PRISONER FROM CLUTCHES OF  
ALLEGED WHITE SLAVERS

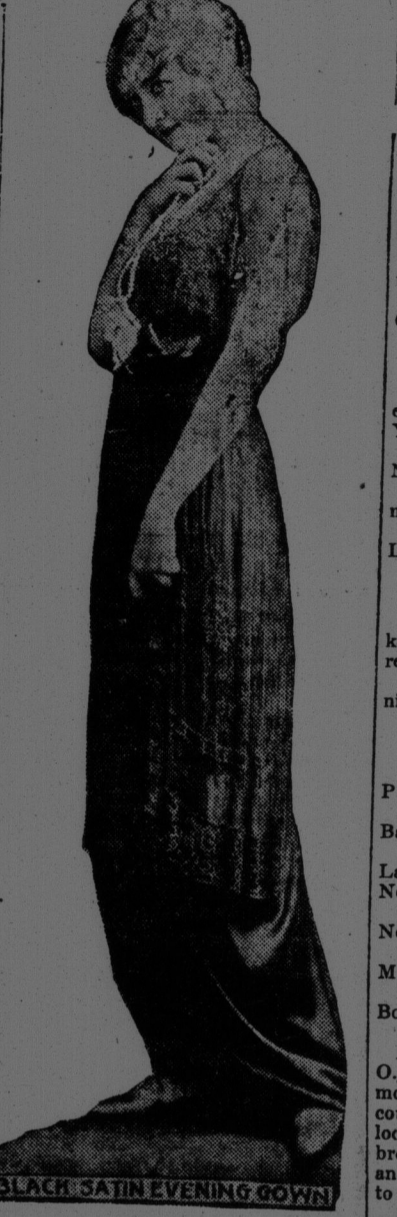
New York, Nov. 5.—Josephine McLaughlin, a fourteen-year-old girl, missing from home a week and for whom a general police alarm had been sounded, has been rescued from a band of alleged traffickers in women who had taken her from her mother and kept her prisoner since the night of her disappearance. A note imploring aid was written by the girl and pushed through the shutters of a window. It fluttered down before the feet of a citizen, who notified the police, a spectacular raid of the place was made and two prisoners taken.

The girl told the police that she left her mother's home on the night of October 23, with a young man she had met a few days previously, to attend a dance. Her escort took her, instead, to the flat from which she was rescued.

There she met a man and a woman who appeared to be waiting for her. They confiscated her clothing and watched her closely but finally their vigilance was relaxed long enough for her to write the note appealing for help.

John Hamilton, a driver, one of the girl's alleged captives was locked up on charge of abduction. A girl companion was charged with disorderly conduct. She said her name was Elizabeth Clark and the police, searching their records, found that her disappearance from home had been reported a month ago by her father, and that a general alarm for her, too, had been issued.

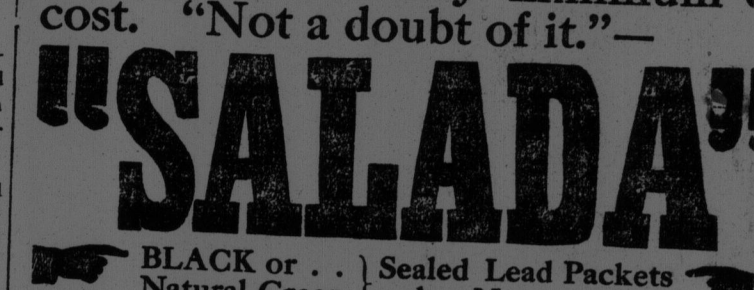

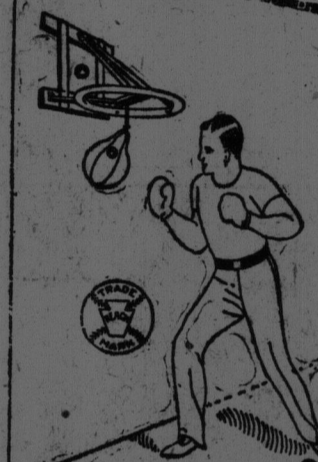

### TWO DOUBLE SUICIDES

Young Husband and Wife; Aged Man and Life Partner

Atlantic City, N. J., Nov. 3.—The bodies of James F. Bly, a medical student, eighteen years old, and his bride, formerly Rose Herring, of this city, were discovered lying fifty feet from a path in Northfield woods, near here, by a man named Harry Pierce.

It was nearly two months since they disappeared and every possible search was made by the parents and relatives, with private detectives, exhausted all their efforts in trying to locate them. When found the youth's head was resting in the girl's arm and both bodies were almost covered with leaves, among which was found a revolver and a sheet of stained paper. The message on the paper was scarcely readable but the following was made out:—"Death is the easiest way out. Rose will kill herself and I will follow." The young man was in very delicate health and feared removal to a sanitarium. This is said to be the only reason for the rash act.

**Aged Couple Die By Gas**  
New York, Nov. 4.—Seated side by side in the dining-room of their home on the third floor of No. 1835 Second avenue, Carl Reisman, aged 85, and his wife, Frederica, aged 78, were found with tubes bound to their wrists and hands, and the gas fully turned on. The wife, who was a cripple, was dead and her husband was unconscious, was removed to the reception hospital, but little hope is entertained for his recovery. The couple had been in poor health, which had caused them to become despondent.

**STRANGE CASE OF BOY; BRAIN INVERTED; SEES THINGS UPSIDE DOWN**

London, Nov. 5.—A boy with an inverted brain has recently been discovered in a Durham school. He sees everything upside down, writes from the right to the left; inverts letters and figures, and copies objects the wrong way.

The boy's teacher says that not only does he write upside down, but that he also sees upside down. For instance, if he has to write a small "m," the result is a "w," written backwards. That is to say, he commences to form letters at the tail end, and works backwards. The same operation takes place when he frames such letters as "n" and "u," the effect being that the letters written are "u" and "n" respectively. His mind acts in a similar topsy-turvy manner when he is set to copy and figure on outline drawing.

His reading, however, is not affected by the peculiarity of his brain. Though it is evident that he sees the letters up-side down, they make apparently the same impression on his mind as upon that of an ordinary child. It is the mind of an ordinary child of a similar age.

Every effort has been made to alter his abnormal method, but without success. Experts who examined an American boy recently found to be in the same condition, came to the conclusion that his mind and sight are as a camera lens, wherein everything is reflected upside down, and that is considered to be the explanation in the Durham case.

### GIRLS' ASSOCIATION WORK

At the monthly meeting of the Girls' Association last evening reports of various activities were presented, and it was decided to put aside the proceeds of an entertainment held recently as the nucleus of a fund for a summer camp.

Arrangements were made for a violet tag day to be held on Saturday, Nov. 16, to secure money for carrying on their work which costs about \$1,000 a year.

the violet day workers on Nov. 15. Mrs. John Bullock and Mrs. Corbett are to be in charge of the lunch, while Dr. Parks, Mrs. Ross, Mrs. Gaetz and Mrs. Lawrence form the executive. The violet girls are in charge of Miss Lillian Dehnstedt, and Mrs. George Dishart is in charge of the violet.

**Westmorland Circuit Court**

The other cases were against William White, charged with breaking and entering and stealing from the post-office at Shediac; Martin Crossman, charged with obtaining goods under false pretences; Fred Armstrong, and Frank Legere charged with stealing. James Freil, of Dorchester, barrister, complained to the court that in the county of Westmorland it seemed most unfair to see but one Acadian upon the jury panel for the whole county, where there were so many of this race, and four Liberals. He thought the completion of the jury was somewhat off-color. His Honor said he would take his complaint to the attorney-general.

ALBERTA'S NEW TAXATION

Edmonton, Alta., Nov. 5 - Hon. Arthur L. Sifton, premier and acting treasurer of Alberta, announced before starting east that the taxation of the unearned increment on land values should not work a hardship on any one. It is proposed to raise at least \$200,000 by that means in 1914 and, he said, this will come chiefly from the land speculators.

Farmers, owning 640 acres or less will not be assessed until the land itself, without improvements, brings more than \$200 an acre. All other lands, including those of which 10 per cent has not been under cultivation by the vendor for twelve months prior to the transfer will pay a tax on the total selling price above \$15 an acre. This also applies to farms in excess of 640 acres. The tax on city property is 5 per cent of the increased value.

WINTER OUTLOOK IN MONTREAL BAD FOR MAN SEEKING WORK

Little Employment Ahead For Unskilled Labor — Many Wives Driven to Look For Places

Montreal, Nov. 4 — "Judging from present conditions, unskilled labor will have a hard time of it during the coming winter," said F. Payette, manager of the Provincial Employment Bureau.

"For four days of last week we had more than 1,200 applications for positions, and of that number about fifteen per cent. were placed," continued Mr. Payette.

"Soon the city will suspend its public works operations and that will place many men out of work. While there is plenty of construction work, it is largely in the hands of the big firms, and the smaller contractors who could employ a fair amount of labor are doing but little work just now. It seems that there is not much building of smaller structures.

"Another condition that will affect the labor market is that the lumber companies are not requiring as many men for the winter season. Last winter the lack of snow rendered haulage difficult and in some cases wood cut yet remains to be taken out. It is evident that there will be less demand for woodmen."

"Many Women Want Work. The Provincial Bureau also looks after work for women. In this Mr. Payette finds that there is an increase of applications from women workers. Commenting on this, Mr. Payette remarked: "I believe that in many instances the increased cost of living is sending wives from their homes seeking work, so that the family may live better. However, despite the increased number of applications, we are quite unable to fill all the positions available.

Women applications for work include a wide range, from scrubwomen to stenographers, with many servants on the list.

## PASSES HUSBAND DYING IN STREET

Not Until Mrs. Graves, Wife of Broker, Reaches Home, Does She Learn He Is Dead

New York, Nov. 5.—Frank W. Graves, until four years ago a member of the New York Stock Exchange, after dinner with Mrs. Graves and Randolph Baroz, in a restaurant near Broadway and 110th street, stayed to chat with an old friend, as Mrs. Graves and Mr. Baroz walked up the street. When Mr. Graves reached the street he could not see them and boarded a surface car.

When a few doors from his home at Riverside Drive, Mr. Graves fell with a hemorrhage of the lungs. A policeman was placing him in an ambulance when Mrs. Graves and Mr. Baroz passed on their way to the Graves apartment.

When Mr. Graves had not reached home after an hour Mrs. Graves recalled the incident of the ambulance, telephoned to the Knickerbocker Hospital and learned that her husband had died twenty minutes after reaching the hospital. Mr. Graves, who was about forty-seven years old, retired from the Stock Exchange because of ill health.

## IN DANGER OF DEATH IN FALLS

Log Workers Effect Rescue of Man in Disabled Motor Boat

Alone in a disabled motor boat, drifting helplessly into the reversing falls when they were tossing at their fiercest, a man who was said to be an officer on a dredge lying at Kingsville, was rescued last evening from what might have been his death. He had been on the river at Indiantown in his motor boat, but some part of the machinery had given when he was well out towards the centre of the stream. In trying to make repairs he was carried by the drift of the tide slowly but steadily towards the terrifying whirls of the falls below.

For a little time he did not realize his predicament, but immediately that he did, he began to shout for help. In the gathering darkness his boat had drifted unnoticed from the shore nearer and nearer the falls. In desperation he cried loudly and long until his shouts fell upon the ears of a crew of men in the service of James Holly & Sons, who were returning to their homes in Indiantown after work on the logs in the bay.

In the crew were Anderson, J. Dewitt Pitt and a man named Graham, and they were at once attracted by the tone of the shouts which caused them much alarm. They feared that someone was in danger at the falls and hurried to the tugboat Marlow, owned by James Holly & Sons, lying nearby. The tugboat, under Captain J. McNeill, at once steamed to the falls, where the dangerous situation of the man in the disabled launch was realized. After a few minutes the men on board the tug managed to take the launch in tow and effect a rescue, though not without considerable risk to themselves. They brought the boat and its lone occupant to shore.

It was very fortunate for him that his cries reached the ears of these men. It is said by those whose work causes them to be much about the wharves at Indiantown that some foolhardy persons apparently thinking it quite a joke, have played what they considered a hoax upon them by giving a false alarm in an effort to bring them hurrying to a rescue. A case of this kind recently occurred when some men on their way home after their day of toil upon the logs heard shouts for help coming from the vicinity of Marble Cove and immediately ran to lend an aiding hand. When they reached the spot they saw two young men near Howard's wharf who were then quiet but who were thought to have uttered the cries as a "joke." The humor could hardly be appreciated by the tired workmen.

## SEVEN HOURS IN DEATH GRIP OF STEAM SHOVEL AT HALIFAX TERMINALS

Bridgewater Man Saved by Heroic Work — Slight Move Would Have Meant Death

Halifax, Nov. 5.—Artemus Oickle, of Bridgewater, N. S., an employee of the Cook & Kane Company, while at work directing the movement of a big steam shovel at an annual coal terminal, what day was caught in the adjusting wheel of the mammoth machine and held for seven hours in a death grip. His body was in such a position that if the wheel had moved six inches one way or the other it meant certain death from decapitation.

At five minutes past ten last night over seven hours, heroic and strenuous work on the part of his fellow employees, expert machinists, doctors and hospital attendants, the pluck supporting the big wheel was filed apart, and amid the cheers of hundreds of onlookers the man was released with no worse injuries than a fractured forearm, and a bruised and cramped back. Late last night he was resting easily.

## NINE POSTAL CLERKS AMONG THOSE KILLED

Sixteen Bodies Taken From Train Wreckage in France; May Be Others

Melin, France, Nov. 5.—Sixteen bodies were taken during the night from the burned and splintered passenger coaches of the Marseilles-Paris express train, wrecked late last evening in a collision near here with a local train. It is believed several more bodies are still among the wreckage.

## LONDON COMMENT ON CANADIAN GRAIN TRADE

London, Nov. 5.—The second of a series of articles on the Canadian grain trade appears in the Times financial columns this morning. The action of the provincial governments is reviewed.

It is pointed out that the Manitoba government was the first to respond to the pressure of the grain growers to embark in the elevator business, and proceeds to show the development and capacity of the grain elevators throughout the dominion.
