# They Fear a British discipline is improving. The trenches represent great manual labor, for which the Boers have a keen distike, and the way in which they restrained their fire when our troops were advancing is another proof of improved soldiering.

SOME OF THEM CAUGHT TRYING TO IMPROVE THEIR POSITION AND DRIVEN BACK WITH

The despatches from the front all represent the Boers as in nervous condition and all in fear of the advance, but this is probably an exaggeration. The enemy having been again de-tected attempting to improve the trenches facing Gen. Buller, the British heavy guns opened upon them, and the Boers scampered back into the

The British patrols sighted the enemy in force on our extreme left. Nine Boers were killed in a skirmish that followed and six Boer wagons

were captured. It is estimated that the war will cost at least £60,000,000, and it is suggested that the sinking fund of the national debt should be suspended for five or six years in order to defray the cost

The Transvaal Government, accord-The Transval Government, according to information supplied by Boer sympathizers, threatens to reduce the rations of British prisoners if Great Britain stops the entrance of food by

Delagoa Bay.

The Imperial Yeomanry Committee
has issued a statement that the Government considers the formation and ernment considers the formation and despatch of yeomanry as one of the most pressing needs of the situation, and has intimated that it is now prepared to accept from 8,000 to 10,000 yeomanry, instead of 3,000, formerly asked for. It is expected that the first contingent of 1,000 will sail about

CONVERTED INTO FORTRESSES. London, Dec. 29.—A despatch to the Baily Mail from Pietermaritzburg, thated Saturday, Dec. 23, says: "Every day reveals some new fact regarding the strength of the Boer position at Colenso. Thanks to the service of continental officers, the character of the campaign has changed. We are no longer fighting a fee who relies upon guerilla tactics, but we have to deal with what is rapidly becoming a disciplined army, enjoying the advantdisciplined army, enjoying the advant ages of knowing the country and of selecting the scene of contest without the burdens of a cumbersome com-missariat. OUR TIN-POT TITLED NOBILITY.

One of the new features of the Canadian Almanac for 1900 is a list of all the Canadians who can boast of imperial titles. Most of us will be surprised to learn that the list is so long. To be sure, we have not many hereditary titles in Canada, and this is as it should be, for hereditary honors are not in harmony with the genius of a democratic country like ours. Transmitted titles are exotics here, and are rather absurd.

There are six British peerages filled by Canadians. The Canadian peers are: Susan Agnes, Baroness Macdonald of Earnscliffe; Sir George Stephen, Baron Mount Stephen; William, Baron de Blaquiere; Sir Donald A. Smith, Baron Strathcona and Mount Royal; Sir Arthur L. Haliburton, Baron Haliburton, and Sir Udolphus Aylmer, Baron Aylmer. To these may be added Charles Colmore Grant, Baron de Longeuil, whose title is a creation of Louis XIV. of France, and dates back to 1700.

Of baronets we have six: Sir W. G Johnson, Sir Melville Parken, Sir F. A. Robinson, Sir William Rose, Sir Charles J. Stuart and Sir Charles Tupper. These baronetcies and the peerages above constitute the hereditary titles held by Canadians.

The list of knights is much longer. First come those of the G. C. M. G. (Grand Cross, St. Michael and St. George). There are only three of them - Sir Richard Cartwright, Sir Wilfrid Laurier and Sir Oliver Mowat.

The K. C. M. G. knights (Knight Commander, St. Michael and St. George) are next in rank. These Canadians hold the K. C. M. G.: Sir John G. Bourinot, Sir Mackenzie Bowell, Sir John Carling, Sir Adolphe Caron, Sir Louis H. Davies, Sir Sandford Fleming, Sir James A. Grant, Sir W. P. Howland, Sir Hector Langevin, Sir Henri Joly de Lotbiniere, Sir Charles A. P. Pelletien, Sir J. W. Trutch, Sir Charles H. Tupper, Sir W. C. VanHorne.

Next are the Knights Bachelors-Sir John A. Boyd, Sir Roderick W. Cameron (of New York), Sir Louis Cassault, Sir H. H. P. Create, Sir Robert Gillespie, Sir J. H. Hagarty, Sir W. H. Hingston, Sir Alex. Lacoste, Sir James M. LeMoine, Sir W. C. McDonald, Sir W. R. Meredith, Sir Frank Smith, Sir Samuel H. Strong, Sir Melbourne M. Tait, Sir T. W.

The C. B. (Companion of the Bath) is held by Hon. Wm. McDougall, Surgeon General J. B. C. Reade and Major-General C. W. Robinson. The C.M.G. (Companion of the Order of St. Michael and St. George) has been conferred upon Major-General D. R. Cameron, J. G. Colmert J. M. Courtney, Col. J. G. Dartnell, Dr. G. M. Dawson, Louis Frechette, Senator Gowan, W. H. Griffin, Major-General Jarvis, T. C. Keefer, J. Lorn Macdougall, Col. A. McEachran, A. R. Milne, Dr. Parkin, Collingwood Schreiber, A. R. C. Selwyn, Vice-Admiral Vansittart and Col. W. White.

It is interesting to note that although Sir Charles Tupper is a baronet and Sir Wilfrid Laurier is only a knight, Sir Wilfrid outranks Sir Charles because Sir Wilfrid is a member of the Imperial Privy Council, and therefore a "Right Honorable," while Sir Charles is only an "Honorable."

Our scouts have brought in 600 head of cattle, previously captured by the Boers. The bombardment of the Boer trenches by the the naval guns continues morning and evening. Some 120 Kaffirs, preand evening. Some 120 Kaffirs, previously working for the Boers, came in to-day. Many of them were examined. All say that the enemy's losses on the 15th from our rifle fire and from the 14th and 66th Batteries were practically nil. The lyddite shells, they say, caused fearful destruction in the trenches, which in some cases were so trenches, which in some cases were so full of bodies that they had to be full of bodies that they had to be filled in. The Boer camp, they added, was full of women, wailing and weeping. The Kaffirs estimated the Boers killed at 800. All this, however, must be received with caution. The foreign military attaches visited our camp today and rode over the battlefield. Native reports say that Joubert is wounded in the leg.

If British generalship be equal to the crisis, the relief of Ladysmith ought to be the natural consequence of British superiority in numbers and artillery, bravely and warily as the Boers will contest the passage of the river and hold their scientific lines of defense.

A despatch from Lorenzo Marquez, dated Dec. 23, says a curious story is current, emanating from Boer sources, that Matt Steyn, brother of the president of the Orange Free State, and 800 Free Staters have definitely refused to continue the war. It was then we found we'were on an islard, As we followed the shore we came across a log cabin about three o'clock in the afternoon. We stayed in the shanty Tuesday night, and it was here water the started were so badly the steward's feet were so badly

shanty Tuesday night, and it was here that the steward's feet were so badly frozen. Wednesday, morning we could see the mainland about three miles away. We ripped the old shanty down and made a raft with which to get ashore on the main land. The raft was not large enough to hold all the men, and sank knee deep in the water when we all boarded it, but we started out and after drifting a couple of miles down the shore, making about five miles in all, we landed. As soon as the raft struck the shore it went to pieces. There was lotse from on the mainland, but we built a fire and camped in the bush all night. 

# VACUUM OIL RAISING OF HOGS. HALF BLIND FROM

Separate School Advocates Throw out the Furniture

Of the Belle River Public School-Law Suit Will Likely Result.

Windsor, Ont. Dec. 29 .- There were fresh developments in the Belle River school row vesterday. Committees of the public and separate school boards got together to attempt to arrive at some agreement as to the interests of hite public school supporters in the present school building and furin the present school building and fur-niture. The separate school trustees admitted that the furniture was pub-lic school property, but refused to ad-mit that public school supporters held any equity in the school building. The public school people suggested leaving the entire matter to arbitra-tion, both parties to agree to abide by the decision of the arbitrators. Fr. the decision of the arbitrators. Fr. Meunier, the local priest, advised against this, and the proposition was refused. Later on several separate school trustees visited the school and threw the furniture out of doors. The attorneys of the rival fac-

ions will get together this afternoon o try to patch up matters, and failing the courts will be asked to settle the trouble. A public school teacher has been engaged for next year, and if the trouble isn't adjusted before the term opens an attempt will be made to install him in one of the rooms of the present building, which will mean a fresh outbreak of hostilities.
