## BRITISH HNE NOOLESSONTOBE IISOUHRREC SNKY CHURCHILL

Losses Have Been Heary, but Allies Have Infficted Heavier, and Have Gained More than Million Men in Consequence of German Offensive Moral Effects of Attack All on Entente Side.

London, April 23.-More than one miltion soldthers in addition to those who would otherwise be in the field against Germany, have been gained by the Allies in consequence of
the German offensive, Winston Spencer Churchill, Minister of Munitions, said today in an address to the American labor delegation which is visiting England.

- So far as moral effects are concerned," he said, "all tha crease in the closer consolidation of the forces fightin against them. By their attack they have called into the field soldiers additional to those who would otherwise have been there.
