by placing the barley before the roots and inserting a wheat crop between the roots and clover." Ox YOKES .- There are a great many rinciples and points to be considered n a voke. A short rule for making a voke is to take away what wood is not eeded there. This is not so easy as it unds. Yokes, for all but winter use, hould be from thirty to thirty-six inches between the bows. The part resting on the neck should be smooth, and the most sensible rule I can give for the form for a large yoke would be to takea circle with eighteen inches radius (three feet n diameter) and mark for the under side of the neck by that. Some old okemakers used to cut out a little notch just large enough to fit on to the neck, but with that style, if the oxen do not go exactly even, these ends that drop down on the "breast" between the oxer will hit their neck or shoulders. Then I would leave the top of the neck and end so near straight that the end will be one and one-half inches thicker than on the neck. Then I would make the part resting on the neck about as convex crosswise as it is concave the other way. or as flat as it can be and have no shart corners to rub in. If the yoke is large enough to have a bow ten inches wide the neck should be ten inches the other way. A wide, flat bearing is what makes it easy. The depth of the staple is a very important matter. To plough harrow, and haul on a drag the yoke should have but very little breast and a short staple to bring the point of draught damp. This chill all here about my heart! No more!--- high.
