In addition they have a view behind the great Hartennes Plateau where the enemy suitoust of attack frontally, can now be turned from the north through Ville-monther and from the south by way of Hill 205. The Allies also gained an important advantage on the left in the capture of Managere Wood by the Americans, giving them a position which, according to time Bideos, is the keystone of the whole German line in the centre. FIGHTING IS FIERCE

FIGHTING IS FIERCE.

With the French Army, Aug. 1-(By the Associated Press)-General Ma-gin, with the French and British troops of his command, is fighting a severe battle north of the Ourcq River, and is making considerable progress.

After taking the village of Grand Rozoy, northwest of Fere-En-Tardin-ois, the Allied troops advanced to the Plessiere Wood, where the combatants are in the closest of grips and the combat is extraordinarily fierce. The heights north of Grand Rozoy have fallen into the hands of the Allies and at several points the Allied troops have approached within five miles of the railroad lead-ing to Bazoches, which is the only railroad that can be used by the Germans for maintaining communication.

BRITISH PENETRATE THREE MILES.

BRITISH PENETRATE THREE MILES. London, Aug. 2-Yesterday's Franco-British attack on the westerly side of the Marne salient was on a front of five miles and penetrated to a maximum depth of three miles, according to news received today. It resulted in the cap-ture of the entire ridge which forms the water-shed between the Ourcq and the Aisne, the advices indicate.

MOST IMPORTANT ADVANCE

The French also captured the entire Meuniere Wood, on the line to the west of Goussantcourt, at about the centre of the salient. The advance by the Allies along the western side of the salient is described as extremely important—pos-sibly the most important thing the Allies have accomplished since the Germ-ans retired from the Marne.

The importance of the victory, it is explained, lies in the fact that the new Allied positions command the whole area to the northward and takes in flank and rear of the entire western gate through which the Germans have been retiring. This area is a nest of German reserves and field artillery.
