## Items of Interest to Catholic Readers

(Sacred Heart Review.)

REFUTED BY THEIR OWN RITUAL.

In a article which he contributes to the current issue of the London Month, under the title of "How to Be Made an Anglican; a New Light on Continuity," Rev. Herbert Thurston, S. J., refutes, in a very conclusive manner, by arguments drawn from Anglican ritual, the claims of those members of the English Establishment who contend that the apostolic continuity of their church was not broken at the time of the English Reformation. Before entering upon his subject, Fr. Thurston devotes a couple of paragraphs to an assertion that lately appeared in the Anglican Guardian, which stated in a leading article that "there are thousands of de-variant Romanists" now numbered in the membership of the Anglican Church.

On this statement, after premising that by "de-variant Romanists" the Guardian probably means persons who were baptized and brought up in the Catholic Church, Fr. Thurston remarks that while it cannot be denied, unfortunately, that the Church, in England as elsewhere, has suffered losses from one cause or another, very few of those losses are attributable to Anglican arguments or prove gains to the Anglican fold. "The converts to Anglicanism from conviction," says he, "those neither for temporal advantage nor to shake themselves free from a vow of celibacy they have grown tired of, nor to recover a credit which misadventure in their own communion has forfeited, pass from one Church to another, these are the people whom we should like to hear more of, and whose lives, if they were written, would do more to stay the tide setting from England to Rome than all the 'Plain Reasons and Anglican Briefs' that ever were published." The Rev. writer is not surprised, however, that his Anglican friends, when they claim "converts" from Catholicism, prefer to deal with generalities rather than mention particular cases. He mentions three instances—one of them the unpleasant experience which lately befell the Anglican bishop of Marlborough, who, it will be remembered, figured rather ludicrously before the public gaze a month or so ago by claiming that a priest who wanted to become an Anglican had been kidnapped by the wicked Catholics—wherein Anglicans came to grief by going into particulars regarding their "converts" from the Church; and he contends that Sydney Smith's famous saying about the Pope throwing weeds over his garden wall, as far as Anglicanism is concerned, lost none of its point since it was uttered.

WHAT THE ANGLICAN RITUAL RE- QUIRES.

Fr. Thurston, after this little digression from his subject, proceeds to examine the Anglican ritual wherein the form, used up to within seven years ago, "for admitting converts from the Church of Rome, and such others as shall renounce their errors" is given; and he shows by numerous citations from the questions and answers in that form, that from the time of the English Reformation up to 1890 certainly, persons who entered the Anglican from the Catholic fold were obliged to renounce belief in points of faith which incontestably proved that there was not, and could not be, any continuity between the Catholic Church and the Established religion. The form from which Fr. Thurston quotes was "prepared by the Upper House of Convocation, A. D. 1714," and it remained in use up to 1890, when it was amended in some particulars. These emendations, however, do not appear to have commended themselves to any great extent to the Anglicans, judging from the comment of the Guardian, which says that the time spent in making them might have been easily put to better use, and which declares that there is not any probability of the amended form coming into general use. Fr. Thurston makes many strong points against the pretensions of the Anglicans who claim continuity for their Church by quoting against them this ritual of 1714, which required persons entering the Anglican from the Roman fold to reject doctrines that are considered fundamental ones by all Catholics, thus showing that there never was such connection between the Catholic and Anglican creeds as the upholders of continuity claim. "For a layman," says he of the Anglican bishops who prepared this 1714 form, "he considered that a simple declaration of belief in the Bible as the sole and sufficient rule of faith, together with a renunciation of Popish superstitions, was sufficient. But for a priest in orders, who understood theology, something more was required. He must formally renounce

## Just those propositions in the Creed

of Pope Plus IV., that is, the Creed of the Council of Trent, which the Catholic Church in turn required

adhesion to in the case of one who passes from Anglicanism into her communion. In other words, the Anglican bishops of 1714 were quite at one in their view of the points at issue between the churches. What was the distinctive faith of a Catholic was that he accepted the twelve last articles of the Creed of Pope Plus; what was the distinctive faith of an Anglican was that he rejected them." Fr. Thurston, furthermore, emphasizes his point by showing that among the articles of faith which an Anglican, according to this form, was obliged to reject was belief in the Mass as a true, proper and propitiatory sacrifice, in Transubstantiation and the Real Presence of Christ in the Eucharist, in Purgatory and other doctrines, all of which was in the 1714 Anglican ritual pronounced "grounded upon no warrant of Scripture, but rather repugnant to the Word of God."

THE NEW ANGLICAN RITUAL.

The revised Anglican ritual, that amended by convocation of 1890, Fr. Thurston admits, qualifies the rejection of those propositions of the Creed of Pope Plus by providing for their rejection "as far as they are at variance with the articles and formularies of the Church of England" and he says that the motive of this qualification was to lend color to the Ritualist argument, put forward conspicuously in the famous Tract 90, that it is not true Roman doctrine, but the abuse of such doctrine, that Anglicanism condemned in its ritual of 1714. But, says Fr. Thurston, it is not Roman abuses, but Roman doctrine, as that was stated in the careful, well-considered words of the Fathers of the Tridentine Council, which this ritual rejects and condemns; whence he very properly concludes that "it is surely no rash or fast-fetched inference to draw that the framers of that form could never have asked for such a pledge if they believed that any of the dogmas to which those twelve articles give expression were also common to the Church of England." He also declares that the revised ritual of the Established church requires a more significant rejection of those fundamental Catholic dogmas than did the 1714 form, for that was content with a simple rejection of them, whereas the present form requires the convert to Anglicanism to say that he rejects them "on mature deliberation."

Fr. Thurston does not overlook the fact that the form of 1714 was never officially incorporated in the formularies of the Church of England, though passed by both houses of the Convocation; but he explains its non-incorporation on the ground—so stated in the records of the convocation—that there was no time for it before the end of the session and by reason of the Queen's death before the next session. Unless, though, he pointedly adds, the Anglicans are ready to claim for the English sovereign a position in their church analogous to that the Catholic Church occupies in the Catholic Church, the absence of royal assent from a form approved by both Houses of Convocation detracts nothing from its validity or binding force. In fact, he shows, by quoting canon 139, that the royal assent is not required in such cases; and hence he concludes that the 1714 form with its rejection of fundamental Catholic doctrines and its consequent proclamation of non-continuity between the Anglican Establishment and the Catholic Church, must be regarded as an authoritative exposition of the mind of the English Church at the time it was drawn up and approved by that church.

NO CONTINUITY OF ORGANIZATION.

Having thus disposed of the Anglican claim to continuity of doctrine by Anglican arguments, Fr. Thurston goes on to show that there is no ground for the other Anglican pretension; upon which certain controversialists are given to playing great stress nowadays, that the Anglican church of the present is in organization the same as it was before the Reformation. The learned clergyman argues that dissimilarity of fundamental teaching, of itself and necessarily, implies dissimilarity of organization and well says that "if the church of England in the eighteenth century formally contradicted and anathematized in its representative assembly the doctrines which were universally held to be matters of faith, and the denial of which was heresy in the fourteenth and the Anglican Establishment undeniably did that, no similarity of organization or ritual can show the pre-Reformation and the post-Reformation Church to be one and the same." He reminds his readers that it is not a question here of doctrines defined since the Reformation, like the Immaculate Con-

## ception or Papal Infallibility; but

of dogmas that were taught and accepted from the beginning, and he contends that any church which formally condemns and anathematizes such dogmas, which it once taught, has ceased to exist and can advance no claim to apostolical continuity. To the claim that before the Reformation the term "The English Church" was often used, Fr. Thurston replies that that term was simply a geographical expression, used for the sake of convenience—just as Catholics in this country at times speak of the American Church—but by no means signified that the English Church was a distinct communion from Rome and independent thereof. He quotes Dr. Maitland, the Protestant, whose authority is unquestioned, as a witness that there is no continuity of practice between the English church of to-day and the English Church as it existed prior to the Reformation; and he also adds that even if the reformers had left the liturgy and practice of the pre-Reformation Church unchanged, and even if every bishop and incumbent had remained where he was and retained all his previous functions, the radical change of doctrine, effected at the time of the Reformation, would alone suffice to destroy continuity in the only sense in which it is worth while speaking of such a thing.

A SUPPOSITIOUS CASE.

Fr. Thurston puts a suppositious case to the Anglican claimants of a apostolic continuity for their church which is calculated to puzzle them not a little. He asks them whether, in case some future government of England should fill the Anglican episcopate with men of the stamp of the late Dr. Jewett or Canon Freeman, and those prelates drew up a new set of articles condemning the Athanasian Creed, the Incarnation, etc., as "blasphemous fables and dangerous deceits," and remodeled the Book of Common Prayer so as to leave in it no acknowledgement of Christ's divinity; and supposing that these new articles were approved of by Parliament, they would accept such an article of church as a continuation of the present Establishment! Yet such changes would be no greater—in some respects they would be much smaller—than what the reformers made when they established the Anglican Church, which now claims identity with the Catholic Church!

In concluding this necessarily imperfect review of Fr. Thurston's trenchant paper we comment on the serious and thoughtful consideration of the "High" church ministers the following passage: "How a 'High' church clergyman," says this English Jesuit, "who thinks he celebrates Mass as we do, prays for the dead as we do, receives the Blessed Sacrament as we do, invokes the saints, venerates relics and decorates his church with statues as we do, can subscribe a code of doctrinal propositions which speaks of the Sacrifice of the Mass as 'blasphemous fables, etc.,' and describes the 'Romish doctrine concerning purgatory, images and the invocation of saints' as 'a fond thing vainly invented,' which, moreover, highly commends the teaching of the Homilies, a teaching which such a man detests with his whole soul—all this, I say, almost passes comprehension. . . . To put the matter at its lowest, there is surely something a little anomalous, if not slightly humorous, in the idea that the modern Anglican clergyman, who professes such profound veneration for his mother, the pre-Reformation English Church, continuous and indefeasible should be required to prove his fitness for receiving her orders by signing the thirty-nine articles, in other words, by giving that venerated mother a slap in the face."

NEWS OF THE WEEK.

Lawson, the Swede, broke two skating indoor records at Washington the other night for fifty miles—the professional record by 1 hour, 23 minutes, 12 seconds, and the amateur record (Donoghue's) by 15 minutes 47 seconds. He made the distance in three hours.

President Eliot, of Harvard University, has offered Secretary of State Olney the international law professorship of that institution. Mr. Olney has taken the matter under consideration with the hope of accepting it providing it does not interfere too much with his regular practice, which he is unwilling to abandon.

The yacht Fra Diavolo, which was owned by the late Alexander Herrmann, the magnate, was libeled in New York, the other day by United States Deputy Marshal Koob. The seizure was made under a judgment for \$465 obtained by Stephen P. Hedges, a yacht rigger of Greenport, L. I. Unless the judgment is paid the yacht will be sold to cover the judgment.

Thanks to the National Policy, it is the fact that Canada has no reciprocity treaty with the United States, this country is in a comparatively prosperous condition, while thousands are actually starving in the United States, and hundreds of thousands are dependent upon charity to keep soul and body together. Were the business of this country closely bound up with that of the United States by a reciprocity treaty, this country would suffer whenever the United States suffered; Canada would be but an echo of the larger country, and twice within a few years this country would have been plunged into hard times and starvation, as the United States was plunged. But, thanks to the fact that the National Policy kept us entirely free from business entanglement with the United States, Canada has been able to pull through these periods of depression with comparatively little suffering. Even now, when the resources of the United States are being taxed to feed the starving poor of that country, prosperous Canada is able to give help to the starving poor of India.—Hamilton Spectator.

Speaking at the conservative convention held at Winnipeg on the 4th Hon. Hugh John Macdonald said the first duty of his party in the province was to oust Greenway, for as long as he was in power, the franchise would be so juggled that success would be impossible. Hogg John absolutely declined to take the leadership of local opposition, stating that his place was by his leader, Sir Charles Tupper, at Ottawa.

Advices received at Washington from British Guiana, at the bureau of American republics, state the colonial legislatures had been dissolved for the first time in five years and a general election was ordered to occur on January 20. Before the last session closed a resolution was passed to pay the government surveyor Harrison \$300 as part compensation for his arrest seven months ago by the Venezuelans on Acaorabiso, this sum to be deducted from any indemnity for arrest Venezuelans hereafter makes under pressure from British government.

The principal fish exporting merchants of St. John's, Nfld. have presented a memorial to the government asking for the enforcement of the bait act against the French upon the ground that the latter's bounty led to excessive competition and destroyed foreign trade, Newfoundland fish being unsaleable in Europe. The government was also urged to resume negotiations with the United States looking to reciprocity arrangements in the matter of salted as well as of fresh fish. It is desired that salted and fresh fish shall be considered as one article. The people of Newfoundland are anxious to arrange for a free entry for their fish products into the United States.

The Allan Line steamer Carthaginian, abandoned her attempt to reach St. John's, Nfld., owing to the ice blockades which extend south to Cape Race. She signalled she intended to proceed to Liverpool. The coastal mail steamers are located at that port. The steamer Nimrod has apparently failed to find the missing steamer State of Georgia. She was sighted off Cape Race recently fast in the ice, without any other steamer in sight.

LOCAL AND OTHER ITEMS.

RICHARD POPE, Deputy Commissioner of Patents died on Sunday last.

AVIATORS from Toronto, who owing to the dullness of trade, several cotton mills will close.

THOMAS FLAHERTY, a workman in a foundry in St. John, N. B., was crushed to death while at work on Monday last.

The Dominion government has decided to send a commissioner to central Africa to hunt up a new market for Canadian produce.

ACCORDING to official returns from Bombay, there have been, in India, up to the 6th inst., 5,098 cases of the plague, and 3,841 deaths.

A FIRE occurred at Newcastle, N. B., Sunday night and destroyed ten buildings on Water street. The loss is estimated at \$30,000; insurance light.

RUBENSTEIN, the World's champion figure skater, will perform in the Hillsborough skating rink, in this city on Friday evening next.

The concert, in aid of the Charlotte Town Hospital, held in St. Patrick's Hall, on Monday night last, was a grand success. About fifty dollars were realized.

The branch store of Kirk & Co. at St. Andrew's, Antigonish, N. S. was destroyed by fire-Sunday last with all its contents. Loss \$8,000; stock insured for \$4,000.

MADRID advices announce that the Spanish Prime Minister says that the Government will execute reforms in Cuba without waiting for the complete pacification of the island.

The Stanley left Pictou for Georgetown on Saturday, but did not reach there till 2 o'clock Sunday afternoon. A special train brought her passengers to this city Sunday evening.

L. B. ARCHIBALD, at one time Superintendent of the P. E. I. Railway, lately Superintendent of the Pullman car service on the C. C. R. at Halifax, has been dismissed by the G. R. I.

MR. JAMES PAPPON of the firm of James Paton & Co. crossed at the Cape yesterday, en route to the Old Country to purchase goods for his firm. This is his seventy-eighth trip across the Atlantic. Bon voyage.

FATHER McDEVITT, pastor of St. Dunstan's church, Fredericton, N. B., died on Sunday last. He had been in the ministry for upwards of fifty years, and nearly all that time was stationed at Fredericton.

The Curfew by-law passed at the meeting of the city council on Monday night, is now in force. In the evening at eight o'clock, the fire bell sounded eight strokes, warning all boys and girls under sixteen years of the streets.

On Monday evening next, 15th inst., the committee of young men in connection with Indian River Church, purpose giving another of their popular entertainments, in the Hall at Darley. The proceeds will go towards the rebuilding of the church. A good programme will be presented and a most enjoyable time may be had. The public are cordially invited to attend.

A REPORT of a meeting held in London by the shareholders of the Colchester Marine Railway has been received by the Dominion government. It shows that Provand, M. P., who has acted for the company of late years with the government, stated that in May last an order in council was passed promising the necessary legislation to reconstitute the company and on the strength of this the company had recently spent considerable money for the preserving of their work.

The Musical and Literary Entertainment held at Head St. Peter's Bay on Monday night the first last, was a grand success financially and otherwise. The Dramatic Club rendered the new and popular Irish Play "Shann Aaron" to a bumper house. The performance was very creditable to the young ladies and gentlemen who took part, every character being acted to perfection; so that there is no need of special mention, and it may be truly said that their performance would do credit to professionals.

As a result of the two days International speed skating races, closed on Sunday last, J. K. McCulloch, of Winnipeg, becomes the amateur champion of the world. He had to win three or four International events and finish in the fourth. In the 1000 metre race McCulloch and Naas, although skating in different pairs, were tied. Time 2:42.25. In the skate off McCulloch won by 2:40.45 against Naas' 2:41.15. McCulloch also won the 10,000 metre race in 30:02.25. In the professional class John Nilson defeated all opponents—the old favorite Joe Donoghue, of Newburgh, not appearing to be in the class. Nilson won in the half mile in 1:17.15 and five miles in 14:47 beating the world's record.

A NUMBER of political pointers came out Monday evening during the address before the Club Cartier, Montreal, by Hon. Alphonse Desjardins, ex-Minister of Militia, who likewise formed part of the commission which the Bowell Government sent to Winnipeg to confer with the Greenway Government. In the first place, the ex-minister plainly intimated that the Government never had a great deal of hope or confidence as to the result of that conference, but that Sir Donald Smith and a little group threatened to bolt and vote against the Government if they did not make one more effort in the direction of conciliation. Hon. Mr. Desjardins also referred to another influence rarely ever before exercised in political affairs; and although the Privy Council did not mention the name, all present knew that he referred to Lord Aberdeen.
