EXTRACT FROM THE RULES OF THE SOCIETY.

- 2. The management of the Society shall be under the direction of persons who are members of the United Church of England and Ireland; and all the Agents of the Society shall likikewise be members of the same.
- 3. The selection appointment, removal, and field of labor of all the Agents, together with the amount of their respective salaries, shall rest entirely with the Committee of the Society. The Clergymen employed by the Society shall be subject to the ecclesiastical jurisdiction of their Diocesans; and the schools shall be opened at all times to the visits of the Diocesan and the parochial missionary Clergy in their respective districts.

The following Resolutions relative to membership were adopted by the Corresponding Committee at a meeting held in the Committee Room on August 5th, 1877.

Resolved—"That every new member to be added to the Corresponding Committee of the Colonial Church and School Society, Montreal, shall be proposed at one meeting and elected at the next."

Resolved—" That no layman shall be elegible as a member unless he is or is willing to become, a subscriber to the funds of the Colonial Church and School Society, of not less than five dollars per annum. That no clergyman shall be eligible unless an annual parochial collection is made by him for the Society, or unless he himself is, or is willing to become, a subscriber to the Society of five dollars per annum."

Resolved—"That members of the Corresponding Committee who for one year absent themselves from its meetings shall, ipso facto, not be continued on the list of Committee."

SABREVOIS MISSION.

BASIS OF ITS OPERATIONS.

I.—The whole work, known as "The Sabrevois Mission," is conducted by the Corresponding Committee of the Colonial Church and School Society in Montreal; of which Committee the Bishop of the Diocese is, ex officio, Chairman.

II.—The Secretary of the Committe is also Superintendent of the Mission, having full charge and ordering of its affairs, under the Committee. To him all Missionaries and Agents are responsible, and shall correspond with him in all matters connected with the mission, shall render to him all necessary reports of work done, and returns of all collections and disbursements, and at all times give him such information as he may deem needful to publish or submit to the Committee.

III.—As a Mission, supported by a Church of England Society and other Church aid, it shall be strictly ordered, in all its missionary operations, according to the Rules of the Church. All public services shall be conducted according to the order of the Church. No deviation shall be made from this except with the sanction of the Bishop.

IV.—The Schools at Sabrevois were originally founded, and are supported, for the express purpose of giving to children of Roman Catholics and converts a good education, combined with sound religious instruction, according to the doctrine of the Church of England.

V.—In the schools, young men preparing for the Ministry, or as Colporteurs, or as Teachers, shall be regarded as a seperate class. When sufficiently advanced, those intending to take Holy Orders, shall, excepting under special circumstances, enter some Theological training college.

VI.—No English-speaking children shall be admitted into the schools, save in such exceptional cases as shall be sanctioned by the Committee.

VII .- The clergyman who has charge of the schools and the general oversight of the Institution, shall be styled the PRINCIPAL.

VII.—No Teachers or Agents shall be engaged in the schools, or other departments of the Mission, without the advice of the Superintendent and the sanction of the Committee.

ANNUAL REPORT

FOR YEAR ENDING DECEMBER 31st, 1880.

The Corresponding Committee beg to present their annual record of French work:—

Their various efforts for French Evangelization have been sustained much as in past years, but a most important step has been taken in the resolution to remove the boarding schools from Sabrevois to Montreal, to be carried on in connection with our French Protestant Church here, and under the more immediate observation of the Committees. The new school buildings are now in course of erection, and a large portion of the sum required for their completion is already in hand or promised, to secure which Rev. Messrs. Roy and Tucker have been most assiduous. In the accompanying report by Mr. Roy, interesting information regarding the new buildings will be found.

It may be said that three reasons, mainly, have led to this step: the inaccessibility of Sabrevois; the large sum which would have had to be expended upon the buildings there, to render them suitable for vigorous educational work; and the desire to have our schools under the more constant supervision of the Montreal Committee. The new colleges, now being erected, stand in the heart of a dense Roman Catholic population, among many of whom a spirit of enquiry is making itself manifest.

Since the close of the Sabrevois schools in May last, Rev. L. N. Tucker has been actively and most successfully engaged collecting funds, in the United States, Lower Provinces and

elsewhere. He is now in England for the same object. The energies of the Rev. J. J. Roy have also been largely taxed superintending our Mission work in this city and collecting in Ontario.

In May last, the Rev. Edward Roy, Missionary at St. Francis, was transferred to Montreal as teacher of the French School, and to act as *locum tenens* to his brother, the Pastor of L'Eglise du Redempteur, when absent collecting. His place at St. Francis was filled by the appointment of Rev. V. Lariviere, a convert and protegé of our work, who, after passing through the Sabrevois Schools, the Montreal Theological College, and McGill University, was ordained last spring. Mr. Lariviere has also rendered good service in raising funds.

The Rev. B. P. Lewis has continued Mission work at St. Gregoire with good results, as shown by his report.

The Rev. Jean Roy has been appointed Misssonary at Sabrevois, in which capacity the Committee trust he may prove himself a useful and earnest worker.

Upon the whole, the past year is one of promise. There are evidences that the Rock of Romanism is being "honey-combed" slowly but surely, and we are thankful to God that he has provided the means for sustaining our work, which, fully equipped and ever watchful, we would have standing as an open-armed asylum, to receive the enquiring or convinced, and to reap the "whitening fields."

It has pleased our God, during the past year, to remove by death a life-long friend and supporter of our work, the late Wm. McGinnis, Esq., of Iberville, at a ripe age. Full of honors and full of hope, he was gently gathered to his rest last autumn. ANNUAL REPORT OF THE MONTREAL LADIES' ASSOCIATION.

The Laders' Committee beg to submit their Annual Report for 1880. They are glad to record an increased attendance during the past year at their monthly meetings, and they trust that this is an evidence of a deeper interest taken in the work of the mission. Several new members have joined the Committee since the last Report, the names of Mrs. Renaud, Mrs. F. Renaud, Miss Gibb and Miss Cross having been added to the list.

The lamented death of Mrs. Bancroft, after a very short tenure of office, occurred just as the last Report was being printed, and necessitated the election of a new President, and at the October meeting of the Committee Mrs. M. H. Gault was unanimously elected to fill the vacant place. As a member of the Committee, she has long taken a warm interest in the work of the Sabrevois Mission, and the Committee are glad to have such a steady supporter of the work at their head. A resolution of condolence with the family of the late Mrs. Bancroft, expressing the sympathy of the Committee, in their great bereavement, was drawn up and forwarded to them.

Some of the friends of the Mission visited Sabrevois at the Annual Examinations, which were held by the Bishop on the 24th of May. The lady friends who ivisited the schools of that day were much gratified by what they there saw and heard, especially in points of domestic management, order and cleanliness being everywhere conspicuous, and the arrangements which were made for the entertainment of their numerous visitors reflected great credit on all concerned. The examinations were very interesting; and the answers, especially of the boys and girls when examined on Scripture subjects, most satisfactory, showing that they had not merely learnt by rote, but that they comprehended the meaning of the truths which had been taught them.

A special appeal has been made to the members of the Committee on behalf of the new building proposed to be erected in this city. The Revs. J. J. Roy and L. N. Tucker urged upon the ladies that they should make special efforts to obtain §2,000, the sum which will be required to furnish the school when built. An appeal has, therefore, been drawn up, and circulated amongst the ladies in all parts of the Dominion and elsewhere requesting them to unite in raising this sum, and it is hoped that by the time it is required the amount will be secured. But the Committee would desire to remember that the silver and the gold are the Lord's, and that He can open the hearts of people and answer the prayer of faith. REPORT OF THE REV. J. J. ROY, B.A., INCUMBENT OF "L'EGLISE DU RÉDEMPTEUR," MONTREAL.

The past year has much that resembles the preceding one, and not to repeat what has been said before, I shall confine myself to a few characteristic points,

In my regular pastoral work there have been cheering incidents that seemed to indicate the presence of the hand of God. The services lately have been better attended; several new faces have been seen in Church, and visited afterwards at their homes; the number of Sunday School scholars exceeds fifty, though the average attendance is much smaller; the day school has thirty-four pupils on the rolls; a watch service, held on New Year's Eve, filled the Church; strangers and Roman Catholics

have helped to occupy all the scats in the Lecture Hall, during concerts and musical and literary *soirées*, which have taken place at different times during the year.

The Annual Meeting of the Society and a Bazaar were a novelty with us. The Bazaar was held on behalf of the organ fund; in a pecuniary point of view it was hardly a success; it was not patronized as it might have been, had we chosen a different locality and another season of the year. Still, as money was not all we wished to get, it was not altogether a failure. Good results have ensued from the Bazaar: My people have been brought more together; they have learnt to know each other; they have been taught to work for their Church, and become more attached to it.

The Annual Meeting of the Sabrevois Mission was held in the Church. The Bishop presided. The Revs. Dr. Sullivan, Canon Baldwin and L. N. Tucker gave powerful and interesting addresses. Several of the city clergy were present, and my people were delighted to see the interest manifested towards their church and pastor by our English brethren. Several Roman Catholics attended the meeting, which was large, and a fact worthy of note is that the meeting was advertised in some of our leading French papers in the city.

In addition to the usual parish work and the weekly services, we had two controversial meetings. The character of these meetings has been described before, and suffice it to say that they are a continuation of those held last year. Some of the visible results are that many Roman Catholics have been led to inquire into the doctrines of Rome; others have been established in their disbelief in the errors of Rome and established in their disbelief in the errors of Rome and established in their faith in Christ, prejudices against us to a certain extent removed, and we have been brought into contact with a large number of Roman Catholics whom we would not otherwise have reached.

The erection of the new Mission Schools next to my Church has taken much of my time. The Bishop, in a recent circular, stated "that great good had already resulted from our work." He added also that "the present time is one of great promise; the field is white unto the harvest."

A few facts corroborate this statement. The last report of the Montreal General Hospital gives the number of Roman Catholic patients who have attended that institution last year as exceeding 8,000, twice as large as the number of Protestants. Fully one-half then, if not more, of the Montreal Roman Catholic sick and destitute must have gone to that institution. And we must take into consideration that Monseigneur Bourget issued a pastoral some four years ago, telling his people to have nothing to do with that heretical hospital, on the plea that it refused to obey him. This being the case, the Board of that Hospital must have more influence than a Monseigneur over 8,000 Roman Catholic souls of this once fanatical city.

Another fact, that may serve as a sign of the times. Half a million or more French-Canadians have gone to the United States. This year alone, so states an American paper, 70,000 have crossed the lines. And that, let us bear in mind, in spite of all the efforts made by our celebrated Repatriation Committee, and in spite of all the sermons of the Bishops and curés of the Province of Quebec, who have condemned that emigration in the strongest terms. This emigration to the United States has a powerful effect on the French-Canadians. It is stated that 25,000 of these emigrants have become Protestants.

Another characteristic fact. It is only a few days since the press reported the election of two French Protestants as aldermen of a leading Roman Catholic city of this Province. And it was in 1867 that the father of one of these councillors came to Sabrevois, and brought two of his children to the schools. On his visit there he related some of the incidents of his conversion and the persecution which he encountered. I remember his relating that one day, as he was working in the field during harvest time, there came to him an infuriated mob, acting, of course, under the advice and teachings of the priest. The poor man, in order to save his life and that of his sons, had to defend himself with scythes and pitchforks. And to-day the very people, perhaps, who mobbed the father, make the son a city councillor of St. Hyacinthe.

These few facts show that the field is white unto the harvest. To quote once more the words of our Bishop, "the work has now expanded and outgrown its former limits, and demands greater and improved facilities for its prosecution." It is then to meet the wants of the work that the Sabrevois schools have been transferred to Montreal. It must be perfectly understood, however, that in doing so, the mission work at Sabrevois is not interfered with in any way. The boarding establishment only is brought to the city; and a missionary is stationed at Sabrevois to carry on the work as before. The interest of the work generally demanded a more central locality and better buildings for the schools.

The new schools (as may be seen by looking at the engraving enclosed in this report), are in the Gothic style of architecture, and harmonize well with the *facade* of the Church. When completed they will be an insitution of which no churchman will need be ashamed.

The internal arrangements are very complete, and will furnish accomodation for over 100 boarders, boys and girls, and as many day scholars. The parsonage, which is a separate and independent building, forms the north side, the principal's residence the south side; between them are separate entrances for the boys and girls. The staircases are in the centre of the building, and lighted by a well from the roof, covered with a skylight. The building is so arranged that the boys and girls are entirely

separated, but still, can be united at any moment, when required. The basement of the schools contains all the appliances for cellerage, laundry, kitchen, etc., as well as three dining rooms. The central one, intended for the teachers, overlooks those of the pupils, which are situated on either side. These rooms can be made into one by raising folding doors, hung with weights. On the main floor are two large halls and five class rooms, opening one into the other by means of folding doors. On the second and third floors are six large dormitories, several small rooms, four lavatories, eight bath-rooms, closets, etc., all well lighted and ventilated.

I trust this new school will prove to be a blessing to this Province and to the Church at large, and that it will make every churchman believe the Sabrevois Mission (in the Bishop of Toronto's own words), "to be no unimportant branch of the great mission committed by Christ to His Church, which we are by no means to overlook in our care for those of our own communion, or our zeal for the conversion of the heathen."

The Rev. E. Roy, Assistant at L'Eglise du Redempteur and Teacher of the French School, Chatham Street, reports many encouragements. The Day School has increased, now having 25 scholars in attendance, all the children of former Roman Catholics. The Sunday School has also visibly increased, and is attended by some children of Roman Catholic parents. Roman Catholics are also found attending the Sunday services—especially in the evening.

He reports upwards of 200 visits paid of late, in such houses as are opento him, where tracts and Testaments have been distributed, and much enquiry evinced by those who only lack the *courage* to renounce Rome and her errors.

He pointedly sets forth the duty devolving upon Protestants to give work and employment to converts, who, on leaving the Church of Rome, are sure to be persecuted and, if possible, thrown out of employment.

SABREVOIS.

Little books are widely circulated among them in which history is falsified and our chief Reformers are slandered as men of corrupt morals and degraded lives, who have abandoned their cassocks to live in gross sin. Converts receive the name of apostates and turncoats. Protestant missionaries are spoken of as "false prophets coming in sheep's clothing but inwardly they are ravening wolves." Our version of the Bible is held up to reprobation as false, and is even styled the devil's book. Their translation must not only receive a Romish coloring, but when that fails to conceal the truth of God its plain meaning must be perverted by notes and comments. After all these precautions have been taken the people must be taught that it is a very dangerous book, never to be read without the express sanction of their pastor. The Church of Rome educates her children to these prejudices. They instill them into their minds from their infancy. Now it is with all these prejudices and religious animosities of the Romish Church that we have to contend. But in spite of all this we see much to encourage-much to recompense past labor-much to incite to renewed energy and devotedness. The Divine Book is sent into many dark regions where the voice of a missionary has not yet been heard, and it is proved that this Book does its work effectually to the spiritual enlightenment and conversion of many amidst a system of error and superstition. The Romish, priesthood though "wise in their generation," are not exercising the same influence over their flock as they did some years ago. The liberal and more enlightened Roman Catholics perceive the defects and abuses of their own religion; and now that the Bible is making its way, hundreds refer to it and study it earnestly to see "if these things are so."

"In my visits in the neighborhood I have met with encouragement, and am happy to state that I have been successful in placing five New Testaments, five Prayer Books, some portions of Scripture, some pamphlets containing The Articles of Our Church, and about two hundred tracts, a part of which were given to Protestants.

"I hold two Services per Sunday, which are generally well attended, and an Evening Service every fortnight in the families of French origin who seem to need a revival in spiritual matters."

Rev. B. P. Lewis, B.A., writes:

July.—I have much pleasure in reporting further progress at my St. Gregoir Station

Since my last report three have been Confirmed, and two others admitted

to Communion. Two $_{\Phi}$ of those confirmed were man and wife, recent converts from Rome, to whom the Bishop's address was interpreted in their own tongue.

Besides the five families of converts of this Station, which I reported last quarter, there are four other families with one Protestant member in each,—two men and two women. One of these men is yet apparently too timid to come to our services. But I was pleased some time ago at the fact of his stopping me while passing, and bringing me into the house, all the family being away at Mass. There I found his Bible and Prayer Book on the table, and he was making good use of the time while alone not that this is the only time when he can do so. I ask friends who read this to pray God that he may have more courage and light given to him.

At my last fortnightly Service there were eighteen present. December.—The work has suffered through the removal of converts to the United States. The mother of one of the families has recently died. I admitted her to the Holy Communion, some time previously. The Services continue to be attended by large and interested worshippers and hearers.

The Rev. V. Lariviere, B. A., Missionary at St. Francis, reports:

September.—Since my appointment here I have held pretty regularly two Services on Sunday and one every Wednesday evening till the middle of July. The latter was discontinued on account of the temporary absence of the Indians, most of whom, as usual, went to the States and spent part of the summer there, selling goods of their own manufacture. Before this Indian exodus took place, all these services were well attended. Yet, I must say, that with some it was a pretty hard task to persuade them to come to church.

One very encouraging fact, and one which gives hope for the future, is that at almost every Sunday Evening Service there are present some Roman Catholics. These Indians, though ignorant and superstitious, are yet less bigoted than their fellow-confreres in the faith—the Irish or the French Canadians. I have visited almost all the families residing in the Indian village—both Protestant and Romanist. Everywhere I have been well received. Everywhere I have distributed tracts and portions of God's Word. May the seed which has thus been cast bring forth fruit to the honor and glory of God.

I, therefore, comfort myself in the belief that there was hope in his death. All the Indians of the village assisted at his funeral. The church was filled to its utmost capacity. I availed myself of this opportunity to exhort them to be ready to meet their God. They all listened with the most serious attention. Let us all hope that the impressions which they then received proved beneficial to their souls.

STE. VICTOIRE

I have been able, notwithstanding my work at St. Francis, to hold regular monthly Services in Ste. Victoire. I feel always most happy to meet these few members of the Anglican Communion, and to offer with them the prayers and praises our church. The average attendance at these services has been twenty-five.

December.—It is not my privilege, in making my report for this Quarter, to be enabled to state any actual work done beyond the ordinary routine. I have been eight weeks absent from my ordinary field of labor, engaged in the West soliciting pecuniary aid in behalf of the Sabrevois Mission. However, during this involuntary absence of mine, the work here has not been neglected. Mr. E. Tucker, with the sanction of the Bishop, has held regularly Divine Services on Sunday; at which services the attendance has been invariably good.

I stated in my last report that alcohol was the great stumbling-block of these poor Aborigines. I had intended, last fall, to organize a kind of Temperance Society, in order to counteract, if possible, the evil of this degrading vice; but my trip in the Upper Province has compelled me to postpone, till after New Year, the attempt of this project. Though this statement may cast a gloom on the prospects of this Mission, yet this ought not to discourage us. Progress has been made even in this respect. I am told that liquor is beginning to be less freely used by them. May God give them strength to overcome that strong and inveterate passion for spirits.

A Sunday School of over twenty pupils has been lately organized. I am also preparing a class of twelve candidates to receive, at the first visit of the Bishop, the Rite of Confirmation.

Services at Ste. Victoire have not been held very regularly this term. This, however, could not very easily be prevented, under the circumstances as they have been, since the last few months.

TWENTY-EIGHTH ANNUAL REPORT

OF THE

COLONIAL CHURCH AND SCHOOL SOCIETY

FOR THE YEAR ENDING DEC. 31st, 1880.

With gratitude to God for many mercies, the Corresponding Committee present the 28th Annual Report of their proceedings. The need for their efforts was never greater than at present, as without them, many districts would be deprived of the means of education.

PRINCIPAL HICKS' REPORT.

The duty devolves upon me at the close of the year 1880, to send to the Committee my Report on the Model Schools maintained in the city of Montreal by the Colonial Church and School Society

The past year has been a successful one. The average attendance of the pupils has been large, and these schools have in every way accomplished the ends for which they were established more than a quarter of a century ago.

They still continue to furnish a good elementary education to over a hundred scholars, to whom as the basis of all they learn, religious instruction is systematically given, and they are daily used as practising schools for the training in the art of teaching of more than one hundred young persons, who are ultimately to become teachers in this rapidly developing Province. That these schools should have for so long a period been instrumental in carrying out the purposes just mentioned, is a proof of the wisdom of those who set them on foot, many of whom still give them the benefit of their support

and supervision; and their maintenance in their present efficiency is a pledge of the Society's determination to carry out one of their chief objects, namely, the instruction of those entrusted to their care in the great truths of the Holy Scriptures. The teachers in the schools are the same as last year. Miss Thornber has charge of the Girls' department, and Miss Hicks of the Boys' department, and Miss Lyons of the Infant School. These teachers have all been trained in the McGill Normal School, and hold Model School diplomas. They most faithfully discharge the duties of their respective positions in the Schools.

The infant department contains about twenty pupils, and is a most useful school for the preparation of the scholars for the work of more advanced classes. The schools are most carefully supervised by the Rev. Canon Evans, the Society's Secretary, who devotes a large portion of his time to the systematic instruction of the pupils. Bible lessons are given at regular intervals, and the Church Catechism and Liturgy furnish subjects for study which are regularly prepared by the scholars under the direction of the teachers.

As in past years, a considerable part of the teaching work is done by the pupils of the McGill Normal School.

It is a part of my duty to superintend these young people when thus engaged in fitting themselves by practice for their profession, and I can speak in high terms of the fidelity with which they perform the work entrusted to their care.

In concluding my report, I must again speak of the value of these schools as a means of educating a large number of children in a sound Scriptural manner. The parents who send their children as pupils are well aware of the importance of such instruction, and at the present time their example in this respect is not to be overlooked. Any circumstance then, that might occur which would tend in any way to lessen the usefulness of these schools would be deeply deplored, and would, I am sure, be looked upon as a misfortune by many parents in our rapidly increasing city.
