BUSY DAY AT POLICE COURT. Three Boys on the List of Drunks. Not Enough of Evidence to Convict Sender of False Alarm—Littlejohn Case Postponed.

His Honor Police Magistrate Ritchie had a busy time this morning and disposed of a variety of cases. The batch that reposed on the bench when he entered the room consisted of two lads, Edward Riley and Edward Kee, arrested by Officer Perry for being drunk. The arrest was made shortly after midnight. Both presented a very youthful appearance. The other incumbent was James Littlejohn who was found lying drunk in an alley off Dock street.

James admitted the charge, also the fact that it was only the day before that he was relieved of two months' duty with the Rock Candy Mine crew. In addition to a lecture, he was fined \$5 or two months "with the hardest labor possible."

The lads were then called to the front and questioned as to where they got the liquor, but little information could be had. At this juncture, Riley's mother appeared in court. She walked up to the rail in an excited manner and, shaking her clenched hand at the boy, said "This is where you are, is it?" and then walked out.

His honor called attention to the harrowing circumstances and reminded Riley that it was but a short time ago that his brother had been before him and was now in the lunatic asylum. The boys were allowed to sit down for a time, and later were fined two dollars each. The money was paid.

The man named Clark, who the other day was fined \$20 or two months for using abusive language to Mrs. Craft, of the West Side, was brought into court. His honor explained that his man, who was a very respectable young man, had pleaded for his release, and under the circumstances he was fined \$10 or two months.

RUSSIANS DEFEATED AGAIN IN MANCHURIA.

Lose One Hundred Men Attempting to Check Japanese Advance.

Russian Government, Preparing for the Worst, is Greatly Strengthening the Fortifications Around Saint Petersburg.

ST. PETERSBURG, June 10.—The Russian force at Salmatal was decimated by Gen. Erhoff, who engaged the Japanese advance at 9 a. m. on June 7th. The Russian infantry advanced steadily, pushing the Japanese from their position, but their attack gradually developed into a series of Russian fighting themselves in the presence of an overwhelming force, retired in good order. Their losses were three officers and about one hundred men killed and wounded. Russian observers think the Japanese lost more. The fighting continued until 3 p. m. Japanese are reported as attempting a debarkation north of Sen Yuchen from transports protected by two warships.

Artillerymen who took part in the fighting at Samsonoff, June 3, say that the Japanese artillery was decidedly poor, many shells did not burst and the shrapnel was badly timed. They therefore think that the Japanese artillery is not so terrible as has been reported. The Japanese had marked measured ranges in front of their entrenchments.

BOTH SIDES REINFORCED. LIAO YANG, June 9.—(By the Russian headquarters) Gen. Kurtopkin is expecting reinforcements, which as soon as they arrive, will advance toward the Japanese. Persistent reports are in circulation of a battle at Port Arthur, which has not yet occurred.

CHEE FOO, June 10.—(Noon)—Chinese who have arrived here from Taku Shan say that the Japanese army of twenty thousand men, who landed at Taku Shan last month and proceeded toward Peng Wang Cheng, presumably to reinforce Gen. Kurtopkin, returned to Taku Shan, May 28. The Chinese believed that the Japanese had been defeated. It is regarded here as more likely that the advance toward Peng Wang Cheng and return to Taku Shan was simply a Japanese feint. The Chinese further report that a small body of bandits attacked the Japanese officers who had been court-martialed for diverting funds given them to pay Chinese for transport wagons.

PORTIFYING ST. PETERSBURG. ST. PETERSBURG, June 10, 1 p. m.—Remote as now appears the chance that the Japanese fleet will be in a position to venture up the Baltic and make a demonstration against the Russian capital, or that a European power will take three large cases to hold it.

Nicholas de Ladygavsky, the imperial Russian consul general, said: "I cannot tell you until the gift is unveiled its precise value. The presentation will not take place before next Monday."

CAPE MAY CUP GOES BACK. King Edward Surrenders It Rather Than Race the Ingomar with the Old Britannia.

LONDON, June 10.—The Cape May cup returned to its original home on board the American line steamer St. Louis, sailing from Southampton tomorrow. The cup was obtained by King Edward, and it is now consigned to the New York Yacht Club. The condition of the cup requires that it must be defended by the latest winner.

FIRE AT ST. ANDREWS. (Special to the Star.) ST. ANDREWS, June 10.—The fire companies were called out today at 11.30 a. m. The fire was in the house owned by T. O'Dell and was occupied by Theobald Rooney. After a shift fight of nearly an hour the fire was extinguished. The fire caught on the second floor, over the kitchen, and the interior of the house was badly damaged by fire and water. The loss on the house is covered by insurance. Most of the furniture was got out of a damaged condition.

RUSSIAN MINISTER KILLED. BERNE, Switzerland, June 9.—The Russian minister here, M. V. Jassovskii, was shot in a street here this afternoon and seriously injured in the head. He would be assassinated was a fore-sigher. His identity has not been ascertained.

Officer John Collins, of the Union Depot, received a letter this morning from Mrs. Carry A. Nation addressed in his care and marked "important." According to the post mark the letter comes from St. Stephen. There must be something in the wind when Carry and the law go hand in hand.

DIED OF FRIGHT ON GALLOWS.

How Quebec Murderer Escaped the Hangman His Heart Broke as Drop Fell and Death Came Before the Noose Tightened.

(Special to the Star.) ST. SCHOLASTIQUE, Que., June 10.—Theophile Belanger was hanged this morning for the murder of his brother-in-law, Antoine Seguin, of St. Eustache on February 12, 1903. Belanger went calmly to the scaffold and before mounting the steps said he was prepared to die.

The condemned man was a well-to-do farmer. Trouble had been brewing between him and victim for a long time over a board bill. The old trouble reached a climax a year and a half ago when Belanger attempted to force his brother-in-law to leave. His discovery that a life lease stood in the way evidently impelled him to shed human blood.

According to his confession he shot Seguin as he was entering his own barn. Nobody saw the act or heard the shot, but suspicion pointed to Belanger. A painful episode of the case was the prisoner's declaration after his arrest that he shot Seguin because the latter had dishonored Belanger's grown-up daughter. The story was afterwards declared untrue by the accused.

TO BEARD THE BANDITS. Spanish Minister in Morocco Sends His Son to Rescue American and English Prisoners.

PARIS, June 10.—The foreign office has received lengthy advices from the French minister at Tangier, says Mohammed el Torres, the Spanish representative at Tangier, has chosen his own son, who bears the same name as his father, to proceed to the mountain retreat of Raisul, the bandit chief, and present the final terms to secure the release of Messrs. Pedericaris and Varley. The son already has departed on his mission. The journey will take a day or two. The officials expect a successful outcome.
