Extensive preparations are being made for the success of the convention of Maritime Union of Christian Endeavor, and Epworth League of Christian Endeavor, to be held in Truro, August 20th, 21st and 22nd, says the Truro News. A large representation of delegates from all over the maritime provinces is expected. The committees have been actively at work for the last month, and everything is being done in a most systematic manner. The first service will be held in the First Presbyterian church in which the address of welcome to the delegates will be delivered, and in the evening a public meeting will be held. While the convention is in session, appointments will be made for a grand rally in each church in town that is connected with the work of the convention.

An individual who over the signature of "Tucker" has been contributing news as alleged to be items of Wolfville news to the Kentville Chronicle for the past few weeks, in the last effusion published proclaims to the world the fact that he has "no use for the ACADIAN." It is very fortunate that he has not as he is evidently not in a position to pay the subscription price and we already have all the dead-heads on our list that we wish to carry. If we are not very much mistaken his account now shows a respectable balance in our favor. The most apparent need of our friend "Tucker" if he intends to continue in literary work, is an elementary work on English grammar and composition.

A new book on Canada, by Dr Bourinot, will shortly be issued. It is entitled "How Canada is Governed," and gives in plain, simple language a short account of the development of the country from its origin and development. The book will be illustrated with numerous engravings and autographs, and being the work of so eminent an authority as Dr Bourinot, will be indispensable to those who wish to be well informed about the status of the Dominion. The Copp, Clark Company, (Limited), are the publishers.

Another projected attempt to reach the Pole is announced. This time the explorer is a Swedish engineer, M. Andre, and he proposes to accomplish the undertaking by means of a balloon. It is to maintain an altitude not less than 800 feet and M. Andre expects to be able to direct the course of his balloon by sails. He estimates that he will be able to sail in his airship directly across the Pole from Spitzbergen to Behring Sea in six days. Of the \$35,000 required for carrying out the project, it is stated that King Oscar has subscribed about \$5,000, and it is expected the whole fund will be raised shortly.

The now celebrated case, Shea vs. O'Connor, of Halifax, an action for slander, ended at Truro on Thursday last. The action arose over an overcoat. Two years ago Shea and O'Connor happened to be guests one evening at the St. Elmo hotel, Rockingham, near Halifax. Shea left first, after which O'Connor missed his overcoat and charged that Shea had stolen it. At the same time he is alleged to have called Shea a very unbecoming name. Shea did not have the coat, as it subsequently turned up. The jury returned a verdict for plaintiff, awarding Mr. Shea \$225 damages.

While engaged in raking his garden at St. Andrews, N. B., on Wednesday last, Dr Parker picked up a coin that had been struck in April, 1795, to commemorate the marriage of Queen Caroline and King George IV. Though it had evidently been hidden in the earth for many years there was scarcely any corrosion on it, and the inscription could be read with ease.

A wealthy Lenoxx, at an expense of \$10,000, has constructed a "color organ," the keys of which on being depressed not only evoke music, but also throw upon a screen the color corresponding with the note vibration, according to the undulatory theory of light. The effect in rapid playing was brilliant in the extreme, but very fatiguing to the eyes.

The invitation to Rev. Dr. R. L. Whitman, president of Colby college, Waterville, Maine, to become president of the Columbian university, has been accepted by him. He will enter upon the duties of the new position in September. Dr. Whitman was born in Nova Scotia, and graduated from Brown university eight years ago with honors.

A monster excursion to Boston, under the auspices of the St. Patrick's T. A. & B. Society, of Halifax, is being arranged to take place in August, via the Yarmouth route. The musical organization of St. Patrick's Society will give a complete performance in one of the Boston theatres.

Independent Order of Foresters.

Through the courtesy of Mr William Regan, Court Deputy of Court Biomedon, we have received the following interesting facts concerning the independent Order of Foresters:

During the month of May the number of applications for membership received by the Medical Board was 4,022, of whom 3,611 were accepted, showing an advance of over 500 on the highest number of applications ever received in any one month.

The Surplus Fund of the Order on the 1st of June showed the high total of \$1,317,000.

On the 30th of May the corner stone of the Foresters' Temple was laid by His Excellency the Earl of Aberdeen, Governor-General of Canada, in the presence of an immediate concourse of Foresters and their friends.

The Temple will be eight stories high and will be the finest Fraternal headquarters on the continent.

The Forestry year closes on the 30th of June, and in every particular it will be the most prosperous year in the history of the Order.

The increase in the Surplus has been \$360,000.00, and in the Membership about 18,000.

For the month of June it is expected that at least 5,000 applications will be received.

During the year New Courts have averaged 35 per month.

The Supreme Court will meet at St. Martin's Town Hall, Trafalgar Square, on the 1st day of August.

The High Court of Ontario will meet at London, Ontario, on the 8th of October.

Evening Stars.

A correspondent to the Montreal Star says: To those who, like myself, love star-gazing, there is presented at the present and will be for some days to come the unusual spectacle of the appearance as evening stars of no less than five of the principal planets of our system; namely, Mercury, Venus, Mars, Jupiter and Saturn; and as the like star combination will not appear upon the scene for many a long year to come, it will be well for amateur astronomers to keep a bright look upon the heavens every clear evening this week.

The splendid object in the western sky, visible from a few minutes after sunset until 10.30 p. m., is Venus. Somewhat below, and a little more to the north, is Mars, visible from 8.30 to 9.15 p. m., somewhat faint. At nine o'clock p. m., Jupiter is approaching his setting, on the southwest horizon, and on looking a little above him, in the general line of the ecliptic, is seen the planet Saturn, the best time to observe this seldom seen planet is 8.45 to 9 o'clock p. m., Saturn is high in the zenith and visible all night.

Mothers' Meeting.

The last regular meeting of the Woman's Christian Temperance Union of this place was a mothers' meeting—open to all women.

It is the purpose of the Union to substitute such meetings for the regular meeting once every two months. Mrs. Boggs gave an address, on the occasion above referred to, in most profitable and inspiring words. The subject for consideration was "The Spiritual training of our Children." No mother present could have failed to realize very fully her responsible charge, nor could she have failed to discern the true sources of her power. After this address the meeting was thrown open for prayer and for discussion, and was pervaded by a most solemn and uplifting influence.

No woman to whom is intrusted the training of children can afford to lose the aid and the inspiration gained by thus sharing her sympathy, her prayers and her experience with other women who are doing the same work. — M. W. T.
