Addington Agricultural Society.

Extracts from the Fifth Annual Report.

The Board of the Addington Agricultural Society, in making their Fifth Annual Report, beg to submit an account of the Receipts and Expenditure for the past year, showing a very favorable state of the business of the Society, with a balance on hand of \$563.09.

With the view of purchasing a few grade bulls, the Board delegated Messrs. Dawson and Murray, in Dec. last, to visit the neighboring agricultural societies for that purpose, and after making inspection of such animals as were offered for sale, reported that no satisfactory stock of the kind required could be met with. Whereupon the Board directed your Secretary to enquire as to the practicability of purchasing a few grade Durham Bulls as required outside the County, and after considerable correspondence with prominent stock farmers in New Brunswick and the Province of Quebec, the Board came to the determination of abandoning the subject of purchasing grade stock for that purpose.

A change of seed grain being desired by our farmers, the Board ordered the importation of a quantity of Black Oats from P. E. Island, White Oats and Hay seeds from Montreal, Lost Nation Wheat from W. Montgomery, Eastern, from him in Dalhousie, and White Russian Wheat from M. Patterson, grown by him at Campbellton. These two samples of local grown Wheat were of a superior kind. All these seeds were readily disposed of at cost and charges to members, and generally distributed; the gross amount of sales has been realized with the exception of a small sum which is in course of collection, thereby doing a large amount of benefit to members of your Society without impairing the funds.

Mr. Vice-President J. Mair, by appointment of the Board, attended the Provincial Sale, at St. John, of imported sheep, and purchased on account of the Society, three Border Leicester Rams and one Cumberland Sow, which after being duly advertised were sold at auction at Campbellton, payable 1st Sept. next year. They realized satisfactory prices, falling to purchasers in three different parts of our district, say to Mr. Patterson, Campbellton, Messrs. A. & R. Ferguson, Athol House, Tide Head, and to Mr. J. Dawson, Upsalquitch, thus distributing them in such way that future flocks may be benefited by the introduction of these valuable animals. Account sales annexed.

The Society held the Annual Cattle Show, first at Campbellton on the 12th Oct., where 98 exhibits were entered, at Flat Lands on the following day where 82 animals were exhibited, and prizes awarded to successful competitors. Receipts annexed.

Quite a number of people assembled at both places, and evinced much interest in the welfare of the Society. It is proper to observe that a praiseworthy rivalry was manifested by our farmers at both these exhibitions in competing for prizes, and we have reason to believe that much good will result in the introduction of imported pure stock. The Board, without drawing invidious distinctions, beg to remark favorably of the stock on exhibition at Flat Lands Show, and particularly to make mention of a bull calf of Mr. Nathan Moores, and a heifer calf of Mr. J. McL. Fraser, which without exception were the best and largest animals of their kind ever exhibited at any show of your society, and reflects much to the credit of these gentlemen, and the Board trust they will continue their exertions in this line as an example to their neighbors of what may be done—by care and keep—in rearing stock.

The past season for farming commenced favorably, the work of planting and sowing progressed well with little loss of time from unfavorable weather. Extreme dry and warm weather set in, however, in June and July, and continued till about the second week of August, materially retarding vegetation of all kinds, when unprecedented heavy rain storms commenced, and with little intermission continued till the last week of that month. Early cut grass was injured in being saved, but later harvesting of hay proved more favorable—the yield however was under the average. Oats and Barley, which promised well in the early part of the season, in many cases lodged from excessive rain, and were cut in a green state for fodder—later sown matured better; the yield from both the P. E. Island and Quebec Oats proved satisfactory to parties that purchased these seeds from your Society. The crops from both samples of seed Wheat supplied by your Society in some instances were not successful, some from rust and excessive rain, others are reported satisfactory, and the yield under the average; the same may be reported as to Buckwheat.

October—the month for gathering root crops—was variable in the extreme, occasional fine days, followed by heavy rains, boisterous winds, hard frost, and snow, causing much labor, and no small risk from frost in gathering them. Some fields of potatoes were injured from blight setting in early, yielding small tubers—in others the fibres grew to excess—the yield may be considered below the average.

The market demand was good, and high prices realized which in some measure remunerated the farmer for the deficiency in quantity.

On the whole farmers have much reason to be grateful to the Father of mercies from whom cometh down every good and perfect gift, and that by His blessing on the labors of the husbandman our fields have been made to yield sufficient for the wants of man and beast. Keep us ever mindful of our dependence on Thee. Increase our trust in Thee.

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Kent Municipal Council.

On Tuesday, January 10th, at 2 o'clock P. M., the Secretary, George V. McNamee, as chairman pro tempore, called the meeting to order, and read the names of the following as Councilors elected for the ensuing year:—

Carlton—Patrick Flanagan and James P. Cate. Acedville—Urban Johnson and Clement Daigle. Richibucto—William Wheten and John Frank Richard. Wellford—Charles V. Walker and Anthony Roach. Harcourt—Andrew Dunn and Edward B. Burdick. Wellington—Patrick Grattan and Daniel P. Gallant. St. Mary's—Daniel D. Landry and Luc Johnson. Dundas—Charles Cormier and Martin Grady.

Councillor William Wheten was by the Chairman declared elected as Warden for the ensuing year, and secondly took his seat as such. The minutes of the last meeting were read and approved. Alan Hains was elected as constable for the year to end on the 10th of October, 1881. All the Electoral returns at Municipal elections in October last were read by the Secretary.

The Secretary then read the Council having thereon to be two supposed acting Parish Clerks in the Parish of Wellington at the last election. A discussion having arisen relative to the contested election in Wellington, and the question arising as to who was really Parish Clerk of that Parish on the 10th day of October, 1881, a call for a legal opinion on the matter was made on the Clerk of the Peace, who pointed out the Council's liability thereto, holding, in that the discussion was out of order; that, that a protest, if any, could only be filed in written form to-morrow, the 11th inst.; that, that Councilors cannot appoint a Parish Clerk when no vacancy has occurred in that office; 4th, That the question was one for the Council to deal with after their committee had reported thereon.

Parish officers for Richibucto were approved. Resolved that if any parish pay into the treasury more funds than the warrant of 1881, the surplus be placed to the credit of said parish for 1882.

The protest against the seats of Grattan and Gallant by Cate was not sustained. James McDougall, Thos. Blouin and Peter Deagle were elected as valuers for the county. James McDougall was appointed chairman of valuers.

Councillor Buckner was called to the chair, in order to return a vote of thanks to Warden Wheten.

The Warden accepted thanks and the Council adjourned here to die at 11.30 p. m. on Saturday, 14th inst.

Death of Rev. Dr. Brooke.
Frederick, Jan. 16.—Rev. John M. Brooke, D. D., Senior pastor of St. Paul's (Presbyterian) Church, died at the Manse, George street, this morning at 5 o'clock, in the 73rd year of his age.

He was born at Burrow Stouness, near Edinburgh. He married a Miss Stewart, a daughter of Captain Stewart of the Merchant Navy. He came to this country and lived at New Richmond, Gaspe county, Province of Quebec, from 1848 to 1852, to assume the pastorate of St. Paul's.

On the 10th of November he retired from active life, and was still continued to the church as senior pastor. Rev. Dr. Brooke succeeded Rev. Dr. Berkmyer, and was pastor of the above church for nearly thirty years.

The above is from the *Globe* of Monday 16th, which adds:—The announcement of the death of this reverend and well-known minister, though not unexpected, will be heard by many with much regret. Dr. Brooke was a pattern Christian minister, kind and amiable, and a man of lead the singer to repentance by gentleness and Christian charity.

The Lobster Packers.
BATHURST, Jan. 23.—A meeting of the lobster packers of Gloucester County was held here to-day and was largely attended. Among those present were Messrs. Sutherland, Windsor, McLean, Gathin, Mann, Bishop, Smith, Roy and others. The following resolution was unanimously carried:

Resolved, That owing to the unsatisfactory state of the lobster market at present, we hereby pledge ourselves to forward no shipments of lobsters to Great Britain during the ensuing season unless such as shall be controlled by the following committee:—Coun. An agreement to that effect was then signed and a motion carried that the resolution passed by the meeting be for dissemination on the merits of licenses and the demerits of rum, the council proceeded to business.

J. D. Phinney, Esq., sent in a prayer for the better protection of the Records of the Probate and County Courts.

Resolved that the by-law relating to 1st semi-annual meeting of the Board be rescinded, and that all meetings be held on 4th Tuesday in January.
