THE NEW LORD MAYOR OF LON-
DON.

Mr. Alderman Boag, the new Lord Mayor

probably the youngest man who has reached the civic chair. Born in 1820 he is only forty-two. He is of Scotch descent, a scion of one of the oldest families in Great Britain, the Roses of Kilrock Castle, Nairnshire, North Britain. The present Commandant-in-Chief of India, Sir Hugh Rose, is descended from the same family, as was the right Hon. George Rose whose interesting correspondence has been lately published.

Alderman Rose is another instance of a self-made man, having attained his present position by his own untiring exertions—by industry, perseverance and energy. Very early in life he commenced business on his own account in the yard where he is now Alderman, and on a portion of the site of his present warehouses, of which he is now the freeholder.

It may not be without interest to our juvenile, and perhaps older readers, to mention that when the present Lord Mayor was five years of age he promised a faithful servant of his family *à la mode à l'étranger* and became Lord Mayor of London. It is also scarcely less interesting to relate that the faithful domestic has remained in his place up to the present time—he has carefully treasured in her memory the exact promise and now claims not only the satisfaction, but the full honor of the personal presentation to her in due form by the Lord Mayor of London.

In 1955 6 Alderman Rose served the office of Sheriff of London and Middlesex and during this shrewdly the trial of William Palmer took place. It lasted twelve days, and created an amount of excitement quite unparalleled by any trial we have seen. The Sheriff received the night after the trial a number of telegrams and eulogiums, like from the judges, the Corporation of London, the press, and the public in general, for the admirable arrangement then made for the conduct of the trial.

The Lord Mayor has been mainly instrumental in establishing the London Rifle Brigade, of which he is the senior Major. The preliminary movement of the supporters of the volunteer movement in this city was held in his ward, and he has ever been unremitting in his attention to his military duties.
