Flood Rock Reef.

The REMAINING OBSTRUCTIONS TO HELL GATE TO BE REMOVED.—NINE ACRES OF ROCK TO BE BLOWN UP.

Flood Rock reef, is soon to go the way of Hallett's Point, which was smashed all into smithereens ten years ago, when 50,000 pounds of dynamite was exploded in mines that had been drilled through it.

But the coming exploit is to be a much bigger affair than the last. The section then exploded was only three and a half acres in extent, while this time nine acres of rock is to be demolished and nearly three hundred pounds of dynamite—rather, "rackerock" a newer explosive—is to do the work.

When this great mine has been touched off it is confidently hoped that Hell Gate will lose its terrors, except those that cling about the name.

Work on Hell Gate was begun before Hallett's Point ledge was exploded. It has been going in a desultory way ever since, as the money was provided by Congress.

At times a couple of hundred men have been employed, divided into three gangs. One great difficulty that has been experienced has been to keep the water out of the mine.

Of late three steam pumps have been almost constantly at work pumping out the accumulated drippings from the river above that have been brought into a large well. In all, 21,670 feet of galleries have been cut out through the rock, and 13,700 holes, three inches in diameter and of an average length of nine feet have been bored through the rock.

A compressed air drilling machine has had to be worked five hours in the boring of these holes. Through the shaft on top 50,160 cubic yards of rock has been carried up.

The level of the shaft is fifty feet below the level of the river. Radiating from the bottom of the main shaft are the galleries, running hundreds of feet under the ledge. The roof of the large chamber at the shaft is fifteen or twenty feet high, while the height of the galleries varies from five to twelve feet. Along the floor of each gallery runs a railroad track, used for carrying away the rock as the galleries are extended.

Through the roof is placed the water comes so that on occasion anxiety in the minds of those in charge of the great work. This is particularly the case with the north end of the ledge. To guard against accident this part is about eight feet from the larger excavation by a heavy gate.

It is suspected that by the end of this month the work of loading the mine will be begun. The explosive to be used consists of two ingredients which are entirely harmless when not combined together, but when combined they are packed in copper cylinders two and a half inches in diameter and two feet long, each holding about six pounds of the explosive. In addition to the 225,000 pounds of the "rackerock," about 75,000 pounds of No. 1 dynamite is to be used. The delicate operation of packing the compound into the cylinders is to be performed by special experts, and other picked men are to run home the cylinders after they have been made watertight by solder. When the cylinders are all in and the exploding trains laid the mine will be flooded by water, ready to be touched off. The cost of the whole work, including that of carrying away the debris after the explosion, will be about \$1,000,000.

Tree Culture on Waste Land.

Hitherto the abundance of natural timber in this country has made it easy to dispose with timber culture, and for the most part our land owners have taken little interest in such slow-growing crops.

The Tower of London.

Since the explosion of the Tower of London, by which so many stands of arms were injured, considerable attention has been given to the old fortress, with a view to restoring it in some measure to what it was in appearance in days long since gone by.

This matter has been kept under notice by Lord Chelmsford as Constable of the Tower, with the result that the many buildings of a temporary nature, only used as storehouses, are to be removed, as also the great stores of rifles, carbines, swords, bayonets and pistols, which have been kept there as the central armory of small arms for the army, navy and auxiliary forces.

The removal of these will admit of the restoration of the inner line of defence, and improve the view of the old structure from the river. The small arms will be kept at Woolden, where ample accommodation for the purpose exists; but the store of ancient and curious weapons, as also the national armor collection, will be retained at the Tower.

Telegraphy to be Revolutionized.

The new apparatus lately devised by two Philadelphia inventors, now controlled by a \$2,000,000 stock company, makes telegraphing as easy as type-writing. In fact it renders the two operations almost precisely identical.

Both for sending and receiving messages the operator will use a key-board marked with the letters and figures like that of a type-writing machine. The keys open and close graduated currents; and the letters are produced both on the paper of the sending and on the paper of the receiving machine. The same instrument performs both functions. The trained ear will serve no purpose in telegraphy when this machine comes into use, and there will be no such thing as overloading a message.

The machine can be operated as fast as the skilled performer can touch the keys, thus enabling a single wire to perform a much larger amount of work than at present.

A Prophet of Evil.

M. Delaunay, of Paris, an acknowledged prophet on geological questions, predicts that next year will see the recurrence of upheavals of the earth's crust in an intensified form.

M. Delaunay is a prophet of evil, but, unfortunately, all his prophecies have hitherto come true. His special prediction of last year predicts them only too surely. In 1877 he announced earthquakes and two occurred on the coast of South America. The volcanic eruptions in the Indian archipelago in 1883 foretold the eruption of Mount St. Helens, and the Spanish earthquakes of last year. He recently predicted that next year these natural phenomena will be of a very intense character. He makes no prediction, however, as to location.

The cholera visitation of 1885 is more serious than that of last year. In 1884 it carried off 12,000 people in Italy, 8,000 in France, 1,000 in Spain, and 2,000 elsewhere—23,000 in all. Already this year it has proven fatal among 35,000 people in Spain alone, and it has shown itself in Portugal and in France. United States journals are mapping out its programme should it reach America within a year or two. They have planned a trip for it from Savannah to St. Louis, and from St. Louis to New Orleans. If the plague must emigrate to America this year will be quite satisfactory to Canada, as it leaves us out in the cold. With rather more than ordinary quarantine precautions though, it is difficult to see why even this limited deadly journey should be permitted. We in Canada are endeavoring to arrest the plague at the very doors of the country, and why should not the United States do the same?

A National Gunboat Association is projected in England. Its business will be to promote the establishment of volunteer gunboat flotillas along the coasts of England and the colonies. It will aid in the equipment of gunboats where sufficient local subscriptions cannot be obtained, and will conduct experiments and organize yearly prize meetings and sham fights. As the question of defending our coasts is one of so small importance to us—without the scare when a Russian war was threatened—the movements of this association, should it be formed, will be watched with interest from this side of the water.


