J., said "If an indictment had been a remedy equally convenient, beneficial, and effectual, as a mandamus I should have been of opinion, that we ough not to grant the mandamus; but I think it is perfectly clear that an indictment is not such remedy, for a corporation cannot be compelled by indictment, to reinstate the road. The Court may indeed, in case of conviction , impose a fine, and that fine may be levied by distress but the corporation may submit to the payment of the fine, and refuse to reinstate the road and at all events a considerable delay may take place. The remedy therefore is not so ual as that by mandamus."

In Rex v. The Bank of England (2 Ding 526) Lord Mansfield laid down the rule, that where an action would lie for complete satisfaction tv : cific re ief. the co not grant a mandamus. The same rule was acted on in Reg. v. The Victoria Park Co. (1 Q.B 288), when an application was made for us to compel a company to pay a sum for which a judgement had been obtained against them ; and for which a ft fa execution was a perfect remedy in its nature. So in Reg v. Hull & Selby Railway Co. (6 20.B 70) where a mandamus to compel the defendants to pay a sum of money to the Selby Bridge Co., in pur suance of the Act of incorporation, was refused because an action of debt would lie against the company for the amount, and was not a less offectual remedy than mandamus. The only effect of a recovery against this Company, in an action for damages, would be to subject them to the payment of a sum of money to the party who obtained the judgement, and would not procure for the prose tors the benefit which they seek by this appli, cation, vis: the running of daily trains.upon the road. 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
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
