PROVINCIAL PARLIAMENT VOTES AND PROCEEDINGS.

LEGISLATIVE ASSEMBLY.

Friday, 25th April, 1856. On motion of Mr. Attorney General Donald, the Orders of the Day were read.

Mr. Brown moved in amendment to the Bill to amend the Clergy Reserve Act, as read a second time, and proposed to amend the Bill by inserting the words 'and the Clergy'.

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Mr. Dorion was in favour of the reference to the Committee. Mr. Rhodes spoke of the importance of the reciprocity with the East and West Indies.

Mr. Mackenzie contended that the administration was hurrying the country to taxation by their proposed increase of taxes.

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Mr. Clark hoped that the Grand Trunk Company or Contractors would not require any appropriation from the Government.

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SEVEN DAYS LATER FROM EUROPE. ARRIVAL OF THE PERSEA. New Year, April 29. The Persea arrived at the lighthouse at a quarter past nine last evening, and did not reach her dock until 6 o'clock this morning.

She made the passage in 91 days. She brings 130 passengers, and Liverpool and London dates to 19th April.

The Persea sailed from Liverpool for New York on the 16th. News by the Persea unimportant.

The Conference at Paris has closed, and the debate in Parliament has been postponed until the return of Lord Clarendon.

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GRAND TRUNK RAILWAY COMPANY.

Extract from the Minutes of a Meeting of the Directors of the Grand Trunk Railway Company, held in Toronto. Resolved—That the Vice President Mr. Crawford, and Mr. James Beatty, be appointed a Committee to draft and sign a memorial to His Excellency the Governor General, praying that additional aid may be given to the Company by the Province, to assist in completing the line from Stratford to Sarnia, with a branch to London, to secure the traffic through Canada over the Grand Trunk Line; and also the Provincial aid to proceed with and complete the Victoria Bridge; containing also the further prayer that the Province do forego its prior claim upon the receipts of the Railway Fund with the Shareholders of the Company.

Subjoined is the Memorial drafted by the above Committee: TO HIS EXCELLENCY SIR EDMUND WALKER HEAD, BARONET, GOVERNOR GENERAL OF BRITISH NORTH AMERICA, &c. &c. MAY BE PLEASED YOUR EXCELLENCY. The Memorial of the Grand Trunk Railway Company of Canada, HUMBLE SHewETH—

That your Memorialists were originally incorporated under different Acts of the Provincial Legislature for the purpose of completing, as separate and distinct undertakings, several lines of Railways in Canada. That in view of the importance of facilitating the intercourse between the respective sections of the Province, as well as to cheapen the cost of management, the Government and Legislature in 1852 adopted a policy of encouraging the amalgamation of the several separate Companies holding parts of the great arterial line from the West to Quebec and Portland, whereby the main line of passenger traffic would, it was believed, be secured to the St. Lawrence, and means adopted for the combined resources of all for the accomplishment of a Railway Bridge across the St. Lawrence at Montreal—a work manifestly of the very greatest importance for cheapening and accelerating the intercourse between the East and the West—and giving great inducements when finished for the American travel and freight, and the completion of the North Eastern States to adopt the line through Canada.

Under the authority of the Provincial Parliament, the amalgamation was consequently consummated, and with the express sanction and approval of the Provincial Government, the holding office and through the co-operation of the London financial representatives, the British public were invited to take part in the scheme—which was represented in the prospectus published at the time, and truly so, as pregnant with the most beneficial consequences to the Province, as well as offering a desirable investment to those who in England were thus induced to subscribe to the undertaking. In the prospectus the Premier and several of the principal officers of the Provincial Executive, appear as Directors, and a member of the Colonial Government is appointed as the President; while the co-operation and assent of the Legislature and generally, is clearly attested by the fact of Provincial aid, exceeding two millions sterling, being devoted to the support of the enterprise.

Your Memorialists do not censure the gentlemen who appear prominent as promoters of the undertaking in the prospectus; they believe the statements put forth were, at the time, warranted by fact, and they do not doubt they will hereafter prove correct whenever the entire undertaking has been carried out for effectually securing the Western traffic. But your Memorialists consider it of very great importance for the most beneficial consequences to the Province, as well as offering a desirable investment to those who in England were thus induced to subscribe to the undertaking. In the prospectus the Premier and several of the principal officers of the Provincial Executive, appear as Directors, and a member of the Colonial Government is appointed as the President; while the co-operation and assent of the Legislature and generally, is clearly attested by the fact of Provincial aid, exceeding two millions sterling, being devoted to the support of the enterprise.

FRANCE. A splendid fête was given at Paris on Monday in honor of the plenipotentiaries. Havre, April 16th.—Breadstuffs declined in all the markets. Provisions declined owing to heavy receipts. PEACE THURSDAY.—Count Cavaen leaves this p.m. for London, for a few days, and then will return via Paris to Turin. The Cabinet of Vienna is bent on occupying every corner of Italy, where political excitement can be got up as an excuse for their presence. Events in Italy are clearly increasing in interest. It is quite possible the Duke of Tuscany will be again compelled to demand prominent troops and divisions of Austrian forces under orders from Roman States. Garrisons in Lombardy are to be increased. LIVERPOOL MARKETS. Breadstuffs depressed: Flour declined 6d to 1s. Wheat declined 3d. Corn unchanged. Weather favorable. Beef quiet. Pork and Bacon firm. Lard in demand at slight decline. Money slight. Discounts range at 5 a 7 per cent. Consols 93 1/2 to 93 1/4. American securities generally quiet. Cotton very active at an advance of 1 over last week's prices, sales of the week 120,000 bales including 40,000 to speculators and 30,000 for export. Market closed firm but less active. LATER. Austria evidently intends to permanently occupy as much of Italy as she can, in order to insult and intrude against Sardinia. In fact, Austria is at war with Piedmont, although their armies are not face to face; and it is impossible to say what event may bring about a fresh struggle. That struggle cannot long be delayed. Austria, however, will strive to parry off a quarrel on the field, until the policy and attitude of France and England, in regard to the wars in Italy, no longer coincide. The work towards divisions had already commenced in Paris. M. Dool seems to persuade the Emperor that any change in Italy would end in open revolution. VIENNA, Friday. The Emperor signed the ratification of the treaty on the 15th. Public thanksgiving was ordered throughout the country. LONDON, Saturday. A report has been circulated by an evening journal, that Lord Palmerston and Mr. Leche are about to retire, and Sidney Herbert and Sir Jas. Graham take the Government. There is not the slightest foundation in the report. LONDON, Friday P.M. English Funds remain steady and without animation. Discount market easy. The Persea made trip from Liverpool to the bar in 91 days 10 hours and 15 minutes, passed the Cape Horn, being to Liverpool, also on the 20th, in lat 43, long 48, passed the 'Cambria' bound east. The steamer 'Forest City' came in collision with the steamer 'Northwestern' last night, on Lake Huron, sinking the latter immediately, and she is now lying on her side, but no persons known to be missing. A fire occurred at Brampton on Sunday morning on the premises of Mr. Todd, by which he lost 41,250, not being insured.
