Democracy
Since the outbreak of the present European struggle the principles of democracy have commanded considerable attention. The one man power now appears to be on the wane and despotic rule will be long numbered as past history. And surely this is a bright era that has dawned upon us and must be beneficial in its effects.
But whilst nations are rejoicing in the changes that are coming about there are perils in connection with democracy which are not to be lost sight of.
Two countries in Asia and Europe have made advancement from despotism to democracy and we see strikingly exhibited in them both the dangers that loom up when a change is effected. China in Asia is perfectly helpless. Why? The education of her people is a hide bound antiquarianism. Russia in Europe is in the same predicament. She is helplessly struggling against internal troubles that threaten her ruin.
What is wrong with these two countries? In some respects they are perhaps the greatest nations of the world but their people lack education. To be prosperous under democratic rule requires that the people be intelligent. Not only that morality prevail but intellectual endowment are to be cultivated as well.
It is a good sign to see the world becoming democratic. But in order to succeed under democratic rule the people must be taught. Not only to a certain extent in literature, arts and sciences, but also to make us just to the poorer and ruling and reigning over all.

All Canadian Women Will Be Given Vote.
In the coming session of parliament a measure of general woman suffrage for Canada is proposed. This was outlined by Sir Robert Borden in parliament last year and subsequently during the recent election.
It was learned last week that such action had been decided on and over 1,500,000 women voters will be added to the list.
This was one of the demands of the organized labor representatives in their recent conference with the government.
In five provinces of the Dominion Ontario, Manitoba, Alberta, Saskatchewan and British Columbia, women already have the right to vote.

Every One A Farmer.
In the labor force represented by people in cities, towns and villages is the principle hope of any large increase in the production of food in Canada in 1918. There must be readjustment between producers and non-producers if the present dangerous situation is to be relieved. The Canadian farmer today is doing his utmost. Even the inducement of higher prices would not result in much greater production, because greater production is for him a physical impossibility under present conditions of labor scarcity. The dwellers in cities and towns must now indeed grave and now is the time when plans must be made for the coming season.—Food Bulletin.

The Cost of Milk Production and the Farmer's Profit.
FARMERS' FARMERS NOTE.
The principles of cost accounting in agriculture should be applied to the business of milk production. The farmer who always sells above cost, for a fair price for milk which is one of the cheapest foods.
To find the cost of milk production is a simple matter in accounting, because of the complexity of the conditions surrounding the industry, but the importance of the product has led to many investigations with the following average results using present day feed and labour charges:—
EXPENDITURE PER COW.
Feed at cost prices.....\$22.90
Labour per cow including handling of milk.....\$55.27
Interest and depreciation on herd per cow.....\$10.41
Insurance, repairs and depreciation on buildings.....\$8.74
Depreciation on equipment.....50
Losses for abortion, tuberculosis, pneumonia, etc.....\$1.95
Veterinary services and drugs.....86
Cash sundries.....1.86
Added interest of owner in excess of that exhibited by hired help.....60
Total.....\$170.26
RECEIPTS PER COW.
6167 pounds of milk at 20c per gallon.....\$123.34
12 tons manure at \$2.00 per ton.....\$24.00
Total.....\$147.34
Under the above conditions milk costs the farmer 27.5c per gallon or 6.2c per quart, at most he is selling it for 20c per gallon or 7.2c per quart. The profit left to the farmer is very little over the value of the manure for his farm. In one investigation conducted on twenty-five dairy farms keeping an average of 20 cows each, the average profit per cow per year was \$8.23 while on the twenty-five dairies as a percentage of net profit whatever.
While 6167 pounds of milk per cow per year may seem a small yield to some farmers, it is in reality a very good average, exceeding the average for Eastern Canada, by 2000 pounds. The farmer's remedy lies in increasing the average production of his herd.

Toronto, Feb. 26.—Under a penalty not less than \$100, and not more than \$1,000, recoverable by any one suing therefor and in the case of a corporation, cancellation of its charter, the use of the German language in schools, churches or by public bodies, is proposed to be forbidden in Ontario according to the provisions of a bill introduced by Dr. Farber Godfrey, West York, in the legislature yesterday afternoon.

The Japanese Girl.

The charming operetta, "The Japanese Girl," will be given under the direction of Miss Newey in College Hall, March 15, 1918. A well trained chorus and soloists in pretty costumes, beautiful songs will make it an evening of rare musical pleasure. 
