**Cardinal Manning on the Character and Spirit of a True Priest.**

In a pastoral letter addressed to the clergy and laity of his diocese on the 12th of May, His Eminence Cardinal Manning discusses the following on "the character and spirit of a true priest":

Our grateful and most anxious duty is to examine and to decide who they are whom God calls to his priesthood. It needs a sure spiritual discernment, prolonged and tested by a watchful care of years. It is not the worthy who are called to it, but the worthy who are not called to it. It is easy to deceive ourselves, especially when what we desire is a good work. To desire to be a priest, to be a priest, is another. When the desire and fitness are united there is a full hope and presumption of a call from God. And yet desire and fitness without perseverance are not enough, nor are desire and fitness and perseverance enough without a long and careful cultivation of intellect, heart and will in the sacred science of faith and the training and formation of the sacerdotal life. The mind and intention of the Catholic church is that from the sacred age of twelve to the maturity of twenty-four the priest should be trained from boyhood to manhood, from the tuncure to the priesthood.

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Interior spiritual perfection is required before ordination. A priest is not ordained that he may attain that spiritual state: he is ordained that he may exercise this spiritual power already attained in making others perfect. What fidelity to God and what wise and deliberate training are needed for such work. The council of Trent teaches that the priest must go further still: he must be blameless in all things, and must be able to give an account of his life to God. It is not only the substance of his life that is required, but the bloom and fragrance of his life. The priest must be generous and tender, generous and tender in love for souls, for friends and for enemies, for the good and for the evil, for the pleasing and for the displeasing. Such charity comes from "the union of the Holy One," and the priest on whom it rests becomes all things to all men by the power of a changeless love.

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**A SHIP SEVEN DAYS ON FIRE.**

The Baltimore American of the 2nd inst. publishes a letter from Captain Thomas Robertson, of the steamer Hawkhurst, to Messrs. Gustavus & Co., of Baltimore, which tells the story of one of the most remarkable exhibitions of pluck, bravery and seamanship on record. The fact of sailing seven days over a distance of 2,800 miles on a burning vessel, and declining to stop at points where facilities for putting out the fire without endangering the cargo and ship could be obtained, was regarded by the Emperor of Brazil as a noteworthy achievement, and he awarded the first class. The Hawkhurst is a British steamer and belongs to the London and Brazil. Captain Robertson says: "The Hawkhurst sailed from London on March 4, bound for Rio Janeiro with a general cargo. On March 22nd we were in latitude 11 degrees north, longitude 57 degrees west, 500 miles south of the island of St. Vincent, when at 3 a.m. a dense volume of smoke was seen coming out of the ventilators in No. 2 hold. A CITY REDUCED TO ASHES.

The town of Seattle, Washington Territory, was visited by a terrible fire on the 7th inst., which laid the business part of the city in ruins. The fire originated in a building on Madison street, and spread with such rapidity that in a short time it was entirely beyond control. The flames and citizens fought the flames with water, but the fire did not stop until it had destroyed the buildings covering sixty-four acres of land. Hundreds of people are without lodgings and had to sleep for several days on the ground. The fire is under martial law, guarded by several companies and a committee of 200 citizens. One hundred thieves have been arrested. The loss to property caused by the fire will amount to about \$10,000,000. Already workmen are clearing up lots preparatory to rebuilding. Telegrams conveying news of the disaster have been received from all the cities of the coast.
