The officers of the Erik fear the Roosevelt will not get far north this winter, conditions in the northern waters being adverse. Ice floes are uusually heavy, and much bad weather has prevailed. On the voyage to Greenland the Roosevelt proved an eminently sat isfactory vessel.

SAKHALIN ISLAND SCENE OF FIGHT

Japanese Defeated Russians While Envoys Were in Conference.

Tokio, Sept. 6.-The Japanese defeated the Russians in a series of sharp engagements in Northern Korea,

An official report announces the complete and crushing defeat of the remnant of the Russian forces after five hours' severe fighting at Naibutu, on the west coast of the Island of Sakhalin. The Russians killed number 130. The casualties of the Japanese were slight.

Another official report says the Japanese army attacked the Russians at Chyongtuyang on Sept. 1. The Russian forces included four battalions, slx guns and several hundred cavalry. The Russians strongly resisted west of Chyongtuyang, but were forced to re

London, Sept. 6. — The attitude of labor towards Joseph Chamberlain's fiscal policy was emphatically attested by a vote at today's session of the Trades Union Congress, which is holding its anual meeting at Hanry. By a vote representing 1,253,000 members against 26,000, the congress declared for free trade, asserting that "any departure therefrom would be detrimental to the interests of working classes on whom the burden of protection would press the most heavily."

The resolution also expressed the opinion that a system of preference or retaliation would prove a hindrance to international progress and peace.


