One-half a Million of Dollars for Postage. George Stinson & Co., the calculating Art Publishers, of Portland, Maine, undoubtedly pay more money for postage stamps than any other firm in the world. For the last five years, their postage bill has averaged over two thousand dollars per week, making a grand aggregate of five hundred and twenty thousand dollars; this is about the three-hundredth part of all postage of every description collected by the United States Government during that time, and in this connection it may be borne in mind that the country now has over fifty million souls, and fifty thousand post-offices.

The two Temperance Acts. Those of our temperance friends who have the reputation of being very powerful Act sometimes express the discouraging experience of the past three years with the hope that the new Liquor License Act, by providing inspectors specially charged with the duty of enforcing the Ontario Temperance Act, will render that law more effective. They also argue that the Liquor License Act should not be adopted because its validity is disputed and must be settled by the Courts before the Act will be efficient. The two ideas are somewhat inconsistent and it may be well to mention the fact in order to prevent misapprehension. If the Liquor License Act is unconstitutional there can be no Commissioner or Inspector clothed by it with authority to prosecute offenders against the Scott Act, because the whole Act must fall if the grounds on which its validity is challenged be sustained. This fact, which we presume needs only to be stated to be accepted, will show that it is hardly sound to argue that the Scott Act should be maintained because the Liquor License Act may be unconstitutional. Further, it is worthy of mention and consideration that other sections of the Liquor License Act, besides those relating to the duties of inspectors, are so connected with the Scott Act that any attempt to operate the latter will inevitably raise the question of the validity of the former. This, at least, is our opinion and, if correct, it is a strong reason why there is no force in the argument that we ought to retain the Scott Act because the acceptance of the other will involve the settlement through the courts of its validity. It seems evident to us that we shall

Over-Valuation. If further argument against the present high protective policy of our tariff laws were necessary it is found in the special report of the chief of the special agents of the custom service just transmitted to the Secretary of the Treasury. In his annual report Special Agent Martin is charged that the undervaluation of invoices was of common occurrence, and that by this means importers defrauded the Government of many thousands of dollars annually. This statement is denied by several importers, and to substantiate his charge he prepared this supplementary report, which shows that it is the custom among European merchants to undervalue their goods in some cases as much as 80 per cent. in order to avoid the duty imposed on them on this side. This system of undervaluation was carried on through the firm composed of European exporters and American importers, and is carried to the greatest lengths by dealers in silks, gloves, aniline dyes and carpet wools, but is not confined to the "low" lines alone, valvets, ribbons, lace, muslins, other articles of like kind being included in the list. Martin's report does not deal in generalities, but on the contrary, gives the names of about 75 firms against whose charges of undervaluation can be proven. To such an extent have merchants taken to this art that an expert engaged to assist the consul in Switzerland assigned rather than make a report against manufacturers who were his friends. N.
