Poor Chimneys Cause Fires.

A summary of the various causes of fire shows that fires which can be traced to faulty chimneys annually amount to from ten to twenty-six percent, of the total number, while in winter the percentage has reached as high as fifty. This is significant when it is realized that most of these fires result from carelessness and could be avoided by proper attention.

Chinneys in frame buildings should be built straight up from the ground and not placed on a bracket, as is often the case, and should extend two feet or more above the peak where the chimney is in the centre of the roof, and three feet or more above the surface when on a flat or slanting roof. For proper draft, the minimum-sized opening for the flue should be at least eight inches thick, At the base of each flue a clean-out door should be provided, if possible.





Canada is to have two new stamp Canada is to have two new stamps—one of 13 cents and one of 15 cents. Since the letter registration fee has been increased from 5 to 10 cents, the combined postage and registration fee is 13 cents; to most foreign lands, 15 cents. This is the reason for the demand for the two denominations. Meanwhile, it is said that the 7-cent stamp is in use comparatively little and will be withdrawn from circulation.
