Motorman Cleared By Coroner's Jury

Recommendations re Traffic Law Enforcement Made at Inquest Into Death of A. L. Law.

Complete exoneration of the motorman and the bringing in of traffic recommendations marked the coroner's inquest into the death of Alexander L. Law, killed recently by a street car near the Customs House. The inquest was conducted by Coroner Dr. A. F. Emery. G. H. V. Belyea, K. C., appeared for Mr. Law's family, and T. Louis McGloan represented the N. B. Power Company. Evidence was given by James H. Hamilton, James H. McPartland, Frank G. Robb, John E. Fitzgerald, Carl Conrad, Dr. Elizabeth Thurrott, Russell Killen, S. E. Jackson, Policeman Laird, Charles Brown, Sergeant Detective Power, Detective Biddiscombe and R. D. McArthur Law. The jury was out forty-five minutes.

"We, the jury empanelled to inquire into the death of Alexander L. Law, find that he came to his death in the city of St. John on Tuesday, June 12, 1923, by being accidentally struck by Street rallway car No. 57, driven by Carl Conrad and, under all the circumstances, we exonerate the driver from all blame considering the equipment at his command.

"We beg to draw the attention of the Commissioner of Public Safety to the many accidents in our streets in which motor driven vehicles are concerned and we recommend: (1) That the city by-laws be strictly enforced and that special attention be given to the special init of such vehicles, especially at the streets: (2) That where the by-laws are wilfully violated the full penalty should be imposed; (3) That the public should be instructed to cross the streets only at the proper crossings and of the danger of doing otherwise.

Not only are the fronts of the stages built with deep and well-made recesses, but the first stage, which rests on the Temenos platform, has rows of chambers connected by a corridor, and beneath the pavements of some of these chambers inscribed tablets were found, "A lofty tower which stood on the western side of the temple area was known as Unirkidurmah, "far famed abode of admiration," and is apparently one of the best preserved stage towers of ancient Babylonia, The earliest temple did not possess these huge pyramids and the reasons for their introduction into sacred architecture by the Sumerians shortly before 3,000 B. C. are unknown.

"The original height of the tower at Kish cannot have been less than 180 feet, and its four sides measured more than 200 feet. This is the first discovery of a series of chambers in a stage tower. Only two sides facing the temple of the still larger and apparently more ancient mound at Ingharra, two miles east of Oheimer, is supposedly the palaces of the early Kings of Kish who ruled all of Sumer and Accad at various periods from 5000 B. C. to the rise of the Emperor Sargon, 2872 B. C., who is said to have been a priest at Kish.

"Excavations in Ingharra will begin next season in connection with those now in progress at Oheimer."

Never mount any extra heavy equipment to fenders. Signal lamps, tires, suitcases, boxes, etc., should be attached to the frame or other rigid parts of the car. Fender brackets and sheet metal are designed to carry only their own weight.

When a new hose is installed to connect the radiator to the water jacket of the engine apply some white lead on the pipe to which the hose is attached. The white lead will do much to prevent a leak between the hose and pipe.

A loose gasoline tank is likely to spring leaks if permitted to rub against the frame or metal support.

CROWDED SCHOOLS
CAUSE OF ROUNDSHOULDERED GIRLS

London, May 25—(By Mail)—Since children have been required to stay at school until they are fourteen years of age, a large number of the older girls are found in Bedfordshire to be stooping and round-shouldered, declares "The London Daily Mail."

This is said by the school medical officer to be probably due to the great rate at which many of the girls have grown and the fact that the seating accommodation in the schools is not satisfactory for the taller girls. Before the war many of these taller girls used to leave school and go out to work after becoming thirteen. In 1914, the average height of "leavers" was under four feet eleven inches, but last year almost one in six was 5 feet two inches or more in height.

"Girls of this age," says Dr. Herdman, "are apt to overgrow their strength, and if the sitting space is at all cramped and the desks have not suitable backs the only way for the girl to rest is to lean forward.
