IMPRESSIVE SCENE AT PRESBYTERIAN ASSEMBLY

Presbyterians Are Now All For Union DOCTOR GILRAY'S PRAYER Additional Union Committee of Twenty Appointed, Including New Brunswick—Rev. Frank Baird Placed as it Because He Opposed Union

(Canadian Press) Edmonton, Alb., June 11—Scenes of solemn rejoicing took place last night in the Presbyterian General Assembly in recognition of the fact that the gathering had fully committed itself to church union. Only the details remained to be dealt with.

A service of praise and thanksgiving to God, was begun, after the final resolutions had been carried, the delegates joining in singing one of the psalms, after which prayer was offered, at the request of the moderator, by the Rev. Doctor Gilray.

Rev. Doctor Scott moved that telegrams of congratulation at the approach of the union should be sent to the Methodist and Congregational churches, after which the assembly resumed its regular business. Organic union with the Methodist and Congregational churches was agreed upon by a unanimous vote.

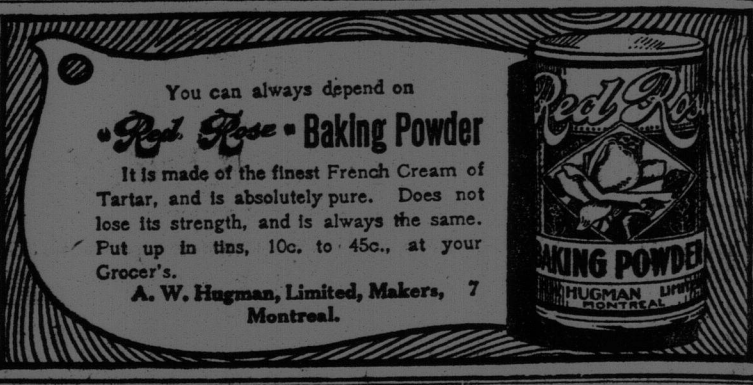
CREAM SALAD DRESSING. Heat one cup of thin sweet cream and add two level teaspoons of cornstarch made smooth in a little cold water.

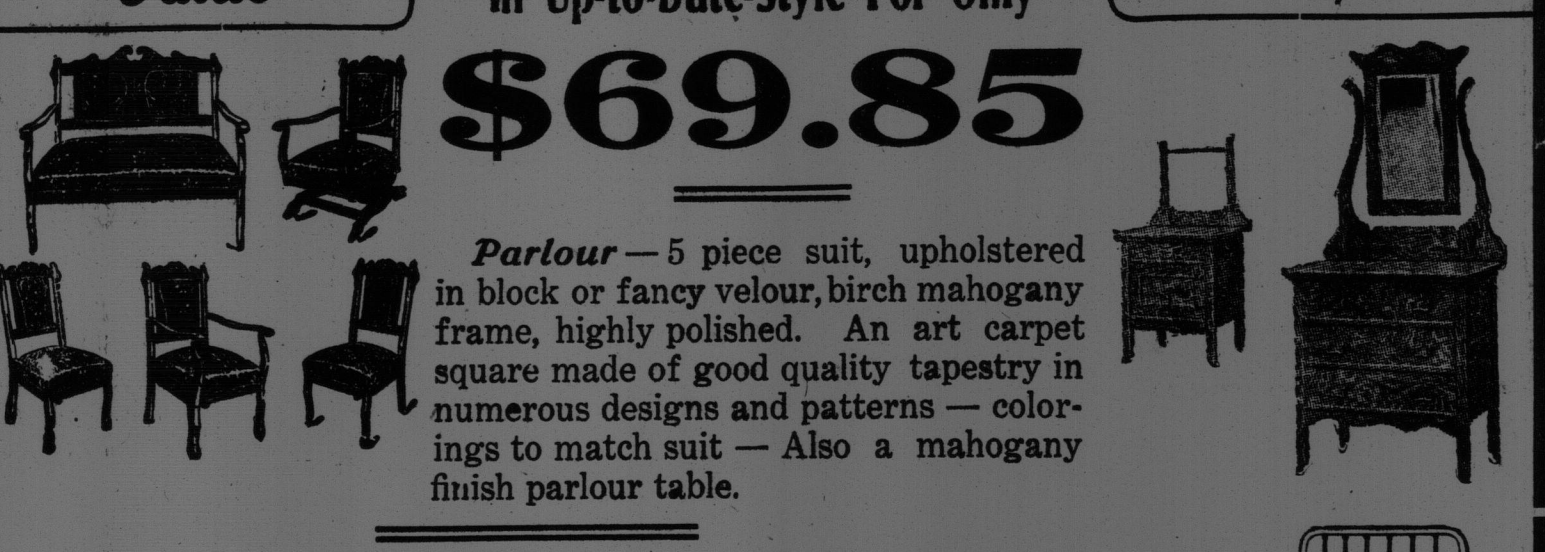

**BRITISH CAPITALISTS ARE IN HALIFAX TODAY**  
(Special to Times)

Halifax, N. S., June 11—Halifax this morning extended a warm welcome to the visiting British capitalists, and the plans of sight-seeing and entertainment have so far been carried out most successfully.

The party left Moncton at midnight, and arrived in Halifax at twenty minutes past nine o'clock this morning. Having taken breakfast at Rockingham, they reached Halifax ready for the day's programme. At the depot, on the arrival of the train, a large number of representative business and professional men of the city had gathered, and a most hearty welcome was accorded the visitors. They were driven about the city in automobiles, visiting various manufacturing industries and schools. At one o'clock they were entertained at luncheon in the Halifax Hotel.

Mr. Palmer, the organizing director, and several members of the party expressed themselves as most delighted with the treatment accorded them since setting foot on Canadian soil, and agreeably surprised at the country, its accommodations and future prospects. Those who had never before visited Canada could scarcely find words to express their wonder at the advancement made by this British dominion, of which they had heard all too little.

After luncheon, the visitors were taken for a sail about the harbor. They will divide here, half leaving tonight for Sydney, the other half going through to Western Nova Scotia to join one another at Truro on Wednesday night. They will return through New Brunswick.

Fredericton, June 11—(Special)—The June sittings of the supreme court opened this morning. A. McKay, of this city read an application to be re-admitted and re-sworn as an attorney of the court. Phinney, K. C., made the motion and read the petition and affidavit. The court referred the application to the Barriers' Society under rule 56 of that body.

In a case concerning lands in Carleton and York counties in which expropriation proceedings are being taken by the Eel River Light, Heat & Power Co., J. C. Hartley moved for direction as to publication of notice of appropriation with the court. It was ordered that notice be advertised in the newspapers published in Carleton and York counties two months before September 1.

**OPTIMISTIC VIEW OF REAL ESTATE IN WINTER PORT CITY**

"The people around here do not seem to recognize bargains when they see them," said Herbert P. Gordon of Winnipeg discussing the local real estate situation this morning. "I cannot profess to be acquainted with the local situation but from what I know of real estate in the west the prices at which lots around Courtenay Bay are being offered look very low at me. I would not be afraid to buy any of the lots on the market at the prices quoted. If the city shows any progress at all, as it must, the land around the city should be worth greatly higher prices. Compare the values with those of any of the western towns. You could not buy such lots at the same price in any western town of 2,000 population.

"Inside properties show the same difference in prices, properties in the business section selling for half the price or less, than they would bring in much smaller towns in the west. Anyone with sufficient confidence in the place to invest their money in St. John real estate should be able to make big profits within the next few years."

Mr. Gordon has just closed a large transaction in Winnipeg real estate. A syndicate which he organized purchased a quarter section which was advertised as the New Brunswick farm and almost before the first payment had been made he turned it over again at a substantial profit to the investor. He has another similar proposition in view. Since coming to St. John he has been so impressed with the opportunities here that he is considering opening a branch office in this city. Mr. Gordon is of the Main street and Leinster street Baptist churches here.

**MRS. CHARLTON LOSES CASE**

Mr. Justice Audette Finds She is Not Entitled to Damages in Suit Against I. C. R.

The case of Charlton vs the King has been decided against the plaintiff and the case dismissed. The plaintiff, Sarah Ann Charlton, brought suit against the government for \$10,000 for injuries alleged to have been caused by an I. C. R. train from which she was alighting, starting too soon after stopping at the Strathill crossing in the summer of 1910. She alleged having serious external and internal injuries by reason of which her health was seriously affected. Her statements were substantiated by the evidence of her physicians.

The case was tried recently before Mr. Justice Audette in the exchequer court here. E. T. C. Knowles, K. C., and Dr. L. A. Curry, K. C., appeared for the plaintiff and E. H. McAlpine, K. ## LUTHERIAN MINISTER ARRESTED IN MAINE AS MURDER SUSPECT

Charged With Death of August Jacobson in June of Last Year—Plot to Make it Look Like Suicide

New Sweden, Me., June 11.—Rev. Charles Emelius, a Lutheran minister has been arrested on the charge of murder for the death of August Jacobson, on June 12, 1911. Jacobson was a suicide, according to the decision reached at the time of his death, but it always has been contended by representatives of the attorney general's office that he was murdered.

Emelius, who is about thirty years of age, came to New Sweden eighteen months ago and assumed the pastorate of the Lutheran church. After the death of Jacobson he moved to the neighboring town of Stockholm. Last fall he was married to Jacobson's daughter.

He was taken to Presque Isle for a hearing. Witnesses were taken along, including Edgar Jacobson, son of the dead man, who was arrested early in April on the charge of murder at the instigation of the attorney general's department, but was discharged after the grand jury had investigated the evidence and reported a "no bill" against him.

August Jacobson was found dead in a clump of bushes on his own farm with four bullet holes in his body. A note written with a lead pencil was found fastened to a flaking rod beside the body. The inscription was in Swedish, and purported to state that Jacobson had committed suicide.

It was contended by Attorney General Pattangall's investigating officers that suicide was impossible, as the man had been killed at his own gate, and that his body had been dragged some distance away to a clump of trees.

The four wounds were caused by bullets from a .44 calibre rifle which was found beside the dead body. The position of the wounds satisfied Attorney General Pattangall that the suicide theory was impossible, as any two of them would have caused death.

As further evidence of murder a pool of blood was found at the gate of the Jacobson farm, it was said, but there was none where the body was found. It was said that the secret of the identity of the alleged murderer was disclosed by an examination of the note by a Boston handwriting expert.

New Sweden was settled by colonists from Sweden in 1870, under the direction of William W. Thomas, Jr., of Portland, commissioner of immigration, and later minister to Sweden, and the alleged murderer was the first blot on the good name of the community. Behind the murder, said to be a tale of love and jealousy, Jacobson was a farmer and one of the most prominent men in the town.

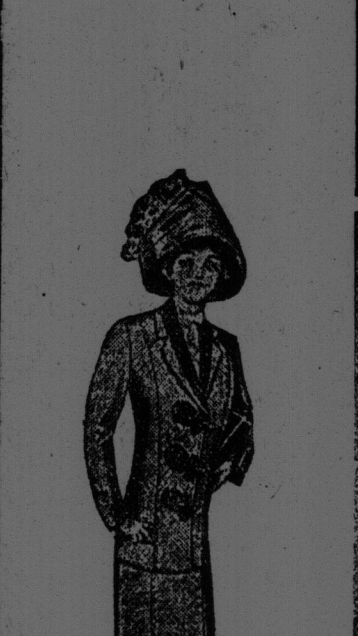

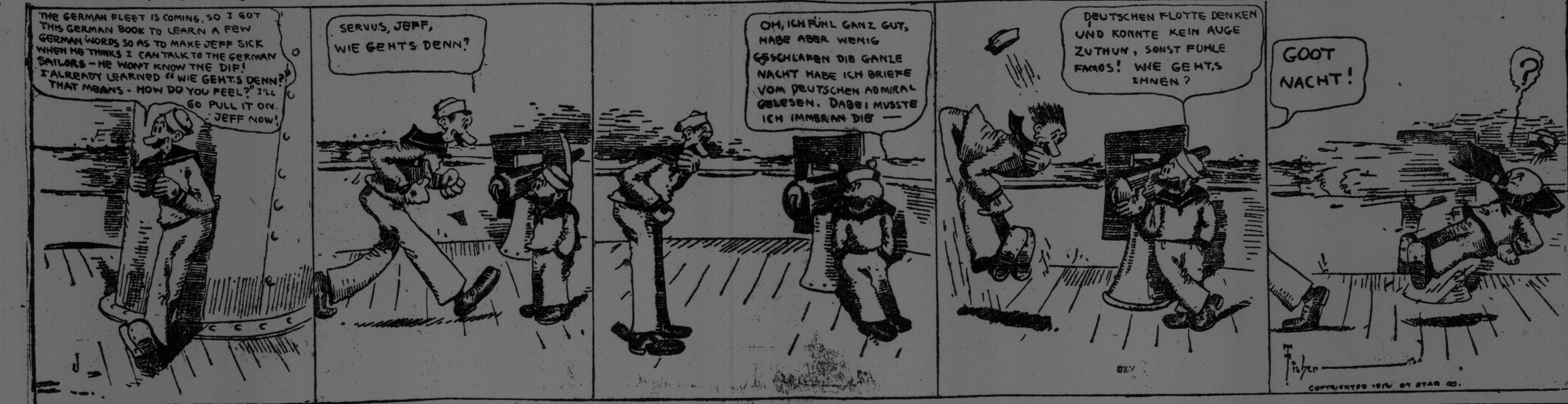

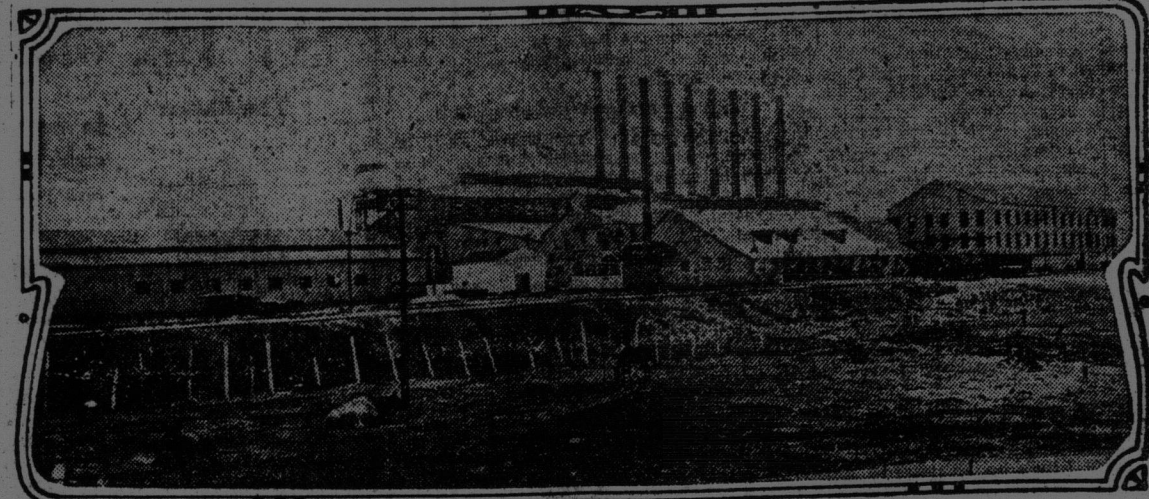

## IMPORTANT PURCHASE OF REAL ESTATE

Scovil Bros., Ltd., Buy - Peters Building in Germain Street For Growing Factory Business

Another important real estate transaction is announced this morning. Scovil Bros. Ltd., proprietors of Oak Hall, have become the owners of the James H. Peters estate building, in Germain street, which was recently damaged by fire. The building is a large one, with 55 foot frontage in Germain street, a depth of seventy-five feet. The property has a depth of ninety feet. The building was formerly occupied by Hutchings & Co., and Paterson Co., but these two firms were burned out in the fire which occurred three weeks ago. The building is three stories high in Germain street and five stories high in the rear.

It is the intention of the new owners to make extensive improvements to the building, including the addition of another story. The firm have found it necessary to purchase this building owing to the great increase in their wholesale and factory business, which is now located in the McLean building in Union street. In their present quarters they have about thirty machines going, but when they move into their new building this number will be added to. Their present retail business in King street, of course, will not be affected by the change. The firm have experienced great difficulty in getting help to move into their new quarters by August 1. When everything is settled Scovil Bros., Ltd., expect to have one of the finest manufacturing plants in the vicinity.

## LOCAL NEWS

**ST. JOHN ARTIST.** A former St. John artist, A. R. Wilber, has been appointed to act as court steward representing the Dominion of Canada at the missionary exhibition, which will be held from June 12 to 22 in Church House, Westminster, London. During the exhibition Mr. Wilber will also give short talks on Canada.

**RECKLESS DRIVING.** The Times has been asked to call attention to the fact that there are a number of reckless drivers of automobiles in the city and in the vicinity. On Sunday last two youths in the Red Head road were driving a car at a rate said to have been between forty and fifty miles an hour. They came nearly causing serious damage to the outfit of a milkman as well as the carriage of a family who were driving out that way.

**FIRST SUMMER GRAIN SHIPMENTS.** The summer shipments of grain through this port commenced with a shipment of about 50,000 bushels which has arrived here via the I. C. R. and is awaiting shipment next week on the S. S. Hapgood for London. It is expected that each steamer of the Furness line from this port during the summer will carry about the same quantity. The line is at present making ten day sailings but is not bringing any cargo from London on account of the dock strike.

**OVERBOARD.** Excitement was furnished at Millidgeville on Sunday afternoon, when two members of the K. Y. Club, Frederick ("Cap") Lawson and Max Ross were given an involuntary dip into the cooling waters of the little harbor. They had gone out a few hundred yards from shore in a small skiff owned by Mr. Lawson, and were skimming along at a lively rate, when a squall struck the sail and before the sheets could be loosened the frail craft had capsized, throwing both occupants into the water. They managed to get out safely, however, none the worse for their venture.

## ANOTHER NEW CHURCH FOR CAMPBELLTON

Work is being pushed forward upon the construction of the new Episcopal church at Campbellton and it will probably be finished early in the fall. The church is to be a cosy building capable of comfortably seating about 450 people. It is to be forty by eighty feet and to be built of brick and stone with concrete foundation and an open timbered roof. The walls are to be plain for awhile and will be finished in trimmings later.  
F. Neil Brodie is the architect of the building and the contract for its construction has been let to D. A. Stewart of Campbellton. This will be the third new church in Campbellton since the fire. The Methodist and Presbyterians have already re-erected structures while the Catholics and also the Baptists will probably have churches started in the spring.

## OPEN DOOR AT PUBLIC HOSPITAL

Here are the Regulations of the Commissioners Governing Attendance of Other Than Staff Doctors Upon Private Patients

The regulations of the commissioners of the General Public Hospital providing for physicians, other than those attached to the staff in the institution, to visit private patients and care for them in their illness are as follows:—  
Physicians Visiting Private Patients  
The board of commissioners may appoint any medical practitioner duly registered under the New Brunswick Medical Act, practicing in the City or County of Saint John to attend patients, in private rooms in the hospital, under the following regulations:—  
How Medical Practitioner Appointed  
1. Such medical practitioner may be appointed by the board on application to the medical superintendent and on his recommendation.  
Visiting Physicians Bound by Rules  
2. Such medical practitioner shall be bound by all regulations touching members of the medical and surgical staffs, and all other rules and regulations of the General Public Hospital applicable to his case.  
Allotment of Rooms  
3. Rooms will be allotted by the medical superintendent in the order of applications, except in cases of extreme urgency.  
Use of Operating Room  
4. Precedence in the use of the operating room shall be decided by the superintendent, who may consider urgency of case as giving the prior right; in ordinary cases of equal claim, a member of the staff shall have precedence.

Directions for Treatment in Writing  
5. All directions for treatment shall be in writing over the signature of the physician, except those to be carried out immediately in his presence.  
Hours for Visiting Physicians  
6. In order to avoid confusion in the work of the hospital, all physicians, excepting members of the staff, are expected to attend their patients after the hour of two of the clock in the afternoon. This and other rules and regulations requiring frequent attendance.  
No Responsibility for Fees  
7. The commissioners assume no responsibility regarding fees payable to physicians by the patient.  
Payment by Patients  
8. The medical superintendent shall decide what shall be paid for the use of rooms, medicine and nursing by patients. Section 15, Chapter XLII, will apply here as in other cases.

## MORE BY-LAW CASES IN COURT

Six Dealt With This Morning—Some Remand Matters

In the police court this morning five prisoners charged with drunkenness were fined \$4 or ten days in jail each, one was fined \$8 or twenty days in jail and another was remanded on a like charge.  
Six people were before the court charged with violating the city by-laws. John DeAngela, charged with obstructing the sidewalk in King street with several packing boxes, pleaded guilty and was fined \$2.  
Coleman Brothers, reported for obstructing the sidewalk in Charlotte street with four barrels were fined a like amount.  
The firm of Robertson, Foster & Smith were also fined \$2 for obstructing the sidewalk in Dock street with packing cases and a similar fine was placed against Stanley Williams for cutting and drawing timber on the sidewalk in Canterbury street.  
George J. Barrett, reported for allowing his automobile to stand on the sidewalk in Britain street for fifteen minutes, was also fined \$2.

Harry Kelly, reported for allowing his horse and team to stand on the crossing near the Union Depot, and refusing to move them when ordered to do so by the police, paid \$2 into the police court treasury.

James Mitchell was fined \$20 or two months in jail for assaulting Harold Allan, a boy aged fourteen years.  
Patrick Joyce was before the court on the complaint of William Quinn who charged him with stealing four silles from him. Joyce explained that he had purchased the silles from Quinn's father about a year ago. His Honor told the parties that it was a matter to come before the civil court, and dismissed the case.

Raymond Morrison, arrested on Friday last on charge of being drunk and also for assaulting Walter Knowles was fined \$4 or ten days in jail for drunkenness and remanded on the other charge.  
Arnold Reed, charged with stealing pipe and confectionery from St. Clair McKel, was further remanded.  
James Mars, colored, charged with carrying concealed weapons, was also brought in and remanded.  
One prisoner charged with drunkenness was fined \$4 or ten days in jail. He was arrested on Thursday last.

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## THE LAUGH IS ON TORY CANDIDATES IN THIS COUNTY

A meeting was advertised for Saturday evening last in Musquash at which the county government candidates, Messrs. This was not encouraging and rather than talk to empty benches the colonel and his running mate decided to abandon the meeting and instead gave vent to their disappointment and wrath by showering "blessings" on the man who was to have arranged the event.

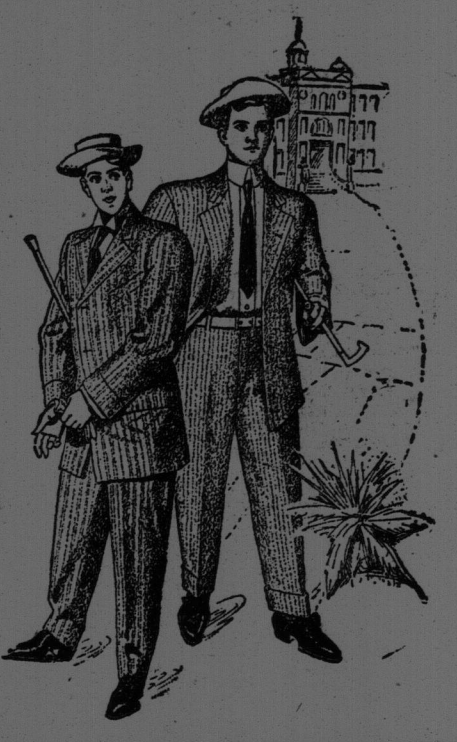
