## A Pan-American Policy.

Special Evening Telegram.

WASHINGTON, To-day.

That the day is dawning when international peace and brotherhood shall prevail, when war shall be no more, was the tenor of all speeches at the closing sessions here of the American Society for the judicial settlement of international disputes. Mr. Justice Riddell, High Court, Ontario, at a banquet of the Society, spoke of the close ties, binding the English speaking nations, and declared the man who would try to stir up ill feeling between any branches of these nations would not only be a traitor to his own country but to the whole world, because the world was looking to them to push the victory of international peace. On the idea of referring the Panama Canal toll dispute between Britain and States, he said it was not a matter of great importance how the question was settled, but what was important was that it be settled right. The American people, he said, were the guardians of their own honour. English people were certain American people would ultimately do what they ought to do. He asserted he asked for no treaty between English speaking people, no formal union. For stronger than any parchment bond, there was a moral law

holding them together. Jose Godery, Mexican Minister to Cuba, made a plea that this country help Mexico to return once more to peace. David Hill, former Ambassador to Germany, expressed the opinion that the day may not be far distant when there would be a court of international justice. John Barrett urged the enlargement of the Monroe Doctrine into what he called a Pan-American policy where each nation would have some right attitude, some definite position, some self or some sense of independence as the States now has.

## Miss Asquith's Speech

A Comprehensive Survey of the Political Situation.

Miss Asquith, opening a bazaar in aid of the Brixton Liberal Association yesterday, made a political speech. She predicted that there would be no General Election for a good while yet, and made excuses for the Reading bye-election, besides dealing with other leading questions of the day from a Liberal point of view.

Referring to Mr. Larkin's release, Miss Asquith said she was sure they were all greatly rejoiced that he was free. They were all convinced that in these days sedition was a rather medieval offence, especially now that Sir Edward Carson, with his law-abiding modern methods, had shorn it of every shadow of glamour, and brought it down almost to humdrum respectability.

Continuing, Miss Asquith said the Liberal Party had borne the burden of promises thirty years, but they were going to get some of them out of the way this year, when the Welsh Disestablishment Bill and the Home Rule Bill became law. Their energies would then be released to deal with plural voting, land reform, and education. She wished to say from her father—(applause)—that he hoped they would send a Liberal from Brixton at the next election to help and support him in this great task. (Applause.)—Graphic, Nov. 14.

Bernhardt's extreme slimmness was at one time the jest of Paris. The French journalist, Henri Rochefort, who died recently, once wrote: "An empty cab drove up to the theatre, and Sarah Bernhardt alighted from it!"

## The Sheep's Head Barber.

While working as an apprentice in his early days to a blacksmith at Paisley, that great captain of industry, Sir William Arrol, the famous engineer, who died a February last, augmented the pittance paid to him in a quaint and curious manner. North of Tweed the national dish, second only to haggis itself, is "singit sheep's head." Before the head is cooked it is necessary to singe off the wool carefully with a red-hot iron, and it is the privilege of the "barber," as the one who performs this function is termed, to enjoy the perquisites arising from it.

According to Sir Robert Burvis, who relates the incident in a memoir of Sir William Arrol published by Blackwood, the great engineer acquired the reputation of being an operator of "singular care and completeness," and the worthy people of Paisley were in the habit of securing his services for the operation.

As a result of his work as the sheep's head barber, Arrol was able to add 4 or 5 pennies to his weekly earnings, and with these he was able to pay for stockings and braces and bonnets, and before all for lessons at night schools in reading, writing, and arithmetic—lessons which laid the foundation of his wonderful and unique career.

But the future builder of those monuments of engineering skill, the Tay and Forth Bridges, to mention only two of the stupendous achievements of Arrol, also augmented his meagre earnings in those days as a member of the porridge pots and their attendants. "In the old-fashioned Scottish cottage an iron hook, called a 'lum cheek' or 'gabbie hook,' is suspended from within the chimney over the fire. On this hangs the family porridge pot, and many a sixpence did our hero now earn as guardian and mender-in-chief of these homely but useful implements."

## Death of Mme. Marchesi.

A very notable link with the past has been broken by the death of Mme. Mathilde Marchesi in London. She was the mother of Blanche Marchesi, the famous prima donna, and as professor of singing at the Vienna Conservatoire she trained countless celebrities, including Antonette Sterling, Calve and Melba.

She knew the Mendelssohn family well, she was a pupil of Garcia, she had met Meyerbeer and could tell—on that composer's mother's authority—of his nervousness when, as a boy, he first met Beethoven.

Mme. Marchesi had, after studying in Paris, made a great name as a concert singer in England. She possessed a fine mezzo-soprano voice. She married in 1852, an exiled Sicilian nobleman, the Marquis Salvatore della Rajata de Castone, who was a baritone singer and had taken the stage name of Marchesi.

**New Plan to Buy Deserted Scotland.**

Philadelphia, Dec. 1.—Mrs. Wm. B. Derr, president of the Housewives League here, started a campaign to-day to break the "egg trust" by means of a combine of Philadelphia women. Addressing the Kenneth Israel Sisterhood, one of the wealthiest women's clubs in the city, she proposed a co-operative movement to buy thousands of dozens of eggs next spring and store them. All housekeepers who assist will get eggs then for 25 cents a dozen, she said. "Boycotting is fundamentally incorrect," declared Mrs. Derr, "and instead of allying myself with Mrs. Heath's crusade in New York, I intend to organize the Philadelphia housewives and buy and store eggs in Philadelphia." Active campaigning will not begin until January 1, but in the meantime Mrs. Derr will present her plan to twenty-five women's organizations.



**Cable News.**

 MANCHESTER, Dec. 7. Exhibition Hall at Rusholme, was burned to-day by the Arson Brigade. Loss \$60,000. Usual placards.

LONDON, Dec. 7. The 'World' states that the King and Queen have, on more than one occasion, expressed strong disapproval of the tango, as entirely unsuitable for ball-room dancing.

AVONMOUTH, Dec. 7. Capt. Roberts and two members of the crew of the brig Evelyn, were rescued by the steamer Monmouth which has arrived from Montreal. The other members were saved by the Invergyle.

NEW YORK, Dec. 7. The Huntington Club has accepted the challenge for the International Polo Cup, to be played at Long Island, on June 1st, June 13th and a later date for a third game, is necessary.

BUCHAREST, Dec. 7. A hundred persons are reported killed or injured in a collision which occurred between a passenger and freight train southwest of here near the Danube. The railway officers are asking for the urgent despatch of ambulances.

CORDOVA, Alberta, Dec. 7. Capt. Hederson, of the lost schooner Elvira, and Olaf Swensen, a member of the crew of Stefansson's ship 'Belvidere,' arrived here overland today. They report explorer Leifingwell, as safe in winter quarters at Flaxman Island, and that the opinion is he is with the members of the Stefansson expedition.

MEXICO CITY, Dec. 7. The Mercantile Bank, in which the Madero family is heavily interested, closed yesterday. The announcement was made that this action was due to the unsettled condition of the country. Anticipating attack by the rebels, the commander of the Federal garrison here has constructed entrenchment near the approaches to the city, though the nearest rebels are those at Linares.

MEXICO CITY, Dec. 7. A modification of the old method of tying men to the muzzles of cannons and blowing them to pieces is being employed by the Federals north of San Luis Potosi. They captured a rebel, who is supposed to be one of a band which recently dynamited a troop train at Carneris. He was court-martialled and sentenced to death. He was tied to the ground, a dynamite bomb was placed beneath his body, and exploded, tearing the body to atoms.

PARIS, Dec. 7. A debate has begun in the City Council on the question of restoring entirely or partially the Sisters of Charity and members of other nursing organizations, to the positions they held in the Paris hospitals prior to the separation of Church and State. Petitions to this effect were signed by 17,000 persons. Councilors said that the suggestions, if carried out, would mean saving \$5,000 annually. Opponents urged that the hospitals should remain neutral so far as religion and politics are concerned, and disputed the saving. The debate will continue on Monday.

**Entertainment at St. Bonaventure's.**

The matinee entertainment held Saturday afternoon at the Aula Maxima of St. Bonaventure's College was largely attended and proved very enjoyable to the juvenile audience. The programme consisted of vocal, piano, mandolin selections, and recitations rendered in a pleasing manner by Misses Strang, Keegan, Doyle and Devine; Messrs. T. P. Halley, Cyril Fox, Gus Summers, A. Joy, N. Duchamin and F. Devereaux. A special feature of the programme was the chorus from the opera 'Pinafore' with Master Charlie Fox as the soloist. Mrs. J. C. Cleary and Mr. T. P. Halley were the accompanists. Mr. J. G. Higgins, who was the promoter of the affair heartily thanked the audience at the close for their attendance. The proceeds which amounted to a considerable sum will be devoted to the funds of the St. Bon's Athletic Association.

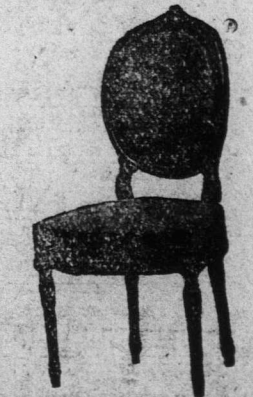
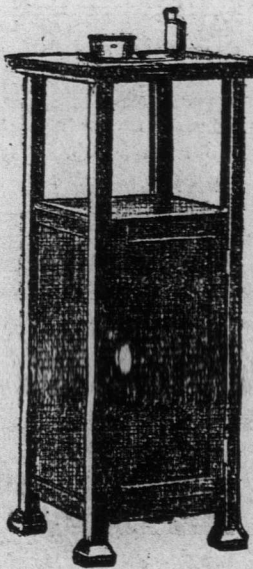
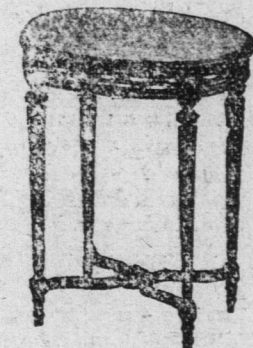

### Clerk Alleged to Have Stolen \$250,000.

New York, Nov. 26.—James Edward Foye, one time clerk to John W. Gates, was to be arraigned to-day on the charge of having stolen securities valued at \$250,000 from his last employer, the Farmers Loan and Trust Company, of this city, for whom he was a clerk at \$75 a month until three months ago.

Foye was arrested last night as he stepped off a train from Philadelphia. He took his arrest as a matter of course, though no hint of his alleged grand larceny had been published previously. In his pockets detectives found a certified cheque for \$9,000 and crisp new bank notes aggregating \$5,000, all believed to be a portion of the money obtained by the sales of the stolen securities to the bond brokerage house of Charles T. Brown, of Philadelphia. Detectives also found evidence that Foye was about to sail for Europe.

### Mrs. Pankhurst Released.

Special to Evening Telegram.  
LONDON, To-day.  
Mrs. Pankhurst, militant suffragette leader, arrested at Plymouth on the arrival from the States aboard the steamship Majestic, was released from Exeter jail last night. Mrs. Pankhurst began a hunger strike immediately following her arrest.

PARIS, To-day.  
Senator Gaston Doumergue has deferred until to-morrow, notifying President Poincare that he will take the responsibility to accept the task imposed upon him.

WASHINGTON, To-day.  
Interest here chiefly centres in the rapidly moving military operations in Northern Mexico. The movement southward of General Villa's constitutional forces and on the reports that Huerta's Generals are planning concentrated obstruction to his march to Mexico City, with possible flank movement by those bodies. The Federal troops hitherto reported as fleeing from Chihuahua City to the border are being observed with marked attention by military officials here. There is a general feeling that the pendulum will swing back and forth for some weeks, constitutional successes being followed by Federal victories and that the process of forcing the Huerta Government to yield will be a slow one.

### What Divers Earn.

There are worse jobs than diving—when it comes to pay-time. On docks and similar works men in bells receive, as a rule, 1s. or 1s. 2d. per hour, while helmet divers draw from 2s. to 2s. 6d. And these are minimum rates, the remuneration increasing in proportion to risk.

For assisting in making wells the pay is from 14s. to 20s. a shift, and the ordinary rate in a flooded mine is from £1 to £2 a shift. Nominally, a shift is four hours; but, as fifteen minutes are allowed for resting and another fifteen minutes at the end for undressing, it is really only three and a half hours.

Salvage work is paid for still more highly. In some cases men receive £1 a day, whether they dive or not; in others they get so much—£1 upwards—for every tide at which work is practicable; and in others there is a standing wage of £2 per week, besides an extra sum for every hour actually worked.

When operations are carried on for the recovery of treasure at great depths divers are usually paid weekly wages, plus a commission on the value of the stuff actually recovered. One has received as much as £10 in wages alone, and a diver has brought up in his hand a "find" worth no less than £7,000. This was a hunting-knife studded with diamonds, and it was recovered from the Cadiz, which was wrecked near Ushant, on the French coast.

Two of the most profitable jobs divers have ever had were in connection with the Alphonso III., which sank off Point Gando, Grand Canary, in 162 ft. of water, and the Skyro, wrecked near Cape Finisterre. From the Alphonso III., Daniel Lambert recovered £70,000 in Spanish gold coin, and another diver salvaged £20,000. Lambert's share of the haul was £2,500, and his companion netted £1,000. In the case of the Skyro silver bars to the value of about £10,000 were hauled from the ocean's bed and the diver's commission amounted to something like £500.

### On Girls, By a Boy.

"There are two sorts of children, boys and girls and of the two boys are the best. Girls cause all the rows and quarrels. They think they are wonderful if they can get a bird's feather stuck in their hat. They are proud and vain and are always gossiping and making mischief. I simply hate them. They boast of what they can do, this that and the other and a fat lot it is when it comes to the point. If there were no girls and women in the world, it would be a very peaceful place. They love to sit and rest. Girls do vary from day to day. On washing days they think they are nearly killed. They would rather gossip half a day than walk half a mile. It's no good, they are a bad race and deceitful. If your wife sells anything she keeps a shilling back. Girls like to wear rings and think they are ladies. They bob their hair on the top like mountains and wears a fringe to make us boys think they are pretty, but ain't they just deceived. The young men have a hard job to find a good and hard-working wife in these days. Girls are cowards and I never knew one to face danger. Boys are also strong and useful while girls are timid, frightened weak little creatures. I would not be a girl for £10."

"But This is Different."

It is an epigram and hence popular saying that although no man is far-seeing enough not to make some mistakes, the wise man does not make the same mistake twice.

It sounds plausible, doesn't it, but I doubt if there ever was a man that wise.

Mistakes are such insidious, deceitful things. You see if you knew when you were making them that you were making them, then you wouldn't make them and they wouldn't be mistakes.

But you never do know. Yesterday's folly allures you in a totally new guise to-day; and it is not until to-morrow, when you will have already embraced it, that it will shake off its disguise and you will realize with disgust that you have made the silly mistake again.

A little neighbour of mine is a very energetic young person who wants what she wants when she wants it; and wants it moreover with all her heart and soul. Occasionally she comes to grief when she has gotten her own way—even as you and I—end then she is deeply penitent and is sure that she won't be so foolish next time. But when next time comes, of course she doesn't recognize it.

On a very unpropitious day last summer she teased her mother to take her on a promised outing. Her mother warned her that it would surely rain but in the end her teasing

prevailed, and they went. It did rain, long and hard; they both caught cold and her mother was quite ill. Margaret was wild with remorse and was sure this lesson would last her the rest of her life. A few days later I heard her begging her mother to let her go for a long walk with two girls who were considerably older than she. Her mother objected on the ground that she would get too tired, but Margaret persisted. Finally her mother relented, her own way of experience in having her own way the week before and of her promise to be more reasonable next time. "But this is so different, Mother," she protested, "this is quite another thing."

"I know it, my dear," said her mother, "it's another thing you want to do. It's always another thing. But it's the same headstrong will that makes you so determined and it is the same headstrongness that will get you into trouble again. And then you'll be sorry and say you will be more reasonable next time. And when next time comes you will say, 'but this is different.'"

Isn't that the way with all of us? Aren't we always saying to our consciences or to some external monitor, but this is different. I admit that was a mistake, but this is different. And then "this" turns out to be another mistake and again we promise ourselves that we will be wiser next time. And again the eternal cycle rolls.

I guess the only way to avoid the mistakes and failures that our particular faults leads us into is to try to understand these faults, and to be always watching for the "nigger in the wood-pile," no matter how inoffensive and different each new wood-pile looks.

Local Men In Big Fox Enterprise.

In Three Weeks Thirty-Nine Foxes, Some of Them Silver Patches, Worth About \$6,000, Were Captured Alive.

The North Sydney Herald is pleased to learn of the phenomenal success being made by the Burgeo Co-Operative Fox Farm syndicate, operating at Burgeo, Newfoundland. A short time ago The Herald announced the fact of Mr. William McLeod, an experienced fox rancher of P. E. I., who was appointed as superintendent of the Company's ranch. Mr. McLeod was sent there by Messrs. Hyndman, Agnew and others of the big fox men of the Island, after the possibilities of this proposition had been explained to them.

The great luck of the Burgeo Company can be largely attributed to the thorough organization, coupled with good fellowship existing between Mr. R. Moulton, the head of this enterprise, and the thirty-five trappers who are co-operating in the interests of the company. It goes to show how organization counts, when it is seen that the company have collected in their yards at Burgeo no less than thirty-nine foxes in three weeks.

Mr. McLeod, the Island keeper, says that it is the best proposition of them all, and is astonished at the fact of being able to stock a farm with so many valuable animals in so short a time. It is estimated that the value of the foxes now at Burgeo is about \$6,000, and there are yet four months of the trapping season available, it is not improbable that there will be a quarter of a million dollars' worth of foxes in the company's yards.

It was easily predicted that with the management and organization of the Burgeo enterprise that it would prove itself to be the banner fox proposition, and the experience so far has fully justified the prediction.

Mr. Moulton, who has been a fur dealer and exporter for over twenty years in the Burgeo district, declares that the many silvers and patches now in the company's yards are much above the average in color, all being very dark. This will certainly make excellent breeding stock, and as up to date females predominate, it has been arranged to introduce some Island bred black males to make up any deficiency in pairing, and thus introduce at one step, the pedigreed black strain peculiar to the Island, on to the strong, healthy dark arctic stock being collected by the Burgeo Company.—North Sydney Herald, Dec. 3.

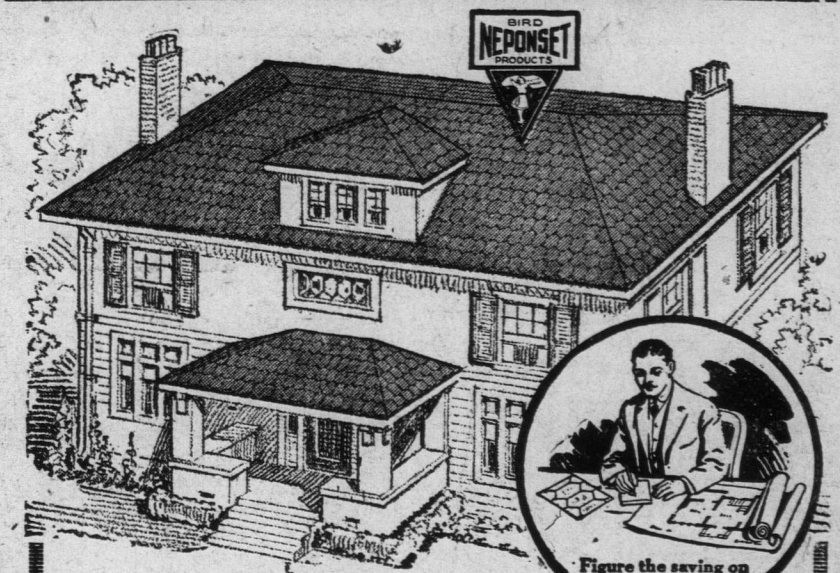

Decision Against Judge

Ottawa, Nov. 28.—Mr. Justice Cassels, in the Exchequer Court handed down judgment this morning in the important case of the King v. Clement. The finding is against the defendant.

This was an information exhibited by the Attorney-General of Canada where by His Majesty sought judgment against the Hon. W. P. Clement, one of the puisne judges of the Supreme Court of British Columbia, for the recovery of the sum of \$4,290, alleged to have been wrongfully obtained from the Crown for per diem allowances on the basis of the defendant being absent from his home on judicial duty. The Attorney-General charged that the defendant in obtaining these monies from the Crown sent in certificates from month to month fraudulently representing that his residence was at Grand Forks, B.C., while in fact he was residing in Vancouver, B.C., and was therefore not entitled to \$6 per diem allowances under the Judge's Act.

In the judgment handed down, Judge Cassels decides that Vancouver and not Grand Forks was the defendant's residence during the time in question, and that being so, the defendant must repay to the Crown the sums charged for per diem allowances while in Vancouver, viz., \$4,290, together with interest thereon.

THE CHARGE OF FRAUD.  
On the allegations of fraud against the defendant in the information the learned judge said: "I would have gladly closed my reasons for judgment at this point, but having been pressed by counsel both for the Crown and the defendant to express my views on the second question, viz.: Whether the defendant intentionally endeavoured to deceive the

Department of Justice, as to his real place of residence, I must to the best of my ability give my opinion on this question.

"Since the trial I have perused and re-perused the evidence and exhibits, and very reluctantly I am forced to the conclusion that the contention of the Crown is well founded, and I am unable to relieve the defendant from the charge."

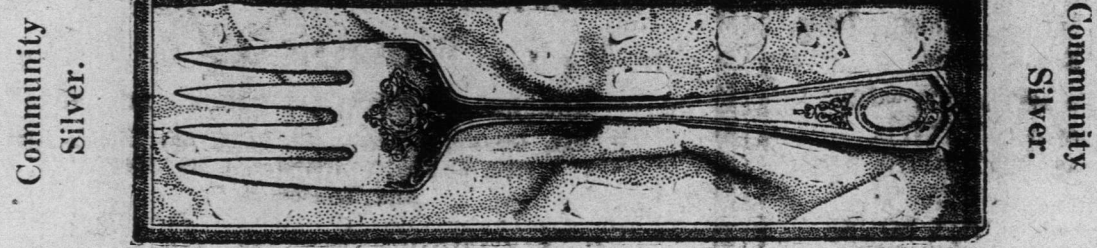

The secret of the church social's success is its financial system. After a man has eaten fried chicken, escalloped oysters, lambic beef, four kinds of salad, three kinds of pie and eight colors of cake he does not ask for his check and find that he owes \$6.45 to the house exclusive of tips. He gives a quarter to the collector and totters home full of the proud consciousness of having eaten four meals for one price and of having done the Lord a favour at that. If the proprietor of a city hotel sold food at church social rates he would yell for a receiver in three days. Yet churches are growing greater and grander from the profits of church socials while hotels struggle along in sordid poverty and have to steal the hats of their customers and charge 25 cents for returning them in order to make ends meet.

This country may meet misfortune and sink into the morass of debt. But so long as it has the church social it need not despair. The women of this country could pay for the Panama canal with two years of chicken suppers helped out by a quart of oysters.

### Thanksgiving Turkeys Came High.

New York, Nov. 27.—Thanksgiving Day feasting began as early as one o'clock this morning, with the opening of the Bowers' Mission's bread line, with food enough on hand to satisfy the needs of 3,000 hungry vagrants. The work of the various charitable organizations continued throughout the day very close to the programme carried out in previous years, notwithstanding that high prices for foodstuffs made the work more expensive than ever. At least half a dozen dinners at each of which from 1,000 to 3,000 persons were to be served, were provided, and in addition to this work of the regular philanthropic organizations it appeared that an unusually large number of private benefactors had arranged to help the unfortunate in some way or another. In many ordinary households the dread sceptre of the high cost of living dethroned the traditional turkey, the retail price of which had risen on the eve of Thanksgiving to thirty-five cents a pound, for the best grades, and from 25 to 30 cents a pound for cold storage fowl.

Although it had been predicted that the arrivals of poultry which were larger than for several years, would show that the turkey was holding its own, the total receipts are said to show about twenty-five tons less in turkey arrivals than in other years.

According to retail dealers, the shortage is due to the fact that storage warehouses are holding the birds already killed for the Christmas and New Year's trade, and the farmers are keeping their stock for another month, so that the turkeys will be fatter and command higher prices.

### Healthy and Unhealthy Lighting

Gas, it may be said, vitiates the atmosphere. True. But it also helps to purify it. Its purifying power is greater than its vitiating power. Electricity does not vitiate, nor does it purify. Hear what three eminent men have said:—  
Such evidence has lately been adduced to show that gas is more useful than the electric light in promoting efficient ventilation of air. It is for this, amongst other reasons, that gas is being frequently substituted for the electric light. The latest example is, perhaps, the Society of Medical Officers of Health, which has recently installed gas on its premises, after experience with the electric light.—Dr. Jamieson B. Hurry.  
He would merely add that no member who had experience of their meeting room under the old conditions could deny the improvement that had taken place since gas had been substituted for the electric light and the new system of heating and ventilation had been installed.—Dr. Reginald Duffield, before the Society of Medical Officers of Health.  
I have in my mind's eye, at the moment, a hall which, in the old days, was lighted by gas, and in which a large audience could, with comfort, sit through an hour's lecture, or with pleasure through a three hours' dinner, but which with the march of civilization, had its illumination changed from gas to electricity, the latter been employed with all the latest refinements to effect the lighting under the best conditions, with the result that any large gathering within its walls leads to a state little short of asphyxiation.—Vivian B. Leves, Professor of Chemistry at the Royal Naval College, Greenwich.—Nov. 8, 11.

### Milk Farms Inspected

The dairies visited last week by Health Inspector O'Brien, with a few exceptions, show a decided improvement as regards cleanliness. The officer visited seventy milk farms, cow sheds and dairies, and ten slaughter houses at Torbay, while those at Mundy Pond, Blackmarsh and Pennywell Roads and Upper Pleasant Street were also examined.


