VILLACOUBLAY, France, Aug. 15-The new self-righting flying apparatus invented by Lieut. J. W. Dunne, a retired British army officer, underwent most successful trials on the aerodrome here yesterday, in the presence of Brigadier-General Auguste Hirschauer, commander of the aerial corps of the

Major Julien Felix, a French army aviator, was the pilot. He ascended in a high gust of wind, considered too strong to face by the other aviators present.

The apparatus displayed a degree of stability which drew expressions of amazement from all the expert witnesses. From time to time Major Felix removed his hands from the levers and held them above his head to show the automatic equilibum of the machine, which retained a perfect level even when encountered eddies, air pockets or squalls.

His Solicitors Threaten Libel Action Against the Courier -This Journal's Stand is For Municipal Ownership and Discontinuance of Disgraceful Street Car Conditions Which Prevail.

The Courier to-day received the following letter from Toronto solicitors who are the representatives of certain bondholders of the Grand Valley Railway Company: Toronto, Ont., August 14th, 1913.

The Brantford Courier, Brantford, Ontario:

"Dear Sirs,-Mr. E. B. Stockdale, who has been appointed and who is acting as Receiver of the Grand Valley Railway Company on the direction of the Court, has received copies of the issue of your paper relating to the management and direction by him in his capacity as Receiver of the affairs of the company, and also relating to the remuneration awarded to him in the operation of the three railways. "We think you are aware that an action is pending in the High Court between the City of Brant-ford and the Grand Valley Railway Company et al, and the publication by you in the issues of your paper are quite in contempt of the court in which the action is pending, and, further, are libellous upon Mr. Stockdale in his capacity as Receiver.

"Many of the statements in your publications are quite erroneous, as could and would have been ascertained by you if you had made careful inquiries. "In the event of any repetition by you of the matters complained of, we shall be obliged to insti tute proceedings in court against you, without further notice, at the suit of Mr. Stockdale.



SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-WEST LAND REGULATIONS
ANY PERSON who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years old may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Land Agency or Sub-Agency for the District. Entry by proxy may be made at any agency on certain conditions, by father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of intending homesteader.

Duties—Six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within the miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres, solely owned and occubied by him or by his father, mother, son. daughter, brother or sister.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section alongside his homestead. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside upon the homestead or pre-emption six months in each of six years from date of homestead or pre-emption six months in each of six years from date of homestead outry (including the time required to earn homestead patent), and cultivate 50 acres extra.

A homesteader who has exhausted his A homesteader who has exhausted his homestead right, and caunot obtain a preemption may enter for a purchased homestead in certain districts, price \$3.00 per scre. 





OFFICER RIDES OVER A DARK PRECIPICE

Climax to the Reckless Ride of a Fearless Horseman.

It Carried Horse and Rider Past the Edge of a Sheer Cliff to a Fall of Two Hundred and Fifty Feet to the Rocks and Water Below, Yet the Man Lived.




