LONDON, ONT., Jan. 2, 1890.

My Lord Archbishop,—I have the honor to scknowledge the receipt of your letter of the 29th ultimo.

I do not think a discussion of the merits or demerits of my letters as containing or not containing arguments relevant to the sabject of our correspondence would be of interest to the public, who must themselves judge as to that from what is said rather than from opinions expressed by either party to the controversy, and I do not, therefore, follow you in that discussion further than to suggest that where an accusation is made against a public man of intolerance and bigotry it is not irrelevant to inquire what manner of man his accuser is.

My case on this point is unanswered, except where you go out of your way to repeat your opprobrious epithets towards these who are connected with the Equal Rights movement, and by the repetition of them show your desire to fasten the charge of ferocious bigotry upon the leader of the movement.

I did not overlook the statement you quote from your letter of the 22nd ult., nor do I fail now to observe the disingenuous way in which you for the second time, evade a direct answer to the question whether you approve or disapprove of the position taken in the quotation I made from the article in the Canadian Freeman. You must have a not very high estimate of the intelligence of your fellow-citizens when you speak of the request that you should give that answer as a "reiterated demand on" you "to muzzle the press."

Surely it was the part of a courageous if not a candid man that you should give the answer; but you dare not give it, because the only answer you could now give would convict you of making a foundationless charge against me. I say the only answer you could give, because I venture to think that even you dare not now indorse the position that both the political parties of this country are mere factions, whose quarrels are to be utilized for the purpose of a compact minority (holding the balance of power between them), dictating its terms as the price of its support, and it was such a combination as that and not my Roman Catholic fellow-citizens whom I denounced as the common enemy to be met by united action. This you know full well, and yet, for the purpose of giving point to your attack, you deliberately mistake my position. Fortunately the people of this Province are too intelligent to be misled by these unworthy tactics, and they will only recoil on your own head. I do not hesitate to repeat that such a combination, created and existing for such a purpose as I have spoken of, could not be tolerated in a free country, or to avow that whenever it is attempted party lines must be obliterated, if necessary, to meet it, not by oppressive measures, but a stern resistance against aggression.

Equally foundationless (courtesy forbids my using a stronger adjective) is the charge

my using a stronger adjective) is the charge that I advocated "making war upon the educational rights of the minority of the Province of Ontario, guaranteed to them by the constitution." It is impossible for you, in the face of what I have said and written in the face of what I have said and written on that subject, successfully to mislead even yourself, much less the people of Ontario, and I leave the matter, therefore, with this single observation, that nothing in my judgment is more likely to bring about an agitation for such constitutional changes as may be necessary to permit the abolition of separate schools than the extraordinary pretensions put forward by the heirarchy in certain places, with regard to their right to control them, and the intemperate utterances of such too zealous champions as your Grace has proved yourself so often to be.

Depend upon it, those whose cause you champion will not thank you for the

champion will not thank you for the aspersion you put on their country and their loyalty to it, when you suggest that though their material interests would be served by annexation to the neighboring ing annexation by a consideration of the advocation of the advantages with regard to separate schools which they enjoy in Canada. They have, I doubt not, a higher opinion of their country than your Grace seems to entertain, and they will not, I venture to think, thank you

they will not, I venture to think, thank you for the suggestion that the continuance of their allegiance to it depends upon their retaining the rights they now enjoy with regard to education.

Be assured, too, that the covert threat to the majority in Ontario which the statements to which I have adverted contain, will not deter them from pursuing that will not deter them from pursuing tha ourse which they believe to be best cal ulated to advance their country's interest culated to advance their country's interest. I now part from your Grace, congratulating myself on the absolute justice of the principles which I advocate, which stands confessed when you are unable to attack me for any position which I have actually taken, and are compelled to resort to a very vivid imagination for your facts, and having called it to your aid to a most copious yog-pulsary for the description.

A PERTINENT INQUIRY. Two Bonuses Which Have Been Offered in London

"Look here," said a well-known citizen o-day, "it is a good thing to have the Doherty Company brought to London to run a factory which has been standing idle for years, and which will be made to hum the employment of over 100 men. by the employment of over 100 men. The question is, Is a \$25,000 bonus, the interest on which, at 4 per cent., for which the money can be obtained, too much to give to bring the concern here? I don't think it is, provided the security is good, and the company is prepared to make it as binding as the city authorities demand."

"Yes; what better guarantee could be obtained? Look how much better a bargain it is than was offered to the Grand Trunk. The G. T. R shops. were burned down. His wish was strictly in accordance with British fair play. He said he was not brought out—as Mayor Taylor had said at the meeting of No. 2 ward on Tuesday evening—in the interest of the Doherty bonus, and not only did he repudicate it, but that Mayor Taylor had since acknowledged that when he said it he was mistaken. Mr. Callard claimed that the Mayor made the remark to discourage him in the election canvass. He reviewed his history in connection with the Council from the time he was elected till the present, remarking that when he first went into the Council it struck him that the city was paying too high a rate of discount at the bank, and by his individual efforts he secured a reduction of 1 per cent. and saved thereby for the city upwards of \$2,000 annually. He challenged the Mayor to show in any single department where he had made such a saving. He calimed also that the recent reduction of taxes was largely due to him, for previous to his entering the Council Chamber the taxes were steadily increasing, but under the management of affairs by the present Council the rate had been reduced 2 mills. The \$80,000 which was to be raised by debentures would be used to extend the waterworks and for school purposes, and the palance would doubtless effect a reduction in the rate of taxation by about 3 or 4 mills if it was so applied, but it was not likely it would be applied in such a manner. 
