HILLSBORO DOINGS.—Hillsboro had on the 16th a Social in the Baptist vestry, with literary performances, and good things to eat; followed by another affair of the same sort on the 19th. Sixty dollars for church work was realized on the two occasions.—Also they had a carnival which was well attended.

SLIGHT ACCIDENT IN CRANDALL & CO.'S SHIPYARD.—On Saturday, Mr. Morgan, foreman in Crandall & Co.'s shipyard, was struck by a swinging spar, and a small bone in the ankle fractured. It was at first reported his leg was broken, but his friends will be glad to learn he will be out again in a few days.—Times.

He has not accepted the invitation, and will probably go to St. John, where he was previously invited. Mr. Shonton and his family have already made new friends here, and their departure next summer will be greatly regretted.

CHANCE FOR A WOOD WORKING FACTORY.—Messrs. Geo. N. Balme & Sons, of this place, offer their saw mill at Frosty Hollow for sale. It is on a fine stream, the power is furnished by a Leffell wheel, 4 ft. diameter, estimated at 56 horse power. The stream is one of the most constant in the country and even in the driest seasons is sufficient to drive the mill. The supply of logs in the vicinity is abundant and likely to be permanent. It is situated four miles from Crane's Corner. The Railway passes close to the mill, where a siding can readily be constructed. The property is a very desirable one for a wood working factory, to supply the large local demand for building materials, &c., &c. About 4,000 logs can be purchased now.

Cattle Sold and Bought.

Another cattle exodus from Sackville took place this week. An Ontario dealer bought 88 head in Middle and Upper Sackville, comprising 15 cattle from Mr. Wesley Fawcett; 10 from J. L. Black, Esq.; and 8 from Elijah Estabrooks. A good price was realized all round. Yesterday, Mr. John Avar's auction took place as advertised. He offered 36 cattle every one of which was bought at good figures, ranging from \$90 to \$170 per pair. Some of the cattle were very large. Most of them were bought by Sackville farmers, though a few were captured by dealers.

The Roads.

Precisely there was never so much snow on the ground at this time of the year in this place, as there is now. There are doubtless several hundred oldest inhabitants who will have impudence enough to contradict this, but the general public will not believe them. On the road the depth varies, ranging from half an inch to ten feet. The maximum and the minimum are frequently within two yards of each other—measuring horizontal. This makes sleighing interesting. People get sea sick on the road. The sleigh climbs the steep incline, then poises a while on the dreadful whirle, high on broken waves, and sinks rapidly into the next abyss, until the next wave brings it up "all standing," pitching the driver on the horse's rump. That's the way the road works. In appearance it resembles a worn fence lying on its side.

Smelting.

The Montreal Review, in an article on "Smelting Processes," has occasion to compare the cost of making pig iron in the Londonbury works with that of similar works in Ontario.

Table comparing costs in Nova Scotia and Ontario. Includes items like 2 tons ore, 13 tons coke, Flux, labor, blast, repairs, general expenses, and Cost of one ton.

The comparative costs in Nova Scotia and Ontario are as follows: NOVA SCOTIA. 2 tons ore (\$2.50) \$5.00. 13 tons coke (\$4.00) \$52.00. Flux, labor, blast, repairs, general expenses, 4.25. Cost of one ton, \$14.25. ONTARIO. 2 tons ore, on Lake Huron, (\$3.00) \$6.00. 13 tons anthracite coal, (\$6.00) \$78.00. Flux, labor, &c., 4.5. \$88.50. The value of the N. S. product is said to be about \$2.00 per ton more than the other.

It, as the Acadia company hope, raw coal can be made more or less to take the place of coke in their furnaces, the difference of cost will be still greater. The coal which is being produced at the Chignecto Mines, Maccan, is specially adapted for the purpose.

New Publications.

The Popular Science Monthly has completed its twentieth volume. The history of this Magazine has been brilliant. It has come to take a stand as popular Journal of Mental and Physical Science, high above all competitors of its class. The number for April is unusually good. Gerrit Lansing discusses the Chinese problem and decides that it is impossible that the Chinese can ever assimilate with and become a part of the American nation. There is a characteristic chapter by Mr. Goldwin Smith, taken from the Contemporary, wherein Mr. Smith wishes to know whether science has found a new basis for Morality. NICKY NABBED.—Ten days ago the shop of Archibald Ramsay, at Port Egin, Westmorland Co., was entered and a quantity of general merchandise taken.
