





#### The Treaty Trouble.

The international question of the day is the Panama Canal law, just passed by the U.S. Congress and signed by Presi-

dent Taft. The law enables the President to fix the tolls, not to exceed \$1.25 per net ton registered and to allow American ships in the coastwise trade, which is interpreted widely, to use the Canal free of toll.

This exemption is held by Hay-Paunceforte Treaty, which Lawn, (Burin took the place of the Clayton-Boliver treaty and permitted the States to build the canal on conditions. One condition was:

It is claimed, however, by the supporters of the law that the appearance is deceptive and that per Rev. C. Lench in reality there is no violation of the teaty, as the American coasting trade is exclusively American and ships of no other country compete in his trade, and that therefore there is really no discrimination.

The faith of the apologists in their defence is weak as shown by their hostility to a reference to the Hague for a decision of the question whether the Canal Law does violate the Treaty.
