FIRE PROTECTION.

He then stated that there should be fewer fires in Nova Sootia and in Canada, and there can be a gigantic reduction in losees if proper means are taken to pre-vent conflagrations, such as prevail in European countries, where fires are almost unknown.

The means premium paid for fire protection are a tremendous tax which that the intense premiums paid for fire protection are a tremendous tax which the people. Mr. Wentworth said in Germany such a thing as a fire is almost unknown, and when it does occur it is a matter of great interest. In Americas a big blaze costing thousands is so commonplace that it only gets a paragraph in the newspapers. No fire takes place in Germany where the owner and occupier of the house is not called on for an explanation, and further, if it is due to carcleseness and extends beyond hie uwn building, he must pay the damage, and besides is fined for endangering the uwn building, he must pay the damage, and besides is fined for endangering the well-being of the community. 

The new King chosen by the people of Albania, to whom the Balkan was has given freedom, is the Duke of Montpensier, a young man of 28, who has won fame both as a soldier and an employ. He is the enly brother of the royalist party in France, and is immensely wealthy. Being an earlie from France, on account of the pre-tension of the Duke of Orleans to the throne of France, he has been denied service in the French army; but he has made up for this by explorations in the hinterland of Tonking and Coohin, China. He also served with distinction under the Spanish flag against the Moors.

Montpensier conces from his mother who was a Spanish Infants, the daughter of the Duke of Montpensier. His father, from whom he inherits his ample fortune, was the Comte de Paris. His sister married the Duke of Aosta, cousin of King Victor Emmanuel, of Italy.

The country which has now set up a government of its own was, at the beginning of the Balkan war, a vilayet of Turkey in Europe. Not long after the war started, however, finding its self harassed on one side by the Butgarians, on another by the Greeks and on another by the Bervians, it appealed to the great powers for protection and proclaimed a provisional government. Montpensier comes from his mo

overnment.

Keamil Bey became President of Keamil Bey became President of the new Government provisionally until the Albanians should have complied with the decree of the ambassadors of the great powers resulting from the peace conference in London, which decree said that Albania should not be partitioned among the Balkan states, but that it should be ruled over by a prince of some royal house of Europe and supervised by the powers.



THE SCHOOL GARDEN. Ontario Is Making Big Strides

The problem of teaching agricul in the public schools of Ontario just about as old as the public sch just about as old as the public schools themselves. Sixty-five years ago, we are told, when the first Normal School for the training of teachers was established, arrangements were made for a regular course of lectures on agricultural chemistry. Following the chronology of this subject down the years we find a series of text-books, regulations and amendments to regulations, but very little in the way of practical agricultural teaching as a result.

Finally came the School Garden idea; instead of dealing with agriculture as a book subject—in which case too often the relationship of the subject to the outside world may largely be forgotten and the energies of the student focused upon the memorization of facts and formulae—instead of dealing with mere abstract facts, the boy comes into contact with living things. Not the least—indeed is that the greatest—point about this school gardening is the experimental plot which is in charge of the individual pupil, and in which he endeavors to grow the best grain or the largest vegetables or the most beautiful flowers. In too many phases of school life it is so difficult to cultivate the individuality of the child.

vate the individuality of the child. Here, however, is work which will develop the personal observation and personal resources of the little experimentalist.

In 1907, the Ontario Government made provision for special grants to schools carrying on school gardening, but although the province has 6,000 rural schools only 16 of these qualified for the school garden grant by 1910. An idea always needs a man at the back of it to hend his energies to its development. Therefore, it was well for the propagation of this idea that the Government saw fit to appoint a Director of Elementary Education in the person of Prof. S. B. McCready. Under the oversight of the active and enthusiastic Director, the work was systematized and rapidly extended. The experimental side of School Garden work has been strengthened by co-operation with the Experimental Union, an organization formed in 1879 and composed of standents, extendents and teachers of the Agricultural College. ducts annually numerous and varied experiments dealing with farm crops, fertilizers, poultry, fruits, vegetables and forestry. In the Schools' Division of this union, schools are supplied with flower and vegetable seeds; the seeds of farm crops, tree seeds, vines, bulbs, shrubs and tree seedlings as well as instruction sheets, booklets on gardening, Government publications, and instruction sheets for the other material.

The seeds and other material supplied for planting may be used in the school garden plots, or the children may conduct experiments in gardens of their own at their homes.
