MINUTES OF THE FOURTEENTH SESSION OF  
THE TORONTO CONFERENCE OF THE  
METHODIST CHURCH.

The Conference opened in the Carlton Street Church, Thursday, June 10th, 1897, at 9 a.m. The Conference prayer-meeting was conducted by the President, Dr. Langford. Hymn 753 was sung and Dr. Parker and Bro. Warring Kennedy led in prayer. For three-quarters of an hour sweet hymns were sung and earnest prayers offered.

At 10 a.m. the President requested the General Superintendent to preside. After the opening exercises Dr. Carman delivered a powerful and appropriate address. The roll of the Conference was called, when 101 lay members and 80 ministers were reported present.

REGULATIONS REGARDING THE CONTINGENT FUND.

1. The superintendents of circuits shall pay as soon as convenient the collections taken up on their respective circuits to the Financial Secretary, who shall remit the same to the Treasurer.

2. All applications for grants from this Fund shall be presented to the Committee by the Chairman of the District from which the claim is made, or by such other person as he may appoint.

3. No applications for special claims shall be entertained by the Committee unless they have passed the fourth Quarterly Meeting, and have been signed by the Recording Steward and recommended by the District Meeting; also, no special claim shall be entertained where the claimant receives \$900 or over as appropriation from his circuit.

4. All applications for expenses incurred in the service of the Church, or for claims not otherwise specified, shall be submitted in detail to the Committee for their investigation.

5. No grants shall be made for ministerial supply on account of affliction when the Circuit is deemed competent to pay for said supply, and in no case shall a grant be made for more than the salary of a single minister.

6. If grants be made to Districts to assist dependent circuits, said grants shall be fairly apportioned to the circuits claiming aid by the Financial District Meeting.

7. That \$40 be the maximum allowance for funeral expenses.

## SUSTENTATION FUND.

Your Committee beg leave to report as follows :

The sum received from all sources for distribution amounted to \$900. The basis of distribution fixed on by your Committee was \$435 for married men, \$250 for single ordained men, and \$175 for probationers, exclusive of horse-keep.

## STANDING REGULATIONS OF THE SUSTENTATION FUND.

This Fund shall be called the Sustentation Fund of the Toronto Conference of the Methodist Church.

The object of the Fund is to relieve those ministers within the bounds of the Toronto Conference whose salary is inadequate to their support.

All ministers, whether laboring on circuits or missions, whose salaries are lower than the following amounts shall have their claims considered in connection with this Fund, viz., married ministers, \$500; single, ordained ministers, \$300, and probationers, \$250; the amounts to embrace salary only.



The Fund shall be maintained by annual collections and subscriptions to be taken up in all our congregations in every circuit and mission throughout the Conference. Each minister and preacher shall bring the matter fairly before his people, and do his utmost to secure liberal contributions to this Fund. In case there are any delinquent circuits, the Chairman of the District, accompanied when possible by a layman, shall visit such circuits, and shall urge on the people as he may think best, a more liberal and generous support of their ministers. No minister or probationer who has not taken up the collection shall be entitled to any claim on the Fund. Every circuit claiming from this Fund must show that it has paid for ministerial support an average of \$3 per member for all members over sixteen years of age, and every mission that it has paid an average of \$2 in order to give them a legitimate claim on the Fund.

The Fund shall be under the management of a committee composed of one minister and one layman from each District appointed by the Conference, who shall have authority to distribute the funds on hand during the session of the Conference to the several claimants, according to the amounts received from all sources for ministerial support during the year.

No claim shall be considered by the Committee that has not been recommended by the District Meeting where the minister resides, immediately preceding such distribution.

A treasurer shall be appointed by the Conference, who shall take charge of all the moneys collected for this Fund, to whom the superintendents of circuits are requested to remit all collections and subscriptions immediately on receipt thereof, and who shall pay the amounts allotted to the claimants on the order of the Chairman and Secretary of the Committee.

The Committee recommend that the time of making the collections shall not be later than the month of March.

### SUPERANNUATION FUND.

*Report of the Board of the Superannuation Fund for the Year ending  
July 31st, 1896.*

A reduction of 6 per cent. on all claims has been found necessary in view of the prospective deficiency growing out of the largely increased number of ministerial claimants.

Notwithstanding this, the balance against the Annual Fund at the beginning of the year has been increased from \$7,221.62 to \$11,930.

The receipts from Circuits are \$9,326.16 less, and from ministers \$10,979.35 more than last year.

Unforeseen expenditure over the estimates on claims, refunds, interest on last year's balance, and over-drafts of \$2,146, and shortage in estimated receipts of \$2,208, together amount to \$4,354.

The contributions to capital account this year amount to \$5,180.

The Board regrets that notwithstanding an increase of \$2,535 in the annual income, and a discount of 6 per cent. in the payment of annuities, there is for the current year a deficit of \$4,709. This is partially accounted for by the large number of ministers and probationers (mostly probationers) who, on the 31st of July, had failed to pay their annual subscriptions. The Board looks to the chairmen of Districts and to the Conference Treasurers to correct this growing neglect of Discipline.

The most serious feature in the Report is the abnormal increase in the number of ministerial claimants. In two years past the annuity claims have increased by \$10,000, and for the current year over \$4,000, rendering necessary a painful reduction of 10 per cent. in the payment of annuities.

The Board is helpless to control the number of ministers placed on the Fund, and appeals to the Annual Conferences to check the ruinous policy of receiving more probationers than are needed to fill vacancies by death and superannuation and the actual growth of our work, which policy inevitably throws many older men prematurely on the Fund.

## REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON MISSIONS.

Your Committee desire to express their satisfaction in the action of the Conference authorities this year in not omitting from the official programme a Missionary evening. We regret, however, that the attendance at this meeting which, in our opinion, is second to none in importance, was so unsatisfactory. We believe that it was due to insufficient announcement, and would suggest that it, as well as other meetings in connection with the Conference, be given a better notice, both through the pulpit and through the press.

Your Committee deplore the diverting of moneys for alleged missionary purposes from the proper and authorized channels of our denominations, and would urge the ministers in charge to be more watchful for the interests of our own institutions and more discriminate in the aid given persons representing other and altogether foreign causes.

We believe it to be to the best interests of the work in general to reduce rather than increase the number of these fields dependent upon missionary grants. We appreciate therefore the action of our Quarterly Boards in not recommending a large number of candidates for the ministry.

We would request the Conference to appoint a committee to consider the advisability of giving to the Missionary Board a voice in the creation of new missions.

It is with profound gratitude to God that we learn of the good work done during the year by the Student Missionary Campaigners and of the increased interest in missions in our Leagues and Sabbath Schools.

We would urge upon the pastors and District Epworth League officers as well as the officers of the local Epworth Leagues the importance of organizing for daily prayer, for the careful study of, and the systematic giving to, the missionary work of our Church. The Young People's Forward Movement for Missions as advocated by the Student Missionary Campaigners under the direction of the General Board of Missions, is a movement inaugurated to help the pastors and the District Epworth League officers in their effort to unite and foster an intelligent and active interest in the missions of our Church.

In reference to the policy of the Missionary Board which has been so adversely criticised in some quarters recently, and particularly in regard to the need of the employment of more native talent in our foreign fields and of a more generous support of mission work at home, we wish to take this opportunity of expressing our conviction that it has been, and still continues to be, the policy of the Board to employ all available native help in the foreign work. As regards a more generous policy toward domestic missions, we wish to remind those that might complain that the question of apportionment is determined by the General Conference.

#### REPORT OF PRISON REFORM COMMITTEE.

The Committee appointed to co-operate with the Prisoners' Aid Association beg leave to report as follows:

Firstly. Your Committee was requested to unite with the Prisoners' Aid Association in an interview with the Ontario Government, asking for an appropriation of \$1,000 to assist in defraying the expenses of the 23rd Annual Meeting of the National Conference of Charities and Correction which will be held in Toronto the second week in July next. This influential body of philanthropists and charity workers has never met in Canada before, and it is believed that this meeting will greatly stimulate all our benevolent enterprises. It is proposed to take advantage of the interest awakened by this meeting to form a similar organization here. We bespeak for this meeting and the proposed Canadian Conference of Charities the sympathy and co-operation of the members of the Toronto Methodist Conference.

Secondly. For several years the Prisoners' Aid Association has persistently advocated the reorganization of the Ontario Reformatory for Boys

and the separating of the Girls' Refuge from proximity with the contaminating influence of the Reformatory for Women, claiming that much better reformatory results may be expected if these institutions were established on farm land and the cottage system, and a perfect system of classification adopted. We are glad to be able to report that steps have been taken by the Ontario Government with a view of giving practical effect to at least one of these proposed reforms. At last session of the Ontario Legislature, the recommendation was concurred in for the purchase of Victoria College property at Cobourg for reformatory purposes. It has not yet transpired whether this is for the Boys' Reformatory or for the Girls' Refuge.

Thirdly. The Prisoners' Aid Association has been urging on the consideration of the Minister of Justice at Ottawa the necessity for Prison Reform legislation more especially on the following lines: 1, The adoption of the indeterminate sentence and parole system; 2, the probation system for first offenders; 3, Government aid to prisoners discharged from the penitentiaries of Canada; and 4, Government aid in establishing a Canadian Conference of Charities and Correction.

Fourthly. During the last two years the Prisoners' Aid Association has been advocating the adoption of the English system of classification of prisoners in the Toronto gaol so as to make it impossible for first offenders to become contaminated by gaol association. The co-operation of this Conference is asked in urging the necessity of this reform upon the Mayor and City Council.

Fifthly. We would respectfully recommend a Prison Reform Committee be made one of the Standing Committees of the Toronto Conference.

All of which is respectfully submitted.

## BOARD OF MANAGEMENT OF DEACONESS HOME.

### SYNOPSIS OF REPORT.

The record of the third year's work of the Deaconess Board might be consolidated under one word, "progress," and it impresses us with three things: 1st, the vastness of the work; 2nd, the limitations of our agencies; 3rd, the large results achieved by these limited agencies. It may be stated with the greatest confidence that seldom has any organization been able to accomplish so much with such a small expenditure of money.

Without attempting to cover every department in which their labors have been abundant, I may simply cite the following items: 5,695 calls have been made, and 1,434 visits have been paid to the sick; 550 baskets of food, 1,473 garments, 720 papers and tracts, and \$229.25 in cash have been dispensed.

During the year Miss Thompson, Superintendent of the Home, resigned her position in order to assume a place of responsibility in the Chicago Training School. The two years of her incumbency here were marked by advancement in every department, and the Board desires to place on record its sincere appreciation of the efficient service she has rendered.

We are also pleased to state that the Management has been successful in securing as a successor the present occupant of the position, Miss Scott, who came to us with the highest testimonials, and whose kindness, painstaking industry, consecration and gifts have already won the confidence and esteem of all who know her.

By the kindness of the authorities of Victoria University arrangements have been made by which the deaconesses in training are enabled to obtain special equipment for their work.

Special mention should also be made of the generous bequest of the late Hart A. Massey, Esq., who, in the midst of his many benefactions, remembered with especial care and thoughtfulness the work of our Society. In addition to a very large amount that may in future be available for a Deaconess Home, Training School and Hospital, the sum of \$10,000 was directed to be set apart for the purpose of maintaining deaconesses in connection with the Fred. Victor Mission. By the kindness of the executors this provision is already being carried out, and additional toilers are being provided for the work.

The Treasurer's statement is a very satisfactory one, showing the receipts of the year to be \$869.54, and the expenditure \$766.80, leaving a balance on hand of \$102.74. Not a little of the credit for this gratifying condition of things is due to the Treasurer himself, and to the lady members of the Board.

The Management desires again to commend the work and the workers to the sympathy and confidence of all our people.

We present Emily J. Dawdy, Catharine Nablo and Josephine B. Tingley to be set apart for their work as deaconesses.

All of which is respectfully submitted.

#### REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON STATE OF THE WORK.

Your Committee in reviewing the state of the work find abundant cause for gratitude to God. While we regret to find a slight decrease in all the connexional funds as compared with last year, we rejoice greatly in the evidences of spiritual power in our churches as seen in the number of conversions and increase in membership.

We would emphasize the importance of our social means of grace in reaching in their influence and helpfulness nearly all classes in our Church.

Your Committee fully endorse the recommendation of previous years regarding the merit of our publications, and recognizing their influence for good among our people would urge that, as far as possible, systematic effort be made on every circuit to increase their circulation.

We fear that in many cases the baptism of the children of the Church is neglected, and that consequently an undue proportion of the baptisms reported are adult baptisms, and we advise our ministers to encourage the old and salutary practice of public baptisms, in order that the significance of the Scriptural rite may be frequently impressed upon the minds and hearts of our people, and our children be trained up as members of the kingdom of God.

Your Committee beg leave to report that they have carefully considered the report of the Conference Special Committee on the resolution adopted at the Conference of 1896.

They concur in the recommendation that great care should be exercised in the admission of probationers, and also that the General Superintendent or the Missionary Secretary should visit the missionary districts with a view to economizing expenditure in that direction without impairing the efficiency of the work.

Your Committee fully recognize the fact that such a readjustment of the work as that contemplated by the resolution adopted in 1896, can only be brought about gradually. They recommend that the principle be approved of by this Conference, and that as much as possible be done at once toward its accomplishment, and that steps be taken to secure its being properly followed up hereafter.

Your Committee are pleased to learn that the General Board of Missions have been for some years endeavoring to carry on the foregoing policy with regard to missions; and that in several districts steps have been taken to a like end not only with regard to missions, but with regard to the weaker circuits.

Your Committee would further recommend that this very important subject be commended to the favorable consideration of all District meetings; that each financial District meeting be advised to appoint a committee to collect all necessary information as to membership, finances and the general state of the work, and to map out the circuits and appointments of the District with a view to such readjustment when necessary; that the Chairmen of Districts be requested to further this policy during the year and to report to the next annual Conference what has been accomplished in their respective districts.

That inasmuch as such a readjustment can only be carried out in some cases by uniting fields on adjoining districts, the President of the Conference be requested to endeavor to secure the concurrent action of two or more adjoining districts; and that the Conference Special Committee for the coming year be requested to give its best attention to the subject.

### SABBATH SCHOOL COMMITTEE REPORT.

Your Committee beg to submit the following report:

1. We wish to record our deep sense of gratitude for the success attending the work of the year. The reports show an appreciable increase in several respects. The teaching staff has increased 153, 152 of these being members of the Methodist Church, and 2,138 scholars have united with the Church.

2. While we are pleased to report an increase of 18,117 volumes in the libraries and of 6,276 copies of periodicals, we wish, however, to note the increase of 1,624 copies of papers not published by our Book Room, and recommend that superintendents and ministers endeavor to have the publications of our own publishing house substituted for those procured from other sources.

3. We deplore the fact that there has been a large decrease in the number of those taking the total abstinence pledge, and, because of the importance of inculcating total abstinence principles in the minds of the children, we strongly recommend that a strenuous effort be made to have the pledge against intoxicants and narcotics presented and subscribed to as far as possible in our schools.

4. Your Committee are strongly of the opinion that greater attention should be directed to the teaching of the catechism in our schools, and would suggest that an effort be made during the present year to introduce it into all schools where it is not being taught.

5. In our opinion there is much room for improvement in the tone and quality of a great deal of the literature which finds its way into our schools, and we would emphasize the necessity for greater watchfulness in this respect; and while we recognize the desirability of providing amusement for our scholars, we beg to suggest that our ministers and superintendents exercise a wise discrimination as to the character of the amusements provided.

6. We note with pleasure the fact that there is a considerable increase in the amount contributed for school purposes. On the other hand we regret that there is a falling-off in the amount contributed by the schools to the Missionary Fund.

7. Your Committee have to complain that moneys intended for the Sunday School Aid and Extension Fund are remitted very irregularly, and instead of being paid through the Financial Secretaries to the Treasurer, parties send to the General Secretary of Sabbath Schools, and some do not pay until Conference, thereby causing much confusion and unnecessary labor to the Treasurer. We, therefore, urge that in future there be a strict adherence to disciplinary requirements, and that an earnest effort be made to further increase the contributions to the Sunday School Aid Fund.

8. Your Committee respectfully recommend the reappointment of Rev. Dr. Barrass, Treasurer.

## REPORT OF EPWORTH LEAGUE COMMITTEE.

Your Committee beg leave to report as follows :

1. Having reviewed the year's work we recognize with devout gratitude to God the large advance made by the League throughout the Conference. The increase in the number of Leagues is but nine, but the increase in the entire membership of the Leagues is 2,777, the present total number of Leagues being 288 and the present total membership being 14,034.
2. We note with great pleasure that in the givings of our Leagues there has been a great advance almost all along the line. More money has been spent for local work by \$777.30 and more raised for missions by \$729.66, and while other figures need not be given we reflect with gratitude that the grand total of money raised reaches the magnificent sum of \$8,355.50.
3. This desirable result has been very materially helped by the faithful and untiring labors of our able and all but omnipresent General Secretary, of whose work and worth we wish to express our high appreciation.
4. We notice with pain, however, the fact that in some of the Leagues there is not even yet recognition of the necessity of, and the obligation for, taking the annual collection for the General Epworth League Board ; and we would herewith urge upon all pastors and League presidents the important, righteous and legal claims of this Fund.
5. While we recognize the large increase in the amounts contributed for missions, we beg leave respectfully to direct the attention of the Conference and of the Leagues to the forward movement among our young people in the matter of missionary interests, finance and enterprise, and looking toward missionary organization and work in district and Conference relations. And we would urge upon all the advisability of giving countenance and hearty support to this plan now being set forth under the distinct endorsement and direction of our General Missionary Secretary and the Epworth League Board.
6. To this and other worthy ends we would heartily recommend to our Epworth Leagues the continuance and increase of District Conventions.
7. We would urge upon the Leagues the importance of making prompt remittances of all missionary money through the District officers to the Missionary Treasurer, and of observing the provisions of the Discipline in making yearly report through the circuit schedules of all money raised for such purposes, so that it may be properly accredited and the limits of the Conference year be observed.
8. We would urge upon our Leagues the wisdom of sending large delegations to the convention which meets in this city in July, so as to distribute throughout our Conference the great enthusiasm and practical benefits of that international gathering.
9. We feel that our young people have not yet realized the fact that the *Christian Guardian* is the organ of the Epworth League. There should be an agency in every League, and we believe the Good Literature Committee should everywhere recognize itself as being an appropriate agency to extend the circulation of the *Guardian* among our people, as well as our excellent *Magazine and Review*.
10. We recognize with delight the evidences of increasing spirituality

11. We hail with delight the increase of our Junior Leagues as among the most important and wide-reaching agencies for good in our Church.

SABBATH OBSERVANCE COMMITTEE.

We strongly advise that the proper observance of the Lord's Day in our towns and large cities be made a matter of provincial legislation rather than of constant municipal agitation, and that our people combine everywhere to encourage our provincial parliament to give us a law for the Province as a whole, as in the case of the Province of Manitoba.

We recommend that special sermons be preached and frequent reference be made in all our pulpits, as well as during campaign periods, to the sacredness of the Lord's Day in order that there may be developed in our people, and strongly maintained, an abiding sense of our duty in regard to the appropriate observance of the same.

Inasmuch as it is stated on what seems to be good authority, that many Christian men have to work on the Lord's Day against their conscience, not only in connection with the Street Car Company but also in other forms of labor, we express the hope that every effort will be made to provide such men with other employment, and to repress within the smallest limits all forms of Sunday labor.

That this Conference, believing that the observance of the Lord's Day as a day of rest and worship is not only of universal obligation among Christian people, but is intimately connected with the physical, moral and social well-being of the entire community, deeply regrets the result of the recent Sunday-car vote in the city of Toronto as tending to a general desecration of the Lord's Day, and earnestly entreats all our people to abstain from using the cars on that day.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON MEMORIALS.

Your Committee, having considered the recommendations of the laymen of this Conference, beg to recommend:

First.—The laymen of the Toronto Conference recommend that in future the Chairmen of Districts nominate, at the May District Meetings, two members, one clerical and one lay, who shall constitute the Nominating Committee, to nominate the Standing Committees of the succeeding Conference, and that the President be requested to call the said Committee to meet at least one day previous to the meeting of the Conference;

that the attention of the Superintendents of Circuits and class-leaders be drawn to the importance of the faithful observance of the provisions of our Discipline, which require that a leaders' meeting shall be held every quarter, to the end that a close relation shall be maintained, and the most particular information possible obtained concerning the entire membership of the circuit, thus avoiding the discrepancies which are so often noticed as existing between the membership reported by our ministers and the membership discoverable by his successor on the same field.

Second.—That with a view to facilitate the orderly and rapid despatch of the routine business of the Conference, the Conference Statistician and the District Secretaries shall be a Tabulating and Statistical Committee, whose duty shall be to meet on the Tuesday morning previous to the meeting of Conference, at the call of the President, and<sup>f</sup>

1st. Tabulate the District replies to the disciplinary questions:

- (1) Are there any objections to or charges preferred against any of our Ministers or Probationers?
- (2) What Probationers for the Ministry are now received into full connection with Conference and ordained?
- (3) What Probationers for the Ministry remain on trial?
  - (a) Who are Probationers of four years, and are continued at College?
  - (b) Who are Probationers of three years, and are sent to College?
  - (c) Who are Probationers of two years?
  - (d) Who are Probationers of one year?
  - (e) Who are Probationers on the list of reserve?
- (4) What candidates for the Ministry are now received on trial?
- (5) Who are the Superannuated Ministers?
- (6) Who are the Supernumerary Ministers?
- (7) Who are now located?
- (8) Who are the Laymen elected by the several Districts to this Conference?
- (9) Who are elected by the District Meetings to the Conference Missionary Committee?
- (10) Who are elected by the District Meetings to the Sabbath School Committee?
- (11) Who are elected by the District Meetings to the Epworth League Committee?
- (12) What representatives have been elected by the District Meetings to the Stationing Committee?
- (13) What Ministers or Probationers for the Ministry have died during the year?

2nd. To classify and arrange the memorials and resolutions from the several districts in such a manner that when presented to Conference they may be readily and intelligently referred to an appropriate committee or acted upon by the Conference as it may direct.

## ORANGEVILLE DISTRICT.

We advise the friends to consider very carefully the location of the proposed new parsonage before finally disposing of the old.

## REPORT OF THE TEMPERANCE COMMITTEE.

Your Temperance Committee have, according to instructions, cut down their report, and now submit the following epitome :

While rejoicing in many manifestations of continued enthusiasm in the Temperance cause, we recommend special efforts along the line of moral suasion, particularly among young men attending higher educational institutions, also continued efforts for the better enforcement of our license laws while striving to secure needed amendments thereto.

Seven memorials urging the Dominion Government to submit in the promised plebiscite vote but one question; viz., "Are you in favor of the Total Prohibition of the traffic in intoxicating beverages?" have been considered by your Committee; and it recommends this Conference to pass a resolution on the question and forward it to the Dominion Government.

Your Committee recommend the appointment of a standing Temperance committee for the furtherance of the work during the year, and recommend every circuit to form a Temperance committee in connection with it; also, the election of four persons by this Conference to represent it at the Alliance Council which meets at Toronto on the 14th of July next.

Your Committee further recommend that the last Sabbath in November be observed as Temperance Sunday, in accordance with a suggestion from the W.C.T.U.

Your Committee also recommend that the Standing Committee be composed of men residing in Toronto for convenience of meeting, with the Chairman of each District and one layman nominated, for an Advisory Board.

FROM THE TORONTO CONFERENCE OF THE METHODIST CHURCH IN  
CANADA.

Moved by Jos. Tait, seconded by Rev. W. F. Campbell, and

*Resolved*,—That this Conference, while expressing profound regret that the Dominion Government found it necessary to postpone consideration of the Plebiscite question during the present session of Parliament, trusts that not later than the early part of its next session the Government will proceed to fulfil its solemn pledge by introducing in Parliament a measure for submitting to the people the question, "Are you in favor of the total suppression of the Liquor Traffic?" and confidently expects that this question, when submitted, will not be rendered confusing by the addition of other questions in reference to modes of taxation or anything else. Adopted.

REPORT OF THE ENTERTAINMENT COMMITTEE.

Your Committee beg leave to report as follows: All has been done that lay within the power of your Committee to carry out the wise and mutually-helpful arrangements of last Conference for the entertainment of this Conference. Though our work has been impeded by some members of Conference, who neglected to send notification of their desire for a billet, either personally or through their financial secretaries, we record our gratitude to those faithful chairmen and financial secretaries who collected the fees, and forwarded the names of those on their districts desiring billets, and thus made it possible for us to supply every applicant. We should express our gratitude also to those members of Conference who directly remitted us their request and their fee.

Again, we are permitted to express full appreciation of and gratitude for the loyal hospitality of those members of city congregations who have so kindly opened their homes to the members of Conference.

While we deplore the fact that some members of Conference have ignored the equitable arrangement of last year, causing, in some cases, inconvenience or injustice to your Committee, or to kindly-intended hosts, we congratulate the Conference that the arrangement has been so largely observed, and recommend its continuance for next year as the fairest arrangement known to us. We would urge that a stronger emphasis be laid, where possible, by chairmen and financial secretaries upon the necessity and justice of those intending to attend Conference to pay the fee of one dollar, whether they be entertained freely in a friend's home or in one to be supplied by the Entertainment Committee.

Your Committee also beg leave to call the attention of Conference to

the fact that some of the members of Conference who paid the billet-fee, and whose names were received by the Secretary of the Billeting Committee, made private arrangements for staying in friends' homes without the knowledge of your Committee, which had billeted them elsewhere, thus inconveniencing our host's free home at the disposal of your Committee, forcing the Committee to send one more to board, and thus decreasing the Committee's funds. We would urge upon such members of Conference the necessity of advising the Secretary of the Billeting Committee of all private arrangements as to billets.

We recommend the surplus be paid to the Sustentation Fund.

*Resolved*,—That an Entertainment Committee be appointed, composed of three laymen from each of the Toronto districts, to be named by the President, and a corresponding number of ministers to be elected by the Methodist Preachers' Meeting, whose duty it shall be to billet the members of the Conference who request a billet; that each member of the Conference requesting a billet, or who may enjoy the privilege of a free home, whether provided by the Billeting Committee or not, excepting those entertaining delegates, be required to pay to the Financial Secretary at the May District Meeting, one dollar, who shall report to the Secretary of the Billeting Committee the names of those paying such amount, and of those who desire a billet. The Financial Secretary of each district shall pay over to the Treasurer of the Billeting Committee all such money received by him, and any balance of such fund left over after the payment of the necessary expenses of the Committee, shall be paid over to the Treasurer of the Sustentation Fund. Any delegate failing to notify the Financial Secretary at the District Meeting, shall notify the Secretary of the Billeting Committee one week before the opening of the Conference, and pay to him directly the billet fee, and all Chairmen of Districts are urged to see that these arrangements are carefully carried out.

#### REPORT OF STATISTICAL COMMITTEE.

Your Committee beg leave to report as follows :

There are at present in the Conference 157 ministers and 38 probationers in the active work of the ministry.

The total amount raised for Ministerial Support during the year was \$136,861.00. The amount of deficiencies was \$7,655.00.

There have been received on trial as members of the Church during the year 4,981, and by letter, 2,148, which after deducting removals from all causes leaves a net increase of 1,565.

The total present membership is 42,396. There have been during the year 2,258 baptisms, 1,118 marriages, 1,458 burials.

There have been raised for Circuit Purposes outside the support of the ministry \$213,038.75.

Your Committee regret to have to report a total decrease in Connexional Funds of \$575.24, though the report of this year contains one more fund than that of last year, namely, the General Epworth League Fund amounting to \$230.75.

There have been eight new churches dedicated during the year at a total cost of \$7,950.00.

There are 513 preaching appointments in the Conference and 428 Sabbath Schools. On an average, 28,168 persons attend these schools every Sunday. There has been raised for School Purposes \$23,950.71.

There are 288 young people's societies in the Conference with a total membership of 13,979. They have raised \$2,056.53 for missions, and for all purposes \$8,355.50.

Your Committee would call the attention of the Conference to the fact that great difficulty and confusion is caused in the prosecution of their work, because of the incomplete returns from circuits, a state of affairs limited to certain churches in this city, and would recommend that District Secretaries, particularly in these districts, be urged to complete their returns and close their books before the first session of the Statistical Committee.

## REPORTS OF COLLEGES.

## REPORT OF VICTORIA UNIVERSITY.

*To the President and members of the Toronto Conference.*

FATHERS AND BRETHREN,—I have much pleasure, on behalf of the Regents and Senate of your University, in submitting to you the following report of our work during the year just closing :

Our net enrolment of students has reached the number of 282, an increase of 29 on last year. This enrolment has been distributed as follows : Arts, 226 ; Theology, 158 ; less counted in both faculties, 102 ; net enrolment, 282. Of this number 34 are completing the B.A. course, and 24 have completed one of the three prescribed curricula in theology. Of these 13, or more than one-half, have already graduated, or are proceeding to graduation in Arts as well as in Theology. We are thus, we believe, securing to our rising ministry an intellectual training not inferior to that required by any other branch of the Christian Church in our country.

We are able also to report that the work of our theological school is extending itself quite beyond the training of candidates for our ministry. Probably nearly one-third of the students enrolled this year are not specifically preparing for that work. Quite a number are deaconesses seeking a thorough training in religious knowledge to prepare them for the work to which they have consecrated their lives. Others are young men, and even more largely young women, supplementing their Arts course by Biblical and other Christian studies which will fit them for the most intelligent Christian work in the days to come. These studies embrace the wide range of the English Bible, Biblical History, the Hebrew and Greek Scriptures, Church History, Christian Ethics, Apologetics and Theistic Philosophy. The selection of these studies is optional, so that no candidate for an Arts degree is forced to take them. But as a matter of fact, the greater part of our graduates in Arts pursue these studies for either one or both the years in which they are prescribed. In this way our curriculum under Federation is quite as distinctly marked by the impress of Christian teaching as it was when we formed it independently.

A marked feature of the religious side of student life during the past year has been the growth of the missionary spirit. Organized bands of young men have gone out through our young people's societies, and have organized them in connection with our own missionary work. In this way, we believe, not only is Methodism strengthened, but valuable energy and zeal are directed to the largest results which might otherwise be largely frittered away in mere individual efforts.

The important subject of a refined Christian home for our young women students has been taken up by an organization of Christian women, who will ask your sympathy and assistance in this important work, and this we are sure they will abundantly receive.

We will venture once more to ask your co-operation in directing all

our young people who are seeking a university education to our own college. There are still strong influences used to divert them in other directions. We have watched the course of those who have been so led, and have found that they are often diverted from the Church in which they first found spiritual life, or else decline in that life and step aside from their original Christian consecration. We feel certain we can offer them every advantage to be had in any other college in our country and combined with moral and religious influences which will make them strong in spiritual as well as intellectual life.

ALBERT COLLEGE.

*To the Toronto Conference of the Methodist Church.*

DEAR BROTHERS,—We are able to report another year of prosperity in connection with this institution. The health of the students has been exceptionally good; in fact, we have not had a single case of serious illness during the year, for which we are profoundly grateful.

One hundred and ninety students have been enrolled; all of the departments have been well attended, and the work has been conducted

with vigor and a good degree of satisfaction. The College still continues to have most gratifying success with its departmental and university candidates. There can be no question that the literary work of the College is unsurpassed by that of any collegiate institute in the Province. Of six candidates for Senior Leaving teachers' certificates, five have been successful. This year the Senior Leaving class numbers eight, and is the largest in the history of the College. At the Departmental examination in July last, 80 per cent. of the candidates for teachers' certificates were successful. We invite the attention of friends of the College to this record. You cannot err in sending your sons and daughters to Albert College for this work. The classes for Junior and Senior Matriculation still continue to be large. Candidates for the Methodist ministry receive special attention. The special examination in May will be continued.

The Departments of Music, Elocution, Fine Arts and Commercial Science have been well attended, and have been successful during the year. By frequently winning medals, prizes and distinctions in competition with other schools and colleges, these departments have taken a first place. The aim is to keep them thoroughly efficient and at the same time maintain moderate rates. It is doubtful if any college in Canada offers equal advantages with Albert College at equally low rates.

The new building, "Massey Hall," the gymnasium, and the improvements to the residence are the great pride and delight of the students and teachers. The College is now able to provide for the comfort and convenience of students as it has never before been able to do.

The students have been active in all religious work, both in the college and the city missions. Everywhere their zeal and devotion is spoken of. The missionary societies have been progressive and fully alive to every opportunity for good. There has been, as never before, an earnest and intelligent study on the part of many students, of that most vital doctrine, "holy living." A blessed and most hallowed influence has been present and manifest in all the work of the school. Albert College is doing a grand work for the Church of God, and for our beloved Methodism. We desire the active co-operation of the ministry and laity in extending its patronage, and thereby at the same time widening its influence for good.

### WESLEYAN THEOLOGICAL COLLEGE, MONTREAL.

*To the Annual Conferences of the Methodist Church.*

The undersigned respectfully submit the following brief report of last year's work and of the present position of the institution.

Number of students in Arts, full course, 10 (others as partial students take more or less work in McGill University); in Divinity leading to the Licentiate's Degree, 15; for the degree of B.D., 21; for the Conference Course, 18. Total enrolled, 64.

Rev. Principal Shaw, D.D., LL.D., lectures in Systematic Theology, Greek Testament and Church Polity; Rev. J. C. Antliff, M.A., (Edin.) D.D., in Apologetics and Homiletics; and Rev. Prof. Harris, M.A., B.D.,

Bursar, in Church History and English. Rev. Prof. Patton, B.D., having completed a Post-Graduate Course in Oriental Literature, in Leyden and Heidelberg, will resume his work in that department, as well as in Latin Patristics, next session.

The College is prepared to afford students facilities for meeting the Conference requirements in the new course for probationers or for pursuing the three years' course leading to licentiate's standing, or the University course in Arts in McGill, or the higher course in divinity leading to the degree of B.D. Copies of calendar containing full information as to curricula, etc., may be obtained from the registrar.

The Endowment Fund is now \$75,000, current expenditure about \$6,500, total debt on current account (only liability) is \$4,000. The boarding department covers its need with the income of about \$4,000. The need is urgent for enlargement of buildings, for increased accommodation in dormitories, lecture rooms and convocation hall.

The effort of the Rev. Prof. Harris, M.A., Bursar, to further increase the Endowment Fund, is being continued, and all its proceeds are sacredly placed in new investments. In the meantime the institution is conducted with rigid economy in finances, and with regard to thoroughness and efficiency in educational work.

#### ALMA COLLEGE, ST. THOMAS, ONT.

*To the Toronto Conference of the Methodist Church.*

DEAR FATHERS AND BRETHREN,—Alma College offers the annual greeting for the sixteenth year since its founding as a Methodist school for the higher education of young women. By the act of Union, 1884, the College came in as the property of the Methodist Church, and now is completely controlled by the General Conference of the Church.

Alma College, in the spirit of Wesley, makes the world its parish. Students from Alma are in mission work in Africa, China, Japan, India and America, and more are preparing to go. This interest in missions is but one manifestation of religious life. It is never forgotten that the greatest mission is the making of cultured Christian homes in our own land and the practising of Christian virtue everywhere. Alma College is Methodist, yet enjoys the high honor of having usually one-half its patronage from other churches. No denominational meddlesomeness interferes with the church preferences of its students; the aim is to foster a love of truth in whatever form held.

The College is a gift of the people to woman's education. In thousands of subscriptions, the largest not exceeding \$500, the people have given over \$63,000 to this enterprise. The Methodist Church has undertaken to



administer this generous liberality. Alma College is indeed the voice of the people, asking that the best facilities for woman's education be available equally to the daughter of the mansion and the daughter of the cottage. High scholarship, Christian kindness and social energy command the patronage of the wealthy, and low rates encourage the struggling to try to attain better things. It is therefore possible to bring in touch and sympathy in college life the best minds and purest hearts from all spheres of life. This was the high ideal of the founders of this College.

In founding this institution they had at first to depend on the small contributions of the many less wealthy, but the plea of Alma has touched the kind heart of one man of wealth, and is the beneficiary to the extent of \$10,000 in the princely benevolence of the late Hart A. Massey. And Alma expects that in answer to the faith and sacrifice of the people, other men of wealth will be moved to place at the disposal of the Church the means to enable Alma yet to realize the original intent, that the College buildings and equipment should be a free gift to the cause of woman's education. There is a sphere of education which the State cannot fill, and that is a residential school-life incorporating the idea of church, home, and school, blended in one organization. This sphere the Church must fill in order to permanency, and to the development of the generous liberality essential to so great a cause. The Protestant churches have a very plain duty in this most important matter. Alma College is fully on the line of the traditional policy of the Church declared in the Discipline to be: That in the best interests of the Church and of education we imperatively demand that our colleges and universities should be under the fostering care of the Church.

In reviewing the work of the College for the past year, we most gratefully record the goodness of God in His providential care of our students and teachers. No serious illness or contagious disease has visited us. While the number of our students and the receipts of the past year cannot be ranked among our best, it has its record of successful work and some encouraging features to record.

The total enrolment, 10 in excess of last year, is 134 students, of whom 91 have been resident, and 43 day pupils. This enrolment represents the Christian denominations as follows: Methodist 70, Presbyterian 27, Episcopalian 16, Baptist 12, Roman Catholic 7, Congregational 2.

Twenty students have been enrolled from the neighboring Republic.

The class preparing for graduation this year numbers thirteen, representing all departments.

The work of soliciting subscriptions has been greatly hindered by the financial stringency of the times, yet additions have been made to the subscription list, and very encouraging pledges of financial aid have been given by men of wealth.

The school is in a condition for effective work in all its departments, and is unsurpassed in its arrangements for the comfort, convenience, progress and health of its students. We are persuaded that no school in the Dominion can offer better advantages in the way of a liberal education for young women.

A rearrangement of the loan upon the college property has been effected at a lower rate of interest, resulting in an annual saving of nearly \$400.

The Board is using most careful economy in order to the reduction of the debt, but must carefully guard at the same time the comfort of the students and the efficiency of the school.

We would most respectfully urge the members of the Conference, lay and clerical, to aid the work of the school by personal interest and co-operation. By sending us timely information concerning prospective students, by bringing the claims of our Methodist institutions frequently before the people, and in a variety of other ways, ministers and laymen can greatly aid the College.

In conclusion, we beg to thank the Conference for excellent appointments made in preceding years to our Board of Management, and to ask that a Conference representative be selected for the current year.

For many years it has been our aim as Directors to provide the highest educational facilities, and the most comfortable and culturing surroundings.

The financial aid recently furnished by the friends of the College has enabled us to realize our ideal in buildings and equipment, and has given a wonderful stimulus to all departments of our college work. The Lieutenant-Governor of Ontario, when visiting our College at commencement, was delighted with what he saw, and said that the most effective way of advertising, so far as our College was concerned, was to have the people of this country come and see it for themselves, and go forth intelligent as well as enthusiastic advocates of its real merit. Stronger language than we would like to use in this report is being used almost every day by visitors, to express their appreciation of the beautiful and extensive buildings, the chaste and elegant appointments, and the magnificent equipment for first-class educational work. It should be, and undoubtedly is, a source of pride and pleasure to the Methodist Church to have under its control such a grand college property with its ever-increasing possibilities for good.

We are deeply grateful to the friends of higher education who have aided us in our scheme of extension and improvement; and we sincerely hope that others in the near future may be disposed to give us still more extended aid.

received from Chancellor Burwash, of Victoria University, and President Loudon, of Toronto University.

Dr. Burwash says:

"I have pleasure in stating that no less than nine students have entered Victoria and Toronto universities from the Ontario Ladies' College, Whitby. The majority of these have taken the first two years of their university work at Whitby, coming up for their examinations to Toronto, and passing with credit. Three of these have already graduated with honors, and are a credit to the Ontario Ladies' College. Four others are at present doing excellent work as undergraduates in the University, and two others have been transferred to another Canadian university in the city where their parents reside. Any college carrying students up to university studies, and placing them in a position to obtain advanced standing at the University examinations, deserves great praise, and should receive every possible encouragement in its important work."

President Loudon says:

"When visiting your College in June last year for the first time, I was agreeably surprised at the extent and excellence of your building and equipment, which should, I think, afford every accommodation for physical comfort and health of students. I have observed also with pleasure the creditable stand taken at the University examinations during the past few years by several students who had prepared the work of the first and second years of the Arts course in the Ontario Ladies' College. Without entering into detail, I may say that these candidates have mostly taken honor standing in modern languages, and that their success affords testimony to the efficiency of the instruction imparted by your staff."

It is due our College to draw the attention of this Conference to the fact that no other ladies' college in Canada has been able to make a similar University record.

Our Conservatory of Music affords the best facilities for the study of piano, pipe organ, violin, guitar, voice-culture and harmony. No expense has been spared in providing concert-grand pianos, comfortable practice rooms, etc.; but the most important improvement is a large two-manual pipe organ, recently erected in the new concert hall. This organ has been specially designed to meet the wants of students desirous of fitting themselves to become church organists. Considering the great demand at the present day for competent lady organists, and the difficulty usually experienced in obtaining practice on a suitable instrument in a well-warmed hall, we take pleasure in referring to our superior facilities for organ practice, and trust that they may prove advantageous to many an aspiring student.

Time will not permit us to refer specially in this report to the Fine Art, Elocution, Commercial and Domestic Economy departments, except to state that they are just as thorough and efficient as the departments that have been referred to. Thanking the members of this Conference for the kind co-operation and support in the past, and trusting to prove worthy of the same in the future, we commend our College to the favorable consideration of all.

*Resolved*,—That we hereby assure these honored brethren of our very best wishes for their continued success and happiness. We pray that their lives may be long spared to their families and to the Church, and that in their new fields of labor they may be permitted to witness great spiritual and financial prosperity.

Carried.

Moved by Rev. M. L. Pearson, seconded by Rev. Dr. Potts, that the Conference rejoices in the progress of Albert College, as just presented by its esteemed principal, the Rev. Dr. Dyer. We regard Albert College as one of the most important of the educational institutions under the direction of our Church, and we pledge ourselves to do all in our power to maintain it in strength and prosperity.

## OBITUARIES.

### THOMAS HARVEY ELLIS

Was born on September 16th, 1866, in Colborne township, Huron County, Ontario. Having been blessed with godly parents he was, from early childhood, under religious influences. When about twenty years of age he was soundly converted to God on the Haldane Hill Mission during a revival conducted by Miss Dimsdale (now Mrs. Aikenhead). No sooner had he experienced the love of God in his own heart than he sought to lead others into the same blessed experience. He was in a short time licensed as a local preacher by Rev. H. S. Matthews, then chairman of the Bracebridge District. In 1890 he was sent as a chairman's supply to Rosseau. At the following Conference he was received on trial as a probationer for the ministry, and for three years labored on the following fields: Dufferin, Starratt and Mono Road. Upon all these fields there are many witnesses who, with his several superintendents and chairmen, are glad to testify to his loyalty to truth and holy zeal for the cause of God. In October, 1894, he entered Victoria University, where he remained until seized by his last illness. Brother Ellis was a man whom to really know was to love. His was one of those deep, true natures that are properly appreciated only by those who are brought into intimate relationship with them. Only such could estimate him at his real worth. Being of humble parentage, and having had few educational or other advantages, the call to preach the Gospel found him surrounded on every side by difficulties that would have discouraged many a man. He, however, seemed to hear only the call of the Master, and with the most implicit trust in his God toiled on quietly and unceasingly, surmounting one obstacle after another until the longed-for goal of ordination was all but reached when death intervened. As a preacher, our late brother was earnest, practical and faithful. While not brilliant, his words gained from his quiet and consistent life and intimate communion with God an unction and power that made the message peculiarly effective.

As a pastor he was kind and sympathetic, and in him the sorrowing and the penitent always found a friend. As a college boy his manliness won the love and esteem of all his fellows. In fact, in every sphere he constantly exemplified the beauty of a Christian character and the consistency of a life hid with Christ in God.

His sudden death was a sad surprise to all. Toward the close of his second year at college he contracted a severe cold which compelled him to desist and seek rest, he hoping to be ready for work in July. But, alas, the deadly consumption had laid hold on his not too strong constitution, and in a few weeks he was gone. He died on June 17th, 1896, just as the Conference was closing at which he had expected to be received into full connection and ordained. His death was a glorious and triumphant one. His dying testimony leaves no room for doubt. "Tell the boys," said he, "that the anchor holds." Though cut down in the flower of his youth, the influence of his consecrated life lives on, and though dead still speaks to us, calling us to a fuller consecration and a more devoted life.

## HENRY HARRIS.

Brother Harris was born in the city of York, England, October 17th, 1831, and died at Toronto, November 7th, 1896. When he was a boy of ten years the family emigrated to the United States and settled at Janesville, Wisconsin, where he spent the next ten years; and there, through the instrumentality of the Primitive Methodists, he was brought to God and entered upon a godly and useful life. When he was twenty years of age he returned to England, and in his native city connected himself with the Church, which had been instrumental in his conversion; and usefully engaged, as he had opportunity, in Christian work.

In 1857 he entered upon his probation for the ministry, and in 1862 he was ordained. His circuits in England were Bradford, Wakefield, Leeds and Colne. In this country his fields of labor were Toronto, Aurora, Guelph, Orillia, Kingston, Don Mills. In all these fields his labors were crowned with success in promoting both the temporal and spiritual interests of the Church. He was a faithful preacher of the word, shunning not to declare the whole counsel of God, and determining to know nothing among men but Jesus Christ and Him crucified. His brethren evinced their appreciation of his character and abilities by appointing him to the highest positions in the gift of his Conference. He served them both as Secretary and as President, and for six years he discharged the duties of Missionary Secretary and Book Steward.

Brother Harris' musical ability added greatly to the effectiveness of his ministry. He knew how to sing the gospel, as well as to preach it; and not a few, it is believed, were brought to God by his singing, while the spiritual life and zeal of the people to whom he ministered were promoted by the same means. His social qualities, too, were of such a nature as to greatly endear him to those who had the privilege of enjoying his friendship. He is remembered by all such as a large-hearted, generous and true friend. He was a good pastor, faithful especially in caring for the poor and suffering members of those entrusted to his oversight. The last eight years of his life were spent in retirement from the active duties of pastoral work, and during seven years of that time he was a great sufferer; but he was divinely sustained and comforted in his affliction, and enabled to triumph in the hour and article of death. His end was peace, and his memory is like precious ointment poured forth.

## J. W. SAVAGE.

Brother Savage was born in Yorkshire, England, in 1829. He was a Methodist of the third generation, and his father was a devoted minister of the Gospel. He attended the old Woodhouse Grove Academy which was started in the time of John Wesley for the sons of Wesleyan ministers. He thought of studying medicine, but his conversion turned the current of his life, and, fired with missionary zeal, he thought of offering himself for work in China. Providence opened his way in another direction, and with his brother William, who survives him, he came to Canada and entered the ministry here in 1854. He was stationed at

the following, among other places: London, Prince Albert, Uxbridge, Orangeville, Stirling, Aurora, Bond Head. The last circuit on which he travelled was Columbus; and it was during his pastorate there that he received the paralytic stroke from which he never fully recovered. Several weeks of successful revival services, a short time before this occurred, had severely tried his strength; but he seemed to be still quite able to proceed with his work until the blow came. He had announced his text (James iii. 17), and was proceeding with his sermon when his strength failed, and it became evident that, so far as the pulpit was concerned, his work was done.

After forty-one years of faithful service he retired from the active work in 1895. He resided in Toronto, but while on a visit to Peterboro' he was stricken with his fatal illness. The glorious reality of the Gospel was truly tested and found supremely satisfactory in his life and closing days. In dream and waking moments visions of the Saviour were afforded him that caused him to say, "Glory! Glory!" Power of speech failed for more than a week before he died, but by suggestive signs and exultant expression he showed his trust in Christ. He died on Monday, March 8th, and a funeral service was held in Wesley Church, Toronto, on Wednesday, which was attended by many of his ministerial brethren. Rev. Dr. Sutherland gave a tender and appreciative address in which he bore testimony to his guilelessness of character and nobility of soul. He spoke of him as "one who was willing to take any work assigned to him with singleness of purpose, as serving the Lord, never striving for the more important positions. He ever esteemed it the greatest privilege and the highest honor to earnestly preach the glorious gospel, and strove, not so much to make his preaching eloquent, as effective in the salvation of souls; rightly judging that this is the only result that can be viewed with satisfaction in the last hour."

The evangelistic spirit was very strong in Bro. Savage, and by song, sermon and social converse he won many souls for Christ. Nothing but the salvation of souls would satisfy him, and in this the mantle of his departed father seemed to rest upon him, for during his father's ministry he seldom saw less than three hundred souls saved in each year. Bro. Savage was studiously observant of the private duties of the Christian life—reading the Word, prayer and meditation. To the last of his life he scrupulously kept up the old Methodist custom of observing the Quarterly Friday fast.

Bro. Savage was a racy writer of both prose and poetry, and at the time of his death he was engaged in preparing an historical work for the press. But these literary labors were but the recreations of a life which was, with singular concentration, devoted to the one work of soul-saving. For this, and the success achieved in it, he deserves best, as it would be his greatest desire, to be remembered. By the mercy of God he was enabled to turn many to righteousness, and on this account he shall shine as the stars for ever and ever. He rests from his labors, but his works do follow him. Now he has gone to his abundant reward.

## PASTORAL ADDRESS

OF THE TORONTO CONFERENCE OF THE METHODIST  
CHURCH TO THE CHURCHES UNDER ITS CARE.

BELOVED BRETHREN,—Assembled again in our Annual Conference we rejoice in the privilege of sending you our word of Christian greeting. From the depths of our hearts we hail you with the salutation, "Grace be unto you, and peace from God our Father, and from the Lord Jesus Christ."

With devout thanksgiving to God, we have reviewed the labors of another year. We rejoice that it has been a year of spiritual growth, and one of large numerical increase throughout our beloved Methodism. We rejoice that this increase of about five thousand members has been by methods which promise permanent results. We pray that the past record of Methodism in seeking the lost may spur to still larger effort. Methodism was designed to be the church of the people, and we therefore rejoice in the perpetuation of the spirit of evangelism throughout the Conferences.

While the tendencies in some directions have been marked by broadness, without corresponding spiritual depth, we rejoice that we have not suffered as a church from that superficial spiritual life which goes with a mere literary theology. We need not remind you that the attempt to solve spiritual problems by purely rational methods has failed, and that throughout the world there is a visible return to Christ as the only Saviour from sin, whether individual, corporate or social. To reach the evils of our day, therefore, we need no new medicine. We believe that the Gospel of Jesus Christ, thoroughly expounded, brought to date and applied, will cure all the sorrows resulting from spiritual and moral impotence. We have noted that all experiments which stop short of conviction for sin have failed, and that with depth of conviction there should go a corresponding breadth—conviction broad enough to reach the moral sense of the community on the social sins of intemperance, Sabbath desecration, unkind business methods, municipal and political corruption, and all kinds of economic unrighteousness.

We rejoice that the stringency of the times has not caused our people to adopt that false economy which begins by withholding the Lord's money. While we are pleased to note liberality in some quarters, we must also take notice of the fact that our liabilities have also increased. Our missionary and educational work were never more potent for good, and can especially bear an advance in financial support during the current year.

Our attention is especially directed to our Epworth League work, in view of the great Convention to assemble in Toronto, representing the Methodism of the entire continent. We rejoice in the quickening of the missionary spirit among the young people of our Epworth Leagues, and believe that a magnificent field may be cultivated by them. Our young people will easily see that we can be strong in this missionary field by remembering that we are a connection, and that our missionary success will depend on keeping out the spirit of localism, and working from the broad standpoint of Methodism as a whole. It will be wise, therefore, for Epworth Leaguers to make their plans under the direction of the Missionary Board and Secretaries appointed by General Conference to guide in this department. While we rejoice in the forward movement among our young people, we would remind you that it can only continue to be a forward movement by keeping up the devotional and spiritual atmosphere in our homes. Our safety and progress depend on Christian homes. The home is not entirely Christian without family prayer. Byron, in bitterness of soul, traced his moral deformity to the polluted atmosphere of his childhood home in the words, "And thus untaught in youth my heart to tame, my springs of joy were poisoned."

Archdeacon Farrar, on the other hand, attributes his useful career to the life and example of a saintly mother, endorsing the words of the late poet-laureate:

"Happy he,  
With such a mother! faith in womankind  
Beats with his blood, and trust in all things high,  
Comes easy to him."

It is also true of our Sabbath School work, that no equipment of Sunday School can take the place of careful, systematic religious training at home. The Sunday School is a supplement, not a substitute for the Christian home. Neither is our Sunday School for little children, but as far as possible for the adults of the whole congregation. Our aim is, "the church in the school and the school in the church."

Concerning our reaching and saving the masses, great as is the work which is done by special evangelists, these cannot accomplish this great task. Neither can the ministry alone accomplish this work. It can only be done by all the individuals of the churches taking some definite personal share of the toil. There is no short-cut to success in this work. Let every church throughout the Conference be the active centre of a forward movement this year, by having every boarding-house, every tenement house, and every building which shelters humanity visited systematically by Christian people of tact and of moral and spiritual purpose. Let the work be done without noise and ostentation, and let the personal salvation of every home visited be the goal of our efforts. If we do this in our own way, and with the baptism of the Holy Ghost, the problem of reaching the masses will be solved by simply going out after them.

We need not remind you that Methodism is the uncompromising foe of intemperance. In fighting it let us do it in that temperate, yet determined spirit, which in the past has been the secret of permanent success. Our work will be to keep on creating and stimulating a strong prohibi-

tion sentiment; and to do our part towards keeping this question of Prohibition well to the front, both in the Provincial and Dominion Parliaments.

To avoid superficiality in our religious experience, we commend to your attention the means provided by the Church for meditation, prayer and self-examination. Of these we would specially commend the week-night prayer-meeting, and weekly class-meeting. We have noticed that a deepening of the spiritual life of the Church depends largely on faithfulness to these means of grace. We would earnestly commend our people and officials who are carrying heavy financial responsibility to begin the discharge of these responsibilities by first deepening the spiritual life of the Church, and it will be found that as this life deepens the Lord's money will come in abundance.

And now, beloved, the toils and duties of another year are upon us. Let us seek the Holy Ghost to so vitalize us with Pentecostal power, that we may do the duty next us so faithfully that when we assemble next Conference we may again say, "The best of all is, God is with us."
