

Lord Clive, a succession of conquest—  
almost forced upon the British contrary  
to their inclinations—have now placed  
nearly all India under their sway. The  
Court of Directors of the East India Com-  
pany have the power of electing the  
Governor General, subject to the approval  
of the Government, and they have also  
the power of his recall. The Company  
also held the patronage of other appoint-  
ments till the expiry of the Act in 1854,  
but in 1853 their exclusive right to trade  
was abolished in favor of "Free Trade."  
The Governor General, assisted by a  
Council of five members, has the power  
of making laws for the whole of British  
India, subject to the approval of the  
home government and he has the sole  
direction of the army, which is under the  
command of a Commander-in-Chief.  
There is a free press and equal laws to all  
subjects. The revenue is derived almost  
entirely from a land tax. Under the  
"Zemindari System" established in Ben-  
gal, the zemindars, formerly a sort of  
collectors, have been constituted the  
actual proprietors of the soil, and have  
become bound to pay a fixed and perma-  
nent assessment, amounting to one half  
the produce. In Malras an assessment,  
varying according to the productivity of  
the soil, under the name of the "Ry-  
otwary System." The Village System,  
prevalent in the native States and some  
parts of Bengal and the Nerbunda dis-  
trict, consists in the assessments being  
collected from the cultivators of the soil,  
through the medium of native village  
officers appointed by each community  
without the direct interference of govern-  
ment. These rent assessments are very  
high and bear hard on the cultivators of  
the soil; yet the condition of the popu-  
lation under British rule is greatly im-  
proved from that under the unsteady  
Governments, and the incessant wars and  
conquests of previous periods of their  
history.  
The City of Bombay occupies the  
entire breadth of the south end of the  
Island bordering at once on the harbor  
inside, and on Back Bay outside. The  
population is estimated at 144,000.  
Parsees or Persians, descendants of  
Fire-worshippers, driven from their homes  
by Mohammedan bigotry, rank next to  
the English for grade, in respectability  
and influence. The late Sir James Jee-  
jeejee in fact, stands forth, to say  
nothing of fabulous wealth, as a model  
of a merchant prince in enterprise and  
integrity, in munificence and patriotism.  
The objects most worthy of note are the  
Town-Hall, Library, Mint, Cathedral,  
Custom House, Post Office, Public Works  
Office, University, Sassoon's High School  
and the Dockyard, the latter covering an  
area of about 200 acres.  
Our boasted territory in India, the  
best and most uprightly governed of any  
European possession, can, after all, claim  
but negative advantages. It is neither  
oppressive or unjust, and the people are  
moderately happy; but what appreciable  
advances have they made during the  
long period of our sway? Are we more  
civilized than in the time of Baber and  
Akbar? Are their minds more en-  
lightened? Their political freedom more  
advanced? Their religion less dominant  
or less bigoted? No! The mass are  
certainly as ignorant as ever, ignorant of  
their own rights, content under every  
or any government, so that they reap the  
fruit of labor; and in this respect, are  
as low as the Africans.

**Albert Victor's First Term at Cambridge.**  
Prince Albert Victor, the eldest son of  
the Prince and Princess of Wales, has  
just been taken down to Cambridge by  
his father to go into residence at that  
ancient university for the purpose  
of completing his education. The course  
to be adopted in the case of the young  
Prince, who will be twenty years of age  
on the 8th of January next, will be some-  
what different from that pursued with  
regard to the Prince of Wales himself when  
he was studying at Cambridge. The heir  
apparent never resided at the university,  
but at a country house a short distance  
from the town, where his movements  
were very strictly regulated and watch-  
ed, so much so that, in point of the re-  
straint put upon him, the Prince, it is  
said, one day made his escape and ran  
up to London, whence he was somewhat  
ignominiously brought back. Prince  
Albert Victor, it appears, is to be much  
more closely identified with the uni-  
versity, and to have more liberty than  
his father. He has room in Neville's  
Court in his college, Trinity; he is not en-  
tered as a "fellow-commoner" with the  
privilege of sitting at the Fellows' table,  
but as a "pensioner," that is to say, as  
an ordinary undergraduate, and will dine  
simply with his fellow-students. Indeed,  
it is the particular wish of the Prince of  
Wales that his son should be treated  
like any other young man, just as he was  
during his training in the *Britannia* and  
his crisis in the *Bacchanal*. The views  
of the Prince of Wales with regard to the  
education of his sons are, in fact, much  
less strict than those entertained by his  
illustrious parents with regard to him-  
self. He evidently does not believe in  
restraining young men overmuch, and  
agrees with those who think that a youth  
who "allowed a little liberty during his  
years of tuition, is less liable to sow his  
wild oats too lavishly when he obtains  
absolute freedom of action." Perhaps if  
the Prince of Wales had been treated in  
this way he would have been spared a  
good many of the troubles which he ex-  
perienced during his early manhood,  
but which, happily, has long since sur-  
mounted, until he has become the most popu-  
lar personage of his time.

**Manitoba Farmers—Serious**  
**Dissatisfaction Existing**  
**Among Them.**  
There is no use in attempting to dis-  
guise the fact, for it will not, that there  
is widespread and general dissatisfaction  
among our farmers. It might almost  
be said that the feeling has gone beyond  
the bounds of dissatisfaction. It is un-  
necessary to state that this is not in  
consequence of any inherent defect in  
the country itself, in which the most  
unfounded confidence is felt by every-  
one, and by none more so than by those  
who have had the best opportunities of  
judging—the farmers. Not a solitary  
place, so far as we are aware, can be  
pointed out in which settlers are not  
delighted with what nature has done for  
their chosen locations. The most en-  
thusiastic admiration for their surround-  
ings is invariably expressed by them, no  
matter how bitter their complaints on  
other grounds. Such complaints are  
rapidly becoming more bitter, and it is  
beyond doubt that they are being made  
so by the knowledge that one of the  
finest and most promising countries in  
the world is being unfairly for the  
purposes of the farmer by artificial means.  
Do the people of this country realize  
what this discontent among the farmers  
indicates? Have they become so accus-  
tomed to hearing the farmers spoken of  
as "the bone and sinew of the country,"  
or as its "backbone," that they regard  
all such expressions as mere anti-election  
figments meaning nothing? If so, the  
sooner they disabuse their minds the  
better. As applied to the farmers of this  
country, these are not flowers of  
speech. It cannot be too often repeat-  
ed nor too clearly understood, that farm-  
ing is the one industry of the North-  
west. Failing that, it must forever be
