect to be treated




