In the meantime, the following warning, from the Kingston News, is deserving the attention of the different Branches:

Let our contemporary of Toronto beware of this elective scheme—the first in the programme of Annexation. If he looks around him a little, he will see the prospect drawn out in this form:

- Elective Council;
- Elective Governor;
- Elective Magistrate;
- Household or Universal Suffrage;
- Independence—for a day;
- Annexation!

We fear not the open and manly attacks of the Annexationists, for these are already becoming "small by degrees, and beautifully less"; but we do fear for the peace and the prosperity of the country, if the passionate antagonism which has lately been exhibited in quarters where its presence might have been most expected, is not nipped in the bud, and the energies of the people seriously devoted to questions bearing upon their material progress.

IMMORAL EFFECT OF PUBLIC EXECUTIONS.

The execution of the Mannings for the murder of O'Connell at large, took place in London, on the 13th of November, is thus described by Dickens, the Novelist:—

Devonshire Terrace, Tuesday, Nov. 13.

I was a witness of the execution at Horsemonger Lane this morning. I went there for the purpose of observing the crowd gathered to behold it, and I had excellent opportunities of doing so at intervals all through the night and continuously from daybreak until after the spectacle was over. I simply wish to turn this dreadful experience to some account for the general good, and by taking the readiest and most public means of advertising to an intimation given by Sir G. Gray in the last session of Parliament, that the government might be induced to give its support to a measure making the infliction of capital punishment a private solemnity within the prison walls (with such guarantees for the last sentence of the law being inexorably and solemnly administered, as should be satisfactory to the public mind), I earnestly beseech Sir G. Gray, as a solemn duty which he owes to society, and a responsibility which he cannot forever put off to originate such a legislative change himself.

I believe that a slight and inexcusably awful as the wickedness and levity of the immense crowd collected at that execution this morning, could be imagined by no man, and could be presented in no heathen land, the infliction of capital punishment, as a means of the crime which brought the wretched murderers to it, faded in my mind before the atrocious bearing, looks, and language of the assembled spectators. When I came upon the scene, I saw the shrillness of the cry and howls that were raised from time to time, denoting they came from the concourse of boys and girls already assembled in the best places, made my blood run cold. As the sun rose upon a scorching and laughing, and yelling, and shouting, and parading on to no melodies, with the substitution of "Mrs. Manning" for "Susannah," and the like, were added to these. When the day dawned, thieves, low prostitutes, ruffians and vagabonds of every kind, flurked on the ground, with every variety of offensive and foul behaviour. Fighting, fainting, whistling, imitations of Punch, brutal jokes, tumultuous denunciations, and the general delight of a common woman were dragged out of the crowd by the police with their dresses disordered gave a new zest to the general entertainment. When the sun rose brightly—as it did—thousands upon thousands of upturned faces inexpressibly adorned the scene, and a mirth of callousness, that a man had cause to feel ashamed of the shape he wore, and to shrink from himself, as fashioned in the image of the devil. When the two-mile procession of Londoners, who had gathered to see the execution, and that there was no belief among men, that they perished like the beasts.
