

Paris, Dec. 24 (3 p. m.)—The French was office this afternoon gave out an official communication as follows:—

"In Champagne we strengthened the positions taken by us in advance of the night before in the region of Graonne and Rheims.

"In the vicinity of Perthes all the counter attacks of the enemy on the positions conquered by us on December 22 were successfully repulsed. To the northwest of Mesnil-Leh-Hurlus, we occupied German trenches for a distance of 400 yards, and we drove back a counter attack. Reference was made to the Conservative poilcy of allowing Hon. H. A. McKeown to be returned unopposed when he entered the Robinson government as attorney-general although the government was overthrown at the general election which followed soon after.
