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
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
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
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
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Mr. English **Concludes His** Criticisms.

On page 191 is a seeming contradiction of all the good things the compiler has elsewhere said of the mildness of our climate. Persons reading this passage might well question the sincerity of the writer. He says: "until the middle of November most of the local hunters go out though the weather at last gets to begin before New Year. We do not the tropics.

As or instance wherein he states that there should be no reason why visiting sportsmen should not indulge in the diversion of wolf, bear and lynx hunting. The man who would go into hunting either bears, wolves o lynx in this country would be doomed to great disappointment. Bear and lynx are rarely met with; as for wolves, if they exist at all, they must

are constantly purchasable in St. John's for twenty cents a couple. This is a falsehood, as anyone may prove for himself. They were sold for as high as fifty cents per pair last Fall and are now offering at forty. As for hares being brought into the city in car load lots; well, that, too, is "studiously moderate," as Sir Edward expresses it in his introductory re-

On page 193 Mr. McGrath says: 'It is possible for anybody with the slightest knowledge of wood-craft to kill caribou in Newfoundland by his own unaided exertions." This court train is a gif from the ladies of Belfast, and had been made for Her Majesty's crowning workers six months to complete. It is four yards long, nearly two yards ach piece. This saves time and wide at the bottom, and tapers up to shoulder width at the top. It has bee esstimated that there are over 5,500. 000 stitches in the whole and ove 20,000 yards of thread. The thread used was so fine as to be scarcely visible in the workers' hands, numbers 300, 200 and 150 thread being employ ed throughout. It is the most magnificent piece of work ever made in Youghal, or any other lace centre in and fuchsias and is very beautiful.



It is to be hoped that the enmity which has embittered the relations of Britain and Germany during the past six or seven years will be abated, and that there will be a turn in the tide of ill-feeling and that the old time amity will be restored. It should be borne in mind that for generations embittered relations have existed between Britain and other countries and that these deplorable relations have been changed in time, chiefly by strong national desire to improve international feelings. For hundreds of years therewas a traditional enmity between Britain and France, but the entente of 1904 put an end to ages of ill-will, and the chief glory of the late King was the part he took personally in bringing about a better understanding between two neighbouring peoples.

For some years every spring was expected to bring the opening of a great war campaign between the two countries. and at one time extensive supplies were bought for such a campaign and Indian troops tarnsported to Cyprus. sian advance towards Afghanistian,




