D., of Harvard University, Cambridge, Mass., Member of the Executive Council, and for many years its President—Speaker of the Legislative Council, and late Chief Justice of the Province. Mr. Sewell was a native of Boston, Massachusetts, son of the last distinguished Attorney Ceneral of the Province of Massachusetts, and as compelled to fly from thence at the time of the American Revolution. He was eminently distinguished, as well by the force of his natural abilities, as by the extent of his acquired talents.—He was one of those rare characters of which there are but few examples. Gifled with a happy memory, a vivid con-

racters of which there are but few examples. Gifted with a happy memory, a vivid conception, and sound judgment—possessing a perfect knowledge as well of classical literature as of history and law—indefatigable in his application and unrenfitting attention to public business, in his executive, legislative, and judicial capacities, he was at once a polished orator and incontestably one of the greatest legal characters that America has ever produced.

He was a good christian and an affection-ate parent, and has died deeply regretted by his family and numerous friends.
