Appointed Judges for Calgary Fair

AAM ROCALOGE CANALAGER REALESTER

The exhibition directors held a well attended meeting in the Board of Trade rooms yesterday afternoon, at which the general business matters and preparations for the approaching Calgary fair were discussed.

Mr. I. S. G. Van Wart occupied the chair, and the following were present:

Mr. Wooley Dodd, Mr. Thompton, Mr. Tregillus, Mr. Dewey, Mr. Laycock, Mr. Geddes, Mr. Fowler, and Mr. Weir.

After some discussion it was decided that the live stock exhibits would be allowed to leave at t o'clock on Friday, the last day of the fair, and that the various other exhibits could be removed at o'clock,

The four days of the fair will be divided up in the following order: Tuesday July 9th, Farmer's day. Wednesday July 10, Citizens' day. Thursday July 11, Americans' day. Friday July 12, Ranchers' day. It was arranged that the services

of Mr. Peter Bain, of Brandon, be obtained as the official starter at the horse races, and this announcement will be heralded with nusnimous approval, as Mr. Pane is well knewn to fulfill this capacity with the utmost satisfaction. Mr. McPhee of Red Deer, J, K. Thompson and G. Boss of Calgary, will act as the live stock judges. The services of Mr. E. N. Barker will be secured as judge of the poultry exhibits; C. Marker of the dairy and bread, C, Lyndon, of Toronto, will fill the capacity of judge at the dog show, and A. Mitchell, chief inspector of noxious weeds for the province, will judge the grains, vegetables, grasses, plants, flowers, natural history and school work. The art and [photography exhibits will be judged by Mr. Winter; the manufacutrers' exhibits by W.J. Fowler; and for the ladies' work Mrs. Wooley Dodd and Mrs. Foster will act in a similar capacity. The advisability of providing a firework display for the evening attraction at the fair occupied a considerable length of time, during which Mr. L. H. Doll explained how he had been at a loss over the firework display contract on several previous seasons, and submit-ted a proposal to the directors to company. Royalty at the rate of ten cents per ton of 2000 pounds shall be furnish the fireworks display. However, it was finally decided to reject this proposal. and substitute as an evening attraction a series of accordingto capital. baseball matches. 
