SHIPPER MUST CHOOSE ROUTE

New York Financial Journal Says There is Little Opportunity of Developing Traffic North and South as Result of Reciprocity

(N. Y. Journal of Commerce
It is not expected by the officials of railroads which carry merchandise to and
from Canada that reciprocity will bring
any sudden boom in increased transportation. No kaleidoscopic change is looked
for , even if all should go well, and by a
practical confirmation of the agreement by
the Canadian people at the forthcoming
elections the interchange of commodities
between the two countries should be perceptibly quickened within a few months.
In due course the railways will doubtless
set themselves to meet the new conditions
as they become apparent. But there is not
likely to be much anticipation and the
routes and connecting links between the
two countries are too well established to
allow of much innovation.

As far as two-thirds of the American
border is opneemed in the northwestern
territory, there is a field for the development of a north and south railway traffic,
but the case is different in the
middle western and eastern sections
of the country, where the natural
barrier of the Great Iakes and
St. Lawrence provides but comparatively
few natural gateways. These have long
been occupied and utilized. Half a dozen
of the eastern trunk lines approach the
Canadian border from this side, but with
the exception of the New York Central,
which traverses Ontario by the Michigan
Central and has a line from Cornwall on
the St. Lawrence up to Ottawa, must have
an interchange agreement with one or all
three of the Canadian lines—the Canadian
Pacific, the Grand Trunk or the Interconial. It is for the shipper, of course, to
designate the route by which he intends
his goods to be forwarded. Practically the
Grand Trunk by its occupation of the territory is the principal road for the distribution of articles whose origin is in the
United States and is the delivering Canadian carrier to the American roads,
whether to the New England States, the
south or to the south-west, through Toledo.

To what extent the railroads will benefit individually by the reciprocity agreement it is imp

To what extent the railroads will benefit individually by the reciprocity agreement it is impossible to estimate with any certainty. Give us a year from now, transportation men say, and perhaps we shall be able to speak definitely.

The New England manufacturing towns hope to get cheaper food and raw material and will doubtless be able to furnish Canada with their products in exchange to a greater extent than at present. The coal that now goes over the coal district roads will probably increase in volume to the benefit of the Delaware & Hudson and the Lehigh Valley companies. New York city may not itself derive any direct benefit from freight transportation that may reach the Canadian border by the great customs gateway at Niagara, but it is possible that as an entrepot of merchandise at its port speedy rail and water communication from New York city for express package freight may make the rail or water and rail routes to Montreal very attractive. For instance, the Canadian demand for southern produce has been steadily growing in recent years. The Montreal Fruit Exchange deals in great quantities of fruit at all seasons of the year and markets strawberries, watermelons, lettuce and other garden produce from the Florida keys, which a few years ago were unknown out of the season shipments.



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Freighter Truck Across Continent

Freighter Truck Across Continent

New York, N. Y., August 3—With an escort of a dozen other commercial vehicles, which met it in Yonkers, the Saurer five ton truck, known as the "Pioneer Freighter," reached the end of its five thousand mile journey at City Hall yesterday afternoon. When it reached there, its driver, bearing a letter to Mayor Gaynor from the Mayor of San Francisco, it had covered the continent between oceans, carrying throughout a load varying between three and four tons. The journey itself is one that would have been considered remarkable for a touring car a few years ago.

Some months ago the truck left Denver westward bound, piloted by A. L. Westgard. After a journey of continuous hardship it reached Los Angeles, and continued on to San Francisco over California's good roads. Shipped back to Denver it began the eastward section of its journey, which ended successfully yesterday.

It has been made evident, for one thing by the ocean to ocean run, that there is a field for the motor truck as successor to the horse drawn stage for transportation of both passengers and goods, and that where railways and other common carriers cannot operate profitably in sparsely settled regions, power vehicles may be the means of building up the territory.

The truck's arrival was celebrated by the Motor Truck Club at a dinner at Reisenweber's last night. Mr. Westgard was the principal speaker and he told in detail the story of the arduous trip through the western wastes. The club is made up of dealers in trucks of all kinds, and every one appeared uroud of the feat of the Saurer.


