Berlin, March 3.-The budget committee of the German Reichstag yesterday adopted, in accordance with the government proposals, section 1, paragraph 1 of the naval bill, fixing the number of ships to be held in readiness for service as follows: A flagship, 18 battleships, 12 large cruisers, 30 small cruisers, 8 coast defense ironclads and 13 gunboats, besides torpedo boats, school ships and small gunboats.

A NEW YORK SPENDTHRIFT. London, March 3.-In the bankruptcy court here, Mr. H. M. Cornell (son of the late J. B. Cornell, one iron manufacutrer, of New York), who was declared a bankrupt in this city on Nov. BRANT,S. 17, applied for an order of discharge. The judge said he considered Mr. Cornell's bankruptcy was due to gross ex-travagance, and suspended his discharge four years. Mr. Cornell, according to report, in addition to his income of \$20,000 a year, received \$125,000 under the will of his father in 1887. Since August, 1894, it is added, Mr. Cornell has lived at a rate of \$55,000 a year.

PRINCE ALBERT'S CRUISE. London, March 3.-Prince Albert of Belgium spent the night in London, and embarked on the Kaiser Wilhelm der Gross, at Southampton, accompaniel by Col. Jungblutte, Dr. Melis, his private physician, and two servants. Col. Jungblutte said the tour of the prince was more for study than pleasure. He expected to study the United States Government methods, visit factories, mines and farms, and observe the people of the United States in their habits, thought and manner of living, all of which, he added, would be useful for the prince's future. Cornwall, March 3.—Complete returns in this district gave Mr. McDonald, Conservative, 431 majority in Glengarry; Mr. McLaughlin, Conservative, majority in Stormont, and Mr. Whitney, Conservative, 131 majority in Dundas. This represents a gain of two seats for the Conservatives, Glengarry and Stormont having been represented in the last legislature by two Patrons. Dundas remains Conservative. A careful analysis of the returns reveals some startling facts. In Glengarry, Mr. McRae, Liberal, and Mr. Macpherson, Independent, ran as of Queen's University for a further ernment, and their combined vote exceeds that of the opposition member by some hundreds, so that popular opinion in Glengarry clearly favors the government, and an opposition mem-ber is returned only by the ill-advised division of the Liberal vote. In Stormont a similar condition of affairs exists. The government vote, as represented by the bailots cast for Mayor Mulhern, the regular Liberal candidate, and for Mr. John Bennett, the Independent, who gave Mr. Hardy a consistent support in the last Legislature, exceeds the total vote for Mr. McLaughlin, Conservative, by 600, so that again the popular voice is favorable to the administration, and a fluke gives Mr. Whitney a supporter. But it is perhaps in Dundas that the result of the balloting is most surprising. In 1894, Mr. Whitney, as a plain member of the assembly, carried the riding by 187 majority. Now, with all the prestige of opposition leader and possible premier of the province to attract the popular vote, the majority for Mr. Whitney is reduced to 131, and there is little doubt that under normal, con-ditions Mr. W. B. Lawson, the plucky young Liberal candidate, would have easily redeemed the riding. At any rate he has given Mr. Whitney a severe shaking, and in the narrow Conservative majority is revealed the reason of the persistent rumors which were in circulation at the beginning of

Death Rules the Trails Leading to Land of Gold-Many Miners Dying From Discomforts and Disease.

The Rush of Gold Seekers from Victoria, B. C., Continues.

Vancouver, B. C., March 3.-The following letter was received by your correspondent today from one of Mc-Kenzie & Mann's staff, dated Wrangel, Feb. 23: "The steamer Joan, with its first outfit of the McKenzie party, 80 men and 36 horses, reached Wrangel on the 22nd. At Dixon's Entrance the Joan narrowly escaped destruction in the fog and a furious storm. She ran ashore, and, but for the magnificent seamanship of Capt. Lock, another wreck with all hands lost would have been chronicled.

"Wrangel is crowded beyond my power to describe. Everything is wide open. Roulette, Black Jack, faro, three-card monte, any old fake games are running full blast. Lumber is extremely scarce. It has all been bought up at a fabulous price, but there is not enough. People are sleeping on verandas, in the Catholic mission house, and on boards in the open. Wherever there is a sheltered spot they are packed together like sardines in a can. For pork and beans and a six-by-three board you are assessed \$150 a day. WITHOUT BAIL. Lawyer Foley, of Paris, Committed for Trial-Shortage of \$50,000 Charged.

Paris, Ont., March 3.-C. M. Foley, the lawyer, arrested two weeks ago on charges of fraud, he having, as alleged, appropriated to his own use over \$50,000 of his clients' money, was brought up for hearing before P. M. Powell yesterday. P. D. Crerar, of Hamilton, conducted the prosecution, and Geo. Wells, combination and succeeded after two Foley pleaded not guilty to all the charges.

Evidence was given to show that Foley had the entire confidence of his clients, many of whom had handed over their money, to be invested in various ways, only getting Foley's receipt for the amount, and in many instances even this was not obtained. INTEGRITY OF REPORTERS

Their Methods and Motives in Getting News.

[Philadelphia Times.] A very common error is prevalent that the work of reporters, given in newspapers, as a rule, is not entitled to respect or credence. It is generally assumed that the reporter writes chiefly or wholly to male a sensation, or in some way interest readers without regard to facts, while just the reverse is the truth in all reputable newspaper establishments. It is safe to assume that the state-

ments reporters give in the leading reputable journals, as are the general statements from the pulpit when the minister gets outside of strictly religious teachings, are very much more truthful than are the public expressions of most if not all the leading professions. With very few exceptions the management of our leading daily newspapers enforce truthfulness and fairness as the supreme attributes for a newspaper writer, and yet it is common for all who are displeased with any reportorial statement, to say "it's mere newspaper story."

Not only are the managers of our eading newspapers entitled to great credit for the scrupulous care they enforce on their reporters and corre-

spondents to present the truth with as exact fairness as is possible, but the public little know the ceaseless care that is exercised in every reputable newspaper office to prevent the publication of even the truth when it would be more harmful to publish than to suppress it. There is not a week, indeed hardly a day that the newspapers of this city do not suppress facts proper for public information which would make a very interesting story, solely because it would bring a flood of sorrow to the innocent and helpless and cast an imperishable shadow upon their lives. With all the errors necessarily committed in a newspaper office by reason of the haste with which articles must often be prepared, the public little know with what thorough integrity the newspapers, as a rule, protect the innocent even at the cost of supressing legitimate and interesting information. The skeletons of hundreds of households are carefully guarded in the newspaper offices of the

country, and generally without even the knowledge of the people who are thus protected. The Press of this city a few days ago gave a pointed illustration of the general integrity of the reportorial service rendered to our newspapers. Rev. Clarence H. Woolston, pastor of the Eastern Baptist Church, is one of the very many ministers whose zeal often outruns their discretion when enlisted in humanitarian or moral struggles. He gave an interview to a reporter of the Press on the war now in progress to improve the social purity of the community. He doubtless spoke to the reporter just as he felt and as he believed, and he spoke with the earnestness and enthusiasm which led him into the common error of exaggeration. When he saw his statement in cold type he was appalled; he could not believe that he had been correctly reported, and he unfortunately so declared, but when confronted by the reporter with his shorthand notes read

among the ministers in this regard he might be justly censured with sever-

When error is committed it is much more frequently the error of others than of the reporter.





Lots of Red Tape Necessary in This Case to Collect Unpaid Postage on a Letter.

Newburg, N. Y., March 3.--Postmaster McCroskery owns a check on the National Bank of Newburg for the sum of 1 cent. And this is how he became possessor of it. A drop letter in the Newburg postoffice, to go to a person in another state, had on it a 1-cent stamp instead of a 2-cent stamp. The person to whom the letter was addressed received a letter from Postmaster Mc-Croskery, which informed him of the holding of the letter in accordance with the postal laws for the additional 1 cent postage. In response the person advised sent a money order for 1 cent through the Postal Telegraph Company, and wired the postmaster that he had sent it. The postmaster then sent the letter on to the person to whom it was addressed. At the telegraph office the 1 cent was refused until the postmaster called in a friend to identify him. This he did, and then a check for 1 cent on the Newbirg National Eank was made to the order of the post-master, and the person called in to identify him signed both the telegraph book and the check before it was delivered to Postmaster McCroskery. The check will be framed as a curiosity and kept to show the "red tape" now necessary to do business. The receiver of the letter expended \$1.25 for telegraphing and the money order to get the letter, and all because the sender neglected to put on a 2-cent instead of a 1-cent



A Very leasant Affair-Italy's Sons Away From Their Sunny Home Have Not Lost the Warmth of Their Hearts.

A banquet tendered by the subordinate officers of the Christofara Colombo Society of Mutual Benevolence to the members was held at the residence of one of the trustees, Mr. Antonio Licciardo, last night. It was the first social gathering of the society since the recent organization in the city, and nothing could have more strongly evidenced the whole-souled hospitality of the Italian citizens or better indicated what a big factor the society will prove in promoting mutual friendship and pleasure. C.P.R. Line to be Double-Tracked Between Toronto and Montreal.

Land Sales for the Year-Cutting and Conferring-Increase in Business.

Montreal, March 3.-The annual report of the Canadian Pacific Railway states that the rapid increase of traffic on the line between Montreal and Toronto makes it necessary to take steps to double track that section of the line, the traffic having now practically reached the limit of the capacity of a single line. Referring to the construc-tion of the Crow's Nest Pass Railway, the report says that in order to reap the full advantages from the Kootenay mining district it will be necessary to move on west from the Columbia River at Robson, so as to reach the Boundary Creek district, about 100 miles, during the present year, and authority will be asked for that. The results of purchasing the Columbia and Kootenay steamers last year were most gratifying. The directors purchased two ocean steamboats for the Klondike trade, and gave contracts for eleven steamboats, costing \$350,000, for the lakes and rivers in Southern British Columbia and for river service in the Yukon trade. The company's telegraph, express, grain elevators, sleeping cars and lake steamers all afford increased net earnings, and these, with the profits from the Pacific steamships, exceed the interest on the whole of the consolidated debenture stock of the
