

AN HISTORIC WELL CURB


Dedicated At St. Anne's Restigouche St. Anne's Day.

REAL DEMOCRACY.
 The New York State Educational Building is one of the most imposing buildings in America. Its scope includes all education. The university regularly inspects the educational institutions within its jurisdiction, licenses teachers, sets up uniform standards for the public schools, maintains the state library, the state museum and the state library school and apportions to the schools the appropriations annually made by the Legislature.

The cost of the building, including the site, was approximately \$5,400,000. It is of classic design, a colonnade of thirty-six Corinthian columns extending along the entire front, made of white Vermont marble—the finest column made in America.
 It is across the street from the state capital. The exhibits (Indian) and the splendid law and legislative libraries are very large and descriptive. These inscriptions are in the rotunda:
 "Here shall be gathered the best books of all lands and all ages."
 "This library aims to uplift the state and serve every citizen."
 "A system of free common schools wherein all the children of the state may be educated."
 The mural paintings are in the best style of the art.

This building might be called the cornerstone of American democracy. The building itself, solid, massive and stately is symbolic of the purpose for which it was erected. That purpose is to uplift and serve every citizen, and its chief glory is that it establishes a system of free common schools wherein all the children of the state may be educated.
 It is a building that means much and it is well worth visiting as an education. The effect produced by such a visit gives hope of the greater future of education. It shows how in the best direction America is improving and expanding.

Canada is doing well in the matter of education and such a building as this with its evidences of a great civilization to come should prove an inspiration to those at the head of educational affairs. For it is educational training that opens up for every child the surest and best road to a really successful life.

N. B. ALLIANCE MAKES STATEMENT

Executive Urges Strict Enforcement of the Prohibition Act in This Province.

The executive of the New Brunswick Temperance Alliance was in session in St. John last week. At the conclusion of the meeting the executive gave out the following statement:
 The executive of the New Brunswick Temperance Alliance, who have been in St. John having consultations and interviews with friends of the temperance cause are much concerned with the conditions as they prevail at present. They are of the opinion that if these conditions are allowed to continue many of the benefits that came to us through the Prohibition Act will be lost.
 There are several reasons why Christian and temperance people should be anxious:
 First, on account of the inefficiency of many of the inspectors on the staff, who are either not in sympathy with the law and its enforcement or they are not doing the work they are both sworn and paid to do and they should be removed from office. And we are also of the opinion that there are some inspectors who are efficient and industrious, but who have too many obstacles to overcome.
 Second—Another serious phase of the situation and one that vendors do not appear to be any justification for is the number and class of taverns receiving licenses. Many of the appointments made seem to impress those best qualified to know with the conviction that the sale of liquor, not its suppression, is the primary object of so many licenses being issued.
 A grave and serious situation has arisen because of the wholesale export liquor warehouses being permitted to continue in business. This is a serious menace not only to the prohibition act, but to the morals and welfare of the province.
 The executive would bring these conditions to the attention of the people as a first step toward cooperation and would suggest that every friend of temperance use his utmost influence to see that a remedy for this condition is found as early as possible.

DR. GRAHAM BELL DIED TUESDAY

Passed Away at His Home in Cape Breton After Short Illness.

Sydney, N. S., Aug. 2—Dr. Alexander Graham Bell, inventor of the telephone, died at two o'clock this morning at Beinn Breagh, his estate near Baddeck.

Dr. Bell's death came suddenly for though he had been somewhat unwell for several months he had not been confined to his bed. He became seriously ill about five o'clock on Tuesday afternoon, and was immediately attended by Dr. Kerr of Washington, D.C., a cousin of Mrs. Bell, who has been visiting at Beinn Breagh and by Dr. J. J. Roy, of Sydney who was also at Beinn Breagh.

His condition grew rapidly worse however, and death came early in the morning.
