ESTIMATES TABLED

Expenditures for Fiscal Year Placed at \$587,149,428.00—New Brunswick's Share.

Ottawa, March 22.—Whereas Canada's expenditure this fiscal year under federal government auspices will total \$600,852,231.73 on March 31 in the coming fiscal year the total is set by the main estimates tabled today at \$587,149,428.09, or a decrease of \$28,683,723.64. As this year the total has been greatly raised by an expenditure of \$800,000,000 for demobilization, \$10,000,000 voted as an emergency unemployment fund to carry returned soldiers out of work through the winter, \$400,000,000 for the government shipbuilding programme, \$25,000,000 for the housing scheme, and \$35,000,000 for miscellaneous railway equipment of \$400,000,000 in all, it was anticipated by those not in the secrets of the Union government that reduction would be very much greater than that which has been shown, and to which will have to be added later such supplementary estimates as are brought down. But demobilization is not over. The estimates ask \$38,463,400 for this purpose, \$97,450,000 being for demobilization overruns, \$28,208,000 for services in Canada, \$57,500 for services of the department of justice, \$103,000 for the department of trade and commerce and \$50,000 for the department of the secretary of state. No provision is made in the estimates for spending any emergency fund for the soldiers but a committee has yet to meet where additional assistance is not beyond the bounds of probability. The government shipbuilding programme for the next year calls for the expenditure of \$20,000,000, half that of this year, and for housing the estimates place the total required at \$13,810,000.

every possibility of further sums to be expended on capital account. Under the heading of harbors and rivers there is an amount of \$172,253, allocated to New Brunswick mostly for repairs and improvements, the most considerable sums being \$65,000 for repairs and improvements generally, \$15,000 for repairs to the breakwater at Petit Rocher, \$22,000 for reconstruction of the breakwater and repairs to pier at Quaco (St. Martins). Half a million dollars will be spent for dredging in the maritime provinces. Steamship mail subsidies from Atlantic ports remain the same—except for the service between St. John and Miramichi which is reduced from \$70,000 to \$35,000. The subsidy for the steam service between St. John and Miramichi is reduced from \$20,000 to \$10,000 and from \$5,000 to \$2,500 for the service between St. John and Miramichi and Margaretsville (N. S.), no change being made in other St. John services. The subsidy for the coming fiscal year is \$113,959.75, in Montreal \$21,872.75 and Fredericton \$23,773.

THEATRE AND HOSPITAL.

(Ottawa Journal)

Across the street from the Journal building a new theatre is being erected for the citizens of Ottawa. It is costing more than half a million dollars. The people of Ottawa in the last analysis are going to pay for this theatre, but very few of them are worrying about the cost. The new hospital which they need will cost two millions and a half or two millions and three-quarters, and some members of the city council hesitate to undertake its construction because of the cost. Let us get the right perspective on this hospital matter. If \$200,000 is not too much to pay for a new theatre when we already have several, is \$2,750,000 such a tremendous sum to pay for a new hospital that is badly needed and that will be much larger in size and finer in construction than the theatre? If we consider the importance of the hospital and the extent of the service it will render, does the cost seem so huge? Are we to suppose that the people of Ottawa are so shallow that, while they willingly pay for the frivolity of a vaudeville theatre, they begrudge payment for essential hospital accommodations? Is it not a reflection upon their intelligence to suppose so?

GENERAL STRIKE ON RAILROADS OF SPAIN.

(Madrid, March 23.—Havas)—A general strike of the railroads was declared at last night. The cabinet met and instructed the ministers of the interior and public works to summon the directors of the railroads and inform them that unless they settled the dispute immediately parliament would take prompt steps to end the strike.

All persons residing in Canada, employed in Canada, or carrying on business in Canada, are liable to a tax on income, as follows:

Every unmarried person, or widow, or widower, not dependants as defined by the Act, who during the calendar year 1919, received or earned \$1,000 or more.

All other individuals, who during the calendar year 1919, received or earned \$2,000 or more.

Every corporation and joint stock company, whose profits exceeded \$2,000 during the fiscal year ended in 1919.

CLASS 1

Forms to be used in filing returns on or before the 31st of March, 1920:

Trustees, executors, administrators, agents, and assignees must use Form T 3.

Employers making a return of the names and amounts paid to all directors, officers, agents or other employees must use Form T 4.

PENALTY

Gather Troops Near Wesel For Battle With Communists

German State and Government Troops Concentrating—Spartans Mobilize Speedily, But Are Said to Lack Food—Artillery Fire in Ruhr Valley.

London, March 23.—Lates reports from Germany show that state and government troops are concentrating near Wesel to move against the extensive districts now occupied by communists, says a Rotterdam despatch to the London Times. On the other hand, the communists are mobilising after the outbreak of the Russians, with great speed, and it is impossible to prophesy the issue of the coming battle, or when it will be fought.

WOULD BE MERCIFUL TO THE BEATEN

Rome, March 23.—An appeal for clemency to the vanquished was made by Premier Nitti in introducing his new cabinet to the chamber of deputies yesterday. He declared Europe could regain its equilibrium only through the rehabilitation of Germany and Russia.

U. S. MEDICAL MISSIONARY SAID TO HAVE KILLED OFFICER IN INDIA

London, March 23.—United States medical missionary Rev. Mr. Jackson shot Major H. D. Clotte dead at Sadya, Assam, British India, a north-east frontier post, according to Calcutta despatches to the Daily Mail, dated March 15.

STRIKE IN STRASBOURG.

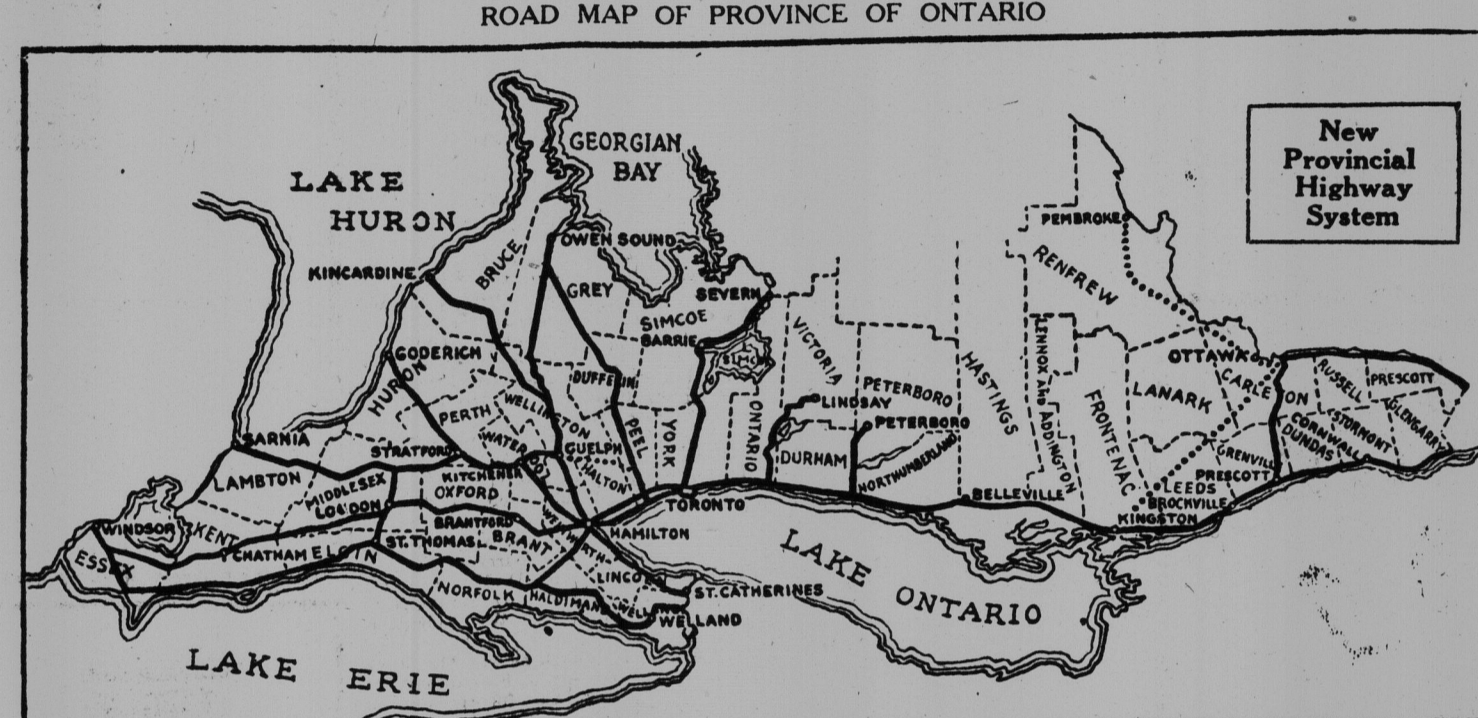

Washington, March 23.—The cost of Pullman travel, like everything else, is going up. The company is seeking an increase of approximately twenty per cent, making a minimum of \$2 on low-berth and fifty cents on seats.

ANOTHER WAR?

Copenhagen, March 23.—The dispute over the boundary line is causing additional tension day by day in the relations between Estonia and Lithuania, two of the former Russian Baltic provinces now independent nations, says a despatch to the Beringke Tidende from Kovno.

An amendment was offered and seconded, providing for the adjournment of the convention immediately to Ottawa to conclude the business, and the entire body to present itself before the government.

KILLED IN FLIGHT ACROSS SAHARA

Body of General Laperrine Is Found—Companions Escaped.

Algiers, March 23.—(Havas)—The body of General Laperrine, who left here early in February in an attempt to fly across the Sahara desert to Timbuktu, has been found about seventy-five miles from Timbuktu, in the Sahara, 120 miles southwest of Morocco. General Laperrine was killed by the capitulating of his airplane, but the pilot and mechanic of the machine escaped uninjured.

FLOODS ON MARSH. For more than 300 yards, the Ashburn road, near the Three Mile House, is under about four feet of water today. The freshest water carried away the bridge connecting the main road with the Raftery farm on the marsh and deposited its soil 150 feet down stream.

WENT TO NOVA SCOTIA. Grant Hall, vice-president of the C. P. R., left this morning on the S. S. Empress for Digby, He was accompanied by James Stewart, chairman of the Seaford Wheat Board, and F. O. Fowler, another member of the wheat board.

DIED IN HOSPITAL. The death of Richard Parker took place last evening in the General Public Hospital after a brief illness. He was a native of England and while in the city waiting for the sailing of a ship was taken ill and went to the hospital yesterday.

CHEAP LIGHT AND HEAT. According to W. A. Fowler of Winnipeg, electricity for lighting there costs only three cents a kilowatt hour and for heating one cent a kilowatt hour. The rate on both these services in St. John is given as fifteen cents.

HERE FOR CONFERENCE. Fletcher Peacock, director of vocational education of this province arrived in the city today at noon from Fredericton to confer with L. W. Gill, Canadian director of technical education, regarding the portion of the dominion grant for vocational education which is to be allocated to this province. Dr. Sexton of Halifax, director of vocational training in Nova Scotia, is also in the city to meet Mr. Gill in regard to this matter concerning Nova Scotia. Mr. Gill is ill in the St. John Infirmary.

PRESENTATION. Friends of Mr. and Mrs. Clarence Cain tendered them a surprise party at their home, 89 Newman street last evening. The event was in honor of Mr. Cain, whose birthday it was. On behalf of the gathering Charles Noddin made him a recipient of an umbrella, suitably engraved. During the evening a musical programme was carried out and refreshments were served.

PERMIT AT LAST. George Carvell today received from the city building inspector a permit for erection of a garage in Cliff street. The plans were made some four years ago but the matter has been carried along a troubled course. When originally planned Mr. Carvell's estimate for the garage was \$20,000, and that put construction out of the calculation at present.

HARBOR REQUIREMENTS. Speaking today of the proposed improvements to harbor facilities, Commissioner Bullock said the harbor was urgently in need of at least one pier with side trackage for use in loading lumber shipments. It required provision for the operation of a locomotive crane and therefore would of necessity have to be clear of conveyors. He said that it had been found that loading lumber by locomotive crane from the wharf was more expeditious and less costly than by the use of the hoisting apparatus aboard the steamer.

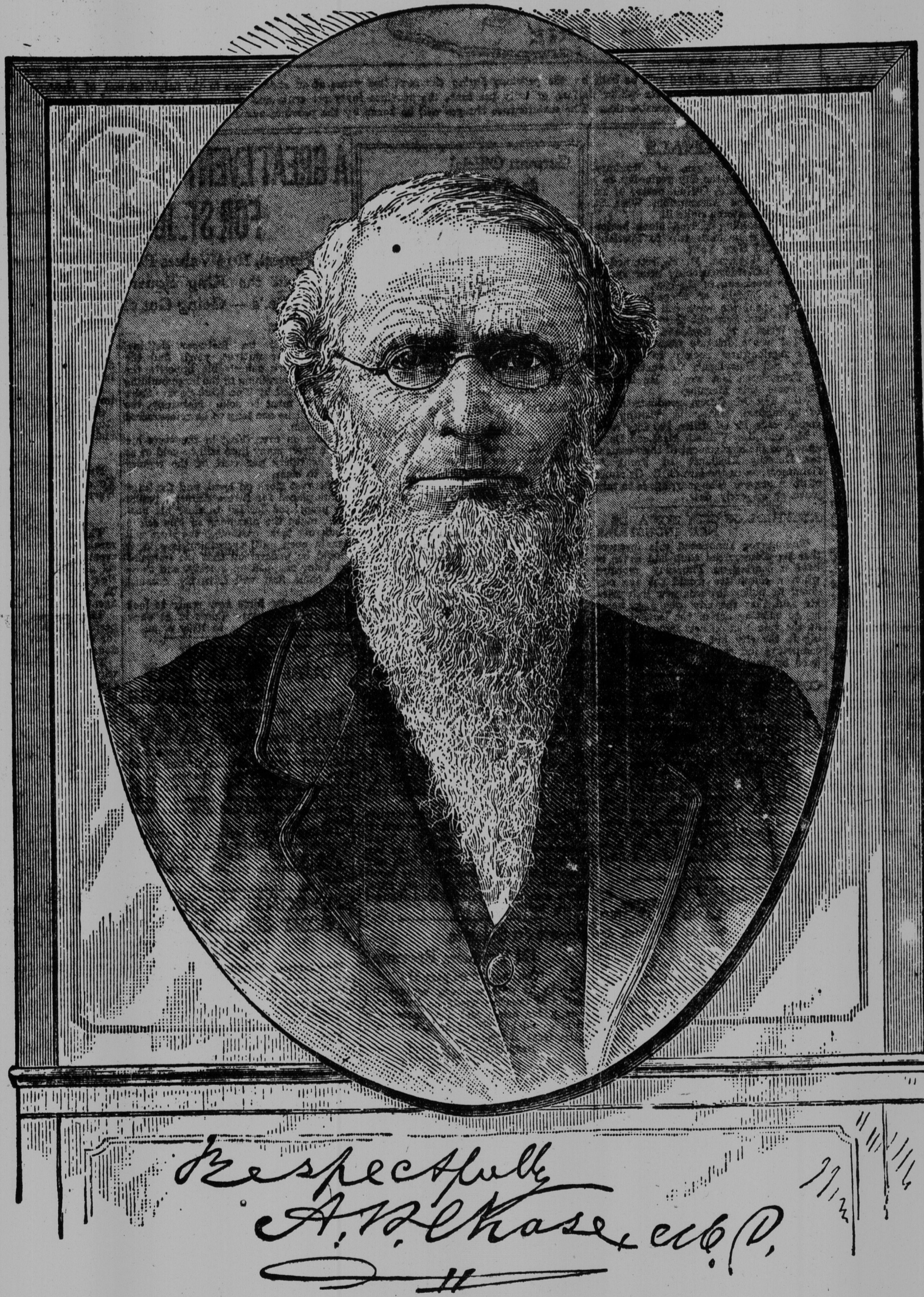

ARE THE SCHOOLS TO COLLAPSE?

(The Churman.) A little less than a thousand teachers have left the public schools of New York city since last September to enter more lucrative employment. It has been estimated that about 60,000 teachers have dropped out of the teaching profession during the last year in the United States. Children who normally are on half-time in New York are now frequently without any teacher at all. This seems to us a grave enough matter to claim the attention of the nation. We have counted upon our public schools as our most efficient agencies of Americanization. Are we to let our school system collapse because of the desertion of teachers? But the matter is more serious than this loss of teachers would indicate. Girls are not entering our normal schools to prepare themselves to teach. The vocation is not any longer attracting high school and college girls. Meanwhile a university military training bill is under advisement in Washington which promises, if it goes into effect, to cost the country \$656,000,000 a year, which is more than the whole country spent on its public schools in 1915.

WISH MARITIME PROVINCES TO MAKE PROTEST

(Canadian Press Despatch.) Halifax, March 22.—In the house of assembly today, Mr. Torrey, the member for Guysborough, gave notice of a resolution calling for a conference of representatives of the governments of New Brunswick, Nova Scotia and Prince Edward Island to insist upon the rights of the maritime provinces, which claims have been neglected by the federal government through their policy of western preference. Among the questions to be considered will be compensation for the maritime provinces for western school lands; for subsidies to the provinces of Manitoba, Saskatchewan and Alberta, and for territory annexed to the provinces of Ontario and Quebec.

TURKISH WOMAN FOE OF ENTENTE

Halide Edib, Ottoman Firebrand and Dangerous Agitator.

Constantinople, March 23.—Halide Edib, the most prominent woman leader among the Turkish Nationalists, and Reut Bey, deputy for Sivas and mouthpiece of Mustafa Kemal in this city; Cara Vasif Bey and several other members of the chamber of deputies, have been deported, presumably to Malta, by the British. They were placed on board the cruiser Hibiscus yesterday shortly before that warship sailed.

After Mustafa Kemal and Reut Bey, Halide Edib was probably the best known speaker and organizer in the Nationalist movement. When the Greeks landed at Smyrna and some Turks were killed, she cast aside all traditions of Turkish women. She organized and addressed mass meetings and so inflamed the Turks here against alleged plots for the dismemberment that the allied higher commissioners forbade further meetings. She has often been described in the British press as a "firebrand and a dangerous agitator."

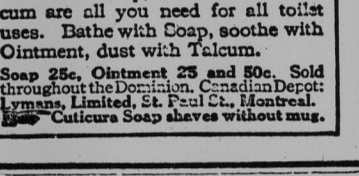

"WONDER HOUSE" SOLD.

American Boys England's Most Marketable House. London, March 23.—Ottershaw Park, Chertsey, one of the largest and most remarkable country houses of England, has been bought by an American, Miss Dora Schintre.

On account of its size and the circumstances of its erection it has been styled the "Wonder House of Surrey." It has a frontage of nearly 400 feet and was built for F. Eckstein, a South African millionaire by a man in a single year. A great deal of money was spent on the interior, and a miniature temple stands at each corner of its many terraced gardens. The other features are an underground swimming bath and the elaborate system of fire protection.

A GOLD IN THE HEAD MAY BE INFLUENZA

The Worst of It is That Nobody Can Be Sure About It at First. Because the health authorities at Halifax port could not tell the difference between a cold and influenza, a "gold in the head," three thousand cooler from France recently waited in quarantine at the Halifax pier. This fact illustrates very pointedly the danger that may result from ignoring one of these "common" ailments.

Nova Scotia Farming

(Halifax Recorder.) Nova Scotia has so many resources that we sometimes forget that the peninsula contains a splendid agricultural area as well as its forests. In the west last year was more than 60,000 bushels. The population of the peninsula is liquid equal to that of any other province and is not surprised to learn that more than a million bushels of oats were harvested last year from 180,000 acres of cultivated land. Barley showed a crop of 100,000 bushels, wheat 100,000 bushels, and double the quantity. Peas numbered more than 32,000 bushels, and beans 94,000 bushels. Potatoes are our second largest crop for the year, showing a growth of these tubers to the quantity of 4,000,000 bushels. Turnips came first, with nearly ten million bushels. Potatoes are also produced. The land with which apples are grown, there are 2,025,000 acres cultivated, but there are a large number compared with the possible land of Nova Scotia, for there are about eight million acres said to be of value for farming in the province.

The apples grown last year came to a total of more than one million barrels, the crop being the greatest since 1911. It is very noticeable, however, that the price of this delicious fruit has not visibly depreciated despite the great crop. The live stock is fewer in number than the known resources of the province would lead the casual observer to believe. The horses number 70,101, the milch cows 189,788, other cattle, including calves 249,829, sheep 270,245, swine 68,270, hens 820,253, turkeys 15,000, geese 18,697, and ducks 11,297. All these figures could be doubled without much effort, for our resources are ample. Just here it might be observed that the Halifax apple market it has always been in an unsatisfactory condition. In spite of large apple crops of the highest quality in the province, it is nearly impossible to buy a first-class apple in Halifax, and those sold are at an exorbitant price. It is the disgrace of the province, he said, the best well-packed and genuine first class apples come from the Pacific coast.

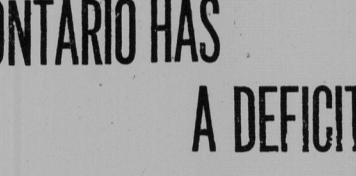

There are also a Maritime Dairy School and the Rural Science School besides the four mentioned. ONTARIO HAS A DEFICIT

Public Accounts for 1919 \$1,559,802 Behind—Has Balance of \$7,000,000.

(Toronto Globe.) On ordinary accounts Ontario had a deficit of \$1,559,802 for the year ending March 31 this year some time previously. The government presented the accounts this year some time previously to the budget and not with it, as has been the custom in the past.

The province started the year with a balance of \$6,140,176.35. The payments for the year amounted to \$21,665,274.88. More than \$10,000,000 was secured by treasury bills, but on the other hand \$3,055,488 were retired, as well as \$18,000,000 in treasury bills. The balance at the present time in the bank is \$7,000,112.15.

"DOPE" DOCTOR IS UNDER ARREST

(Toronto Mail and Empire.) "I have only a few more to go before I can go to the states," declared George E. White of 1918, who was arrested last night by Detective-Sergeants Taylor, Ström, Wickett and White in charge with his wife in Spadina avenue. If successful the service will be continued from this port next winter.

The *C. P. O. S. Metagama* sailed for Liverpool at 11:30 o'clock last night. She took away 250 cabin and 200 stowage passengers. Inclusive in the passengers list were three disabled soldiers who had both legs amputated above the knees and who were recently discharged from the Dominion Orthopedic Hospital.

LARGE STEEL PRODUCTION

February's Average Nearly at High Record—Orders for Building Material.

(The Iron Age)

Reports from the leading steel producing centres will dwell on the struggle with short supply and with scarcity of cars and motive power. Similar reports prevailed throughout February, and the official statistics given out in the past week show steel ingot production in that month averaging 148,000 tons per day, or almost a high record rate.

The trade is frankly surprised at these figures, in view of existing handicaps. Chicago is the principal source of rolling stock orders, those of the week including 100 locomotives and 4,000 cars. For the latter 28,000 tons of steel has been placed. The first rail order for next year, 9,000 tons, has been given by the Missouri Pacific to the Colorado mill.

Notwithstanding various reports, the steel corporation still adheres to the finished steel prices of March 21, 1919.

How little effect high prices and more or less uncertainty of delivery have had on building work is indicated by the large volume of fabricated steel bookings, which amounted to 85 per cent of the capacity of the country's shops in February. It is the largest monthly business for two years, and compares with an average rate of contracting over eight years of 83 per cent. Much of this work goes into industrial plant extensions.

The basic pig iron market presents interesting and conflicting phases. While the merchant sellers of such iron are holding firmly to 845 at furnace, and the steel companies whose steel works have not been able to operate at capacity owing to unfavorable conditions have sold some of their basic iron at about \$41.80 furnace, and at least one company has made even a lower quotation.

New activities of labor organizers at various steel works districts, including Gary, are a subject of comment in the trade, and latest strike plans are presumed to centre about May 1. Reports of preparations for a second strike have been circulated for several weeks, but the willingness of workers to repeat so soon their heavy sacrifice of wages is doubted.

GOOD RESULTS FROM JUVENILE COURT

Judge Archibald Speaks of Way to Reclaim Juveniles Who Go Wrong.

(Toronto Mail and Empire.)
Taking the stand that punishment of crime is a deterrent was an exploded theory, Judge Archibald, of Ottawa, advanced instead methods of kindly and patient treatment, in an address before the annual meeting of the Big Sister Association at the residence of Mrs. Ralph Brydges, 618 Jarvis street.

Judge Archibald, who besides being chief parole officer for the Dominion, presides over and takes a keen interest in the work of the juvenile court of the capital city, asserted that sympathetic treatment of those guilty of wrongdoing was productive of excellent results in the great majority of cases.

The speaker pointed out that in spite of severe punishments meted out, the same serious crimes were committed day after day or two later. Capital punishment had been resorted to in Canada for many years, but offences were being committed. "Repression," he declared, "will never remove the tendency to crime. In the future, instead of punishment, attention should be given to the application of this principle to the work of the juvenile court over which he presided. He called attention to the fact that in a large number of the cases coming before him it was the parents and not the children who were really to blame. He strongly urged "getting after" parents who neglected their children, and made reference to the good results attending the application of this plan in Ottawa.

Detention Home Necessary.
Some 210 boys had come before him last year, he went on, and not a hasty decision was rendered in any case. On the other hand, every effort was made to find out the influences which had produced the bad habits, and he stated that the detention home in Ottawa was without locks, the inmates being kept there by a spirit of love, although in no instance was markish sentiment commended. He declared that little could be done in Toronto in the reformation of juvenile delinquents without a detention home of the proper kind and conducted along the right lines. He remarked that there was a great field for the work of the Big Brother and Big Sister movements, and prophesied that the court of the future would be a community centre from which community service work radiated.

The speaker said that the adult probation system would come before long, and he remarked on the foolishness of sending to jail men who after years of good conduct had fallen victims to a few months of a criminal life. He stated he proposed that these should be assisted to make restitution and win their way back to respectability.

THE FIRST ECHO.
In a brief reference to the good done by the parole system in Canada he declared that 10,000 out of 12,000 criminals had been reclaimed. Last year out of 800 men and women paroled less than one-half of one per cent. had failed to justify the faith of the authorities.

A resolution signed by the twenty-five members who attended St. John recently will be presented to the federal cabinet today, characterizing the development of the Negro Point breakwater and the importance of the immediate extension of the Negro Point breakwater and the providing of sufficient accommodation for the handling of Canada's winter commerce through the port. The resolution was drafted and signed by the members without exception last week, and all made clear their attitude on the question.

STUDYING IMMIGRATION.
Miss F. B. Low of London, Eng., who arrived in the city to take passage on the steamship *Metagama* for England yesterday, has completed a coast-to-coast tour of Canada to glean all possible opportunities for British women immigrants in Canada. She said that English women must learn Canadian ways and they must come here prepared to work and to work hard. She believes that there is greater liberty and more chance for achievement. Miss Low visited Canada in 1912 with a view to study the school system, from the point of view of immigration.

MUNICIPAL CHAPTER, I. O. D. E.
At a meeting of the Municipal Chapter of the I. O. D. E., held yesterday in the government rooms with the regent, Mrs. A. W. Adams, in the chair, a committee, Mrs. J. Pope Barnes convener, was appointed to locate a building suitable for holding women's meetings in this city. Mrs. M. G. Teed was appointed to represent the chapter in child welfare work. The chapter voted \$100 to assist a soldier's wife. Arrangements are to be made for some observance of the anniversary of Vimy Ridge.

William Fraser died Sunday in the City Hospital, Moncton, as a result of injuries received some time ago in the Atlantic Underwear Plant.

AMERICAN AND BRITISH COTTON

(New York Evening Post.)

Anxiety in Lancashire over the danger of a crippling shortage of raw cotton has culminated, the cables state, in a project to subscribe \$75,000,000 for cotton growing in selected colonies. The Manchester Guardian believes this sum will be readily obtained. This anxiety has been long felt. It inspired the founding of the British Cotton Growing Association in 1902 to investigate and encourage imperial planting.

In 1915, when the United States produced 12,122,000 bales of cotton for mills, the empire produced just over 4,000,000. In 1917, when our crop was 12,482,000 bales, the empire contributed almost exactly 4,500,000 bales. But three-fourths of the imperial grown cotton is Indian, which is almost wholly of too short staple to be of use to Lancashire. Most of the remainder is Egyptian cotton, for which France, Italy and other lands compete with Lancashire. The West Indies grow some of the world's best cotton, but only a few thousand bales. Attempts in West Africa have shown the Gold Coast and Sierra Leone unprofitable fields. Only a little cotton of fair quality has been grown in the Transvaal. Uganda and Rhodesia have done better, but shipped only 45,000 bales in 1914.

The chief hope of Lancashire is pinned on two regions, the Egyptian Sudan and Nigeria. The latter alone measures 336,000 square miles, or not far from half the area of our south, while the Sudan comprehends almost 1,000,000 square miles. The Sudan is already able to produce 50,000 bales of good long staple Egyptian cotton. The main obstacle to development is the small population. Nigerian cotton planting is in the hands of natives, who are expected to make a success of it even as the Gold Coast natives have made of cocoa.

The world plainly needs a great deal more cotton. A British white paper, remarking that prices are far in excess of any since our civil war, stated that there is no prospect of a full supply for some years. American mills consume larger and larger quantities—an average of

Planning Emigration to South America, so Honolulu Hears.

Honolulu, March 22—Japanese emigration hereafter will be directed more toward South America than to the United States, said a Tokyo wireless message, quoting M. Nagata, president of the Immigration Association of Tokyo, picked up by the Japanese cruiser Yakumo, which was here on her way home after a cruise in the Eastern Pacific with naval cadets. The message said it was planned to establish a Japanese colony in Brazil, and that Mr. Nagata expected to visit South America in the interests of Japanese emigrants.
