Wash Day.

Wash day is a gloomy anniversary which falls on Monday. It also falls on anybody who happens to get in the way, especially caustic husbands who come home and kick about the bill of fare.

The reason wash day comes on Monday is because it is usually preceded by Sunday, which is used by people to store up enough rest and religion to last them during the remainder of the week.

Wash day begins at four o'clock in the morning and winds up along about noon with an exchange of as-springing peasantries by the entire cast. Very few people are able to extract the dust from a large family washing without repining at a high altitude.

There are two kinds of washing—white and buff. The former is produced by chasing the clothes up and down the corrugated bosom of a zinc tub board, after they have been anaesthetized, anamathetized and pasteurized. This treatment turns out a wash that will make every neighbour in the block turn to a pale greenish pallor.

Buff washing is the kind which is produced during a strike in the laundry. It consists mainly of surplus bluing, half erased peach stains and long, horizontal welts in the shirt bosom.

Whenever a buff washing is being out on the line, women who assail their clothes with bar soap and muscle will utter disparaging remarks about it at the dinner table.

One of the nicest features, about wash day is that nobody wants anything to eat except the head of the house, and he is invited to rummage through the pantry and fatten up on the succulent doughnut. The patience of man under such harrowing circumstances is something marvellous, and yet how few men express their real emotions.

Some women employ their husbands on wash day. This is a humiliating practice and ought to be made legal grounds for divorce. What could be more pathetic than the sight of a strong, red-blooded man with high ambition and eloquent sideburns, wig-wagging back and forth in tune with a washing machine and being sprayed with suds and perspiration? This is not man's sphere, but devotion to his wife and fear of the consequences drive him to it.

The Country Mother.

The splendid racial heritage given our nation in the past by the noble character, faithful affection, courage and strength in facing hardships, and the high ideals of its country mothers is in grave danger of rapid extinction through the lack of a true vision on the part of the daughters of to-day.

I have no sympathy with a "back-to-the-farm" agitation which does not include as its chief end the making of that farm a more convenient healthful home than the city can possibly provide for the same outlay. I have no sympathy with any eugenic movement which does not tend to make country motherhood so rich, so wonderful, so healthily joyous and natural that the city woman's barrenness shall seem by contrast a stale and joyous poverty. But after all, the ideal will be realized only to the extent and the rapidly with which the mothers and daughters of to-day themselves catch the divine fire and pass it on to their sons and daughters as the most noble end in life to hope for, to pray for, and to work for.

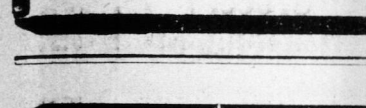

Two Men in Peril

ONE SUCCUMBS.

From people who arrived from the northward on the Prospero last evening we learn of a drowning accident which occurred at St. Julien's Harbor about a week ago. The particulars gleaned are that two fishermen, one of whom was named Taylor, belonging to Change Islands, were coming into St. Julien's Harbor in their boat one evening. Suddenly a heavy squall of wind struck the skiff and capsized her, throwing the occupants into the water. They were struggling in the water for several minutes and were very much exhausted when rescued. After being taken out of the water they were put aboard Kelloway's schooner and all efforts made to resuscitate the two men, who were much overcome by the water entering their system. The treatment to Taylor was unavailing, however, as rapidly his condition reached a critical stage and eventually he succumbed. The accident cast a gloom over the settlement and the remains were sent to the home of the deceased and interred.

The playlet entitled "The Scout" was cleverly produced, while the concert evoked favourable comment. Weekly Report.

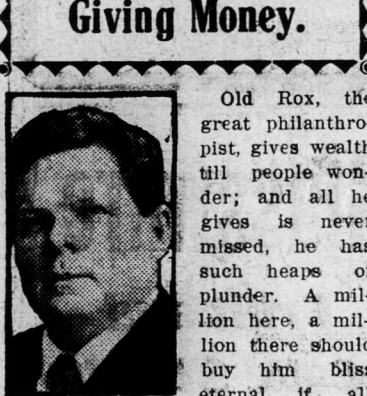
The meeting of the Council of the Board of Trade was held on Friday at noon.

It having been reported to the Council that they had fixed the price of Labrador fish, they wish to make it clear to the public generally that they deal alone with principles affecting the trade of the Colony, and do not in any way make prices of any kind, either on the produce of this Colony or other countries.

In answer to enquiries asking for the dredge to be kept at St. John's, a letter was read from the Colonial Secretary informing the Council that the dredge was gone to the outposts until the autumn, and would be available afterwards for the harbor of St. John's.

Mr. Jackman read a very interesting paper on the question of fishery oil, and the treatment of the dog-fish pest and of waste generally. He pointed out the waste that has been going on in the past of valuable by-products of fish that in other countries, such as Norway, brings in over one and a half million dollars to the people. He suggested the forming of Co-operative Associations organized and assisted by a society of leading citizens to deal with this problem of waste.

C. W. Rankin offered 105 sacks of black oats, 4 bushels each, at \$2.15 a sack. Referred to Sanitary Supervisor.

John Maunder asked for water service for 5 lavatories which he was installing. Referred to Engineer.

W. H. Bowden asked Council to lay sewer in same cut on Merrymeeting Road. Referred to Engineer.

Plans of proposed dwelling, submitted by Patrick Foley, were approved of. Plans of annex to J. Coady's house were also approved of.

C. Winsor was granted street line on Atlantic Avenue. Permission was given Mr. Mackey to repair house on Merrymeeting Road.

J. Reid was given permission to repair house on Gower Street.

The Engineer reported that Curnew's house on Lime Street was unfit for repairs.

Tenders for plumbing, under the Small Homes Act, were received from W. H. Wills, R. C. Callahan and Williams and Moore.

The Report of Engineer and Road Inspector were submitted.

The full board will meet on Casey Street on Monday to consider the suggestion of altering street line.

Another Schr. Gone

We learn by the Prospero that a couple of evening's ago, Capt. Winnot's schooner of Change Islands, struck the rocks going into Englee and became a total loss. The men escaped in their boat and as a heavy sea ran and the vessel pounded heavily, they barely got away with their lives. The belief is that there was very little fish in the vessel and that the hull was insured.

Wasis Ashore.

The S. S. Wasis, Capt. Ritchie, reached port at seven o'clock last evening, after a two days passage from Sydney, bringing coal to Mullaly & Co. Just after entering the Narrows and when inside Chain Rock, the steamer went upon a rock, commonly known as "Pancake." The ship was in charge of Pilot Lewis and was going at less than half speed at the time. Immediately as the vessel's hull went aground engines were reversed at full speed and she came off quickly. The steamer then moved up to Mullaly's wharf. To-day a diver was down examining the steamer's hull to find out the extent of the damage done.

White satin hats are very smart. They are trimmed with flat bows of black velvet or aigrettes.

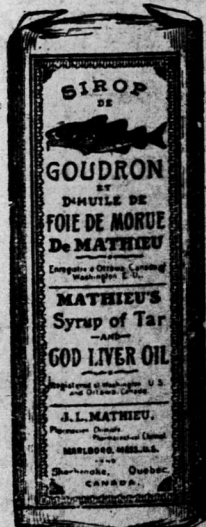

Special Evening Telegram.
LONDON, Aug. 30.
The question of Tibet's future promises to become as great a bone of contention as Persia. The same section of the Liberal Party which accused Foreign Minister Grey of sacrificing Persia, and incidentally, Morgan Shuster to Russian interests, declares that Britain's Tibetan policy is on parallel lines. The Conservatives who support Grey more strongly than a number of the members of his own party, approve his ultimatum to China; and the desirability of having a buffer state between India and China furnishes ground for his action in the case. Predictions are made of another British expedition to Lhasa from North Eastern India, in order to protect the Tibetan ministers from the Chinese.

LONDON, Aug. 30.
Germany and England are in a state of war, according to J. A. Aikins, a Canadian M.P., who has just returned here from a continental trip. In an interview, he said that from his investigation on the Continent and here, he was convinced that Germany and England were now in a state of war. No overt blow had been struck, but when it is, all may be over in three months or three days. When Canada understood this situation, he believed the Dominion's hearty help would be forthcoming.




