So it is with the wills of the many great men. The will of the late Chief Justice White of the United States was not much longer. This is what it said: "This is my Thomas A. Edison last will. I give, bequeath and devise to my wife, Leita M. White in complete and perfect ownership all my rights and property of every kind and nature, whether real, personal or mixed, wherever situated, tate without bond and giving her thereof." A remarkably document and one over which it would be difficult enough to bring any action designed to alter its provisions. It is not unlike the will of the late E.H. Harriman filed in 1909, which was so brief, yet so indisputable, that it was regarded as a model. In addition to the attestations it ran: "I Edward H. Harriman, of Arden, in the State of New York, do make, publish and declare this as and for my last will and testament, that is to say: I give, devise and bequeath all my property, real and personal. of every kind and nature to my wife, Mary W. Harriman, to be hers absolutely and forever, and I do hereby nominate and appoint the





This is a modern view. The dea that privileged ruling classes brought special wisdom, zeal and unselfish devotion to the business of managing a people's affair received a rude shock from the war it has received another from the disillusion following the war. Able politicians there are in fair abundance; but there is a disposition to grudge according them the title of statesman. And that feeling is perhaps not unconnected with the distrust of unquestioned leadership which was once associated with the idea of a statesman. The world wants comradeship more than leadership.

Statesmen may make a state

powerful, and respected, and even establish some degree of prosperity among the masses. Bismarck was no doubt, a statesman in the old sense of the word. So was the first Napoleon. The ex-Kaiser might lay some claims to the title. 


