



Botha's Triumph. West Africa is a greater triumph than appears on the face of it. Intrinsically it has the appearance of the attack of a comparatively small body of British troops on a small force of Ger mans, which was successful, but its importance does not lie in the number engaged or even in the capture of some German territory, troops, guns and ammunition. Its importance lies in the fact that Botha has been able to undertake operations at Swankop-mund, in face of the formidable diffi-culties which have confronted him since the opening of the war ever seven months. When the war opened, the British War Office planned to withdraw the Imperial forces from South Africa, and invited Premier Botha and the South African Ministry to take charge of the Union by local commandos and to prepare to withstand any attacks from German S. W. Africa and to invade it by the same forces. The South African Union undertook to do this. General Hertzog, his chief political opponent immediately started a political campaign against Botha with a view to driving Botha from power, and in this campaign he had the support of a large section of the Boer population.

While many of them were willing to While many of them were willing abide passively loyal to the Britis flag, they were strongly opposed t attacking Germany. Others, the ir reconcilables, were ready to rebel, in vite German intervention with the lic throughout the South Africa Un There was treachery in the Min istry and among men high in military command. Beyers, the Minister of Defence, who has a German wife, who spent last summer in Berlin, remained in charge until Botha's plans were made. Maritz, who had charge of the commando which was to repel German attacks, turned traitor, disarmed and imprisoned the loyal members of his command and then joined the Germans. Hertzog secretly fomented dis content among those who were op posed to the invasion of German ter ritory, and Botha found everything topsy turvey. He found he could not work safely under the local Military Acts in the compulsory raising of forces, but still he remained true, loyal and undaunted. He declared he would take charge of operations himself and boldly called for volunteers. Beyers and Maritz found they had over-reached themselves. Large sections of Boers, who had not been in favor of Botha's plan of invasion, were disgusted with the treachery of Beyers, Maritz and DeWet, and joined

British Ship Attacked at Sea

Bombs Are Dropped by Aviators-One Sailor Died of Fright. South Shields, Mar. 17.—The steam


er Blonde arrived here to-day after an exciting voyage across the North Sea, where she was attacked by German aeroplane.

"Five bombs were dropped," said the mate of the Blonde, "in an effort to destroy our ship, but none of them fell nearer than twenty feet away. We suffered no damage, but one man o the crew died, yirtually of fright. "We were bound from Cowes for

the Tyne when a Taube attacked us ter Suit within sight of the English coast, barely three miles off north foreland. was on the bridge with the pilot when we sighted the Taube coming from the North Sea. Two Germans were in the machine.

"The aeroplane dropped to a mod erate altitude, not over 500 feet, as it approached us. Then it circled about our ship and the aviators drop ped two bombs which fell just behind the stern. The captain called all hands on deck and tied the whistle wide open, signalling for help.

"The Taube then came back to the ttack at a still lower altitude and dropped two more bombs ineffectively We had put on top speed and were steering a zig-zag course. Then the Taube came down so low that we could distinguish plainly the feature of the men in her. The last bomb dropped exploded with tremendo force just off our bow."

OFFICIAL.

LONDON, March 24. The Governor, Newfoundland:

The French Government reports violent counter-attacks in the Argenne, completely repulsed, also some successes at other points. At Vauquois, in Champagne, the enemy sprayed one French trench with inflammable liquid, causing the French to retreat about fifteen metres.

The Russian Government reports the garrison which surrendered at Przemysl to have consisted of nine Cenerals, about 2,600 officers and 117,000 men.

About 1,000 Turks were routed eight miles east of Suez and are now in full retreat.

The Admiralty reports successful air attacks on German submarines under construction at "Hoboken, near Antwerp. The works were set ca fire and it is believed that both works and two submarines were considerably damaged. Five submarines were scen on the slip.

HARCOURT.

ST. PIERRE BULLETIN. PARIS, via St. Pierre, March 24. Yesterday the enemy bombarded

Theims. A German aviator threw bembs on the city and killed three civilians. In Champagne we have slightly progressed east of Hill 196 In the Argonne, near Bagatelle, the enemy twice made violent counter attacks to recapture ground lost on Sunday. Those two attacks were completely repulsed.

In Belgium, in the region of Nieuport, our artillery destroyed several observation posts and a small fort, from which they saw the occupants fleeing. Northwest of Arras at Car ency we have captured and destroyed a German trench, from which we have made some prisoners. At Soissons a new trial of bembardment by the Germans has been immediately stopped by our artillery. In Chanpagne the enemy bombarded positions that we had taken from him a few days ago, but did not attack with infantry. At Vauquois, near a church, the Germans sprinkled one of our trenches with inflammable liquid. Our troops drew back fifteen metres at that point. At Eparges the enemy made two attacks, but were quickly checked. At Harlmannsvillerkoff we have captured a line of trenches and a blockhouse.

THE HOBOKEN AIR RAID.

LONDON, March 24. The British Admiralty this afternoon issued a statement saying that a British air raid had been successfully carried out to-day on German submarines at Hoboken, three miles outside Antwerp. The text of the statement is as follows: Following has been received from Wing Commander Longmore: "I have to report that a successful air attack was carried out this morning by five machines of the Dunkirk squadron on German submarines being constructed at Hoboken, near Antwrep. Two of the pilots had to return owing to thick weather, but Squadron Commander Courtney and Flight Lieut. Rosser reached the objective, and after planing down to one thousand feet, dropped four bombs, each on submarines. It is be lieved considerable damage has been done to both works and submarines The works were observed to be on fire. In all, five submarines were of served on the slip. Flight Lieut. Crossley-Meates was obliged by en gine trouble to descend in Holland He will be interned.

ACTIVITY ON BELGIAN LINES.

LONDON, March 24. The Daily Express correspondent on the Belgian frontier, telegraphs that the Germans resumed bombard ment of the Belgian lines between Dixmude and the sea this afternoon, and it was increasing in strength. At the time of telegraphing apparently all their howitzers were in action, and the attack appears to be greatest near the coast. Three great explosions were distinctly heard here at night. Considerable damage has been done at Ostend by a number of bombs aimed by the Allies' aviators at ammunition and oil depots. Clear weather and little wind greatly facilitated the aerial observations of the Allies' war aeroplanes.

FIGHTING IN AIR AND ON LAND.

PARIS, March 24. 

Our casualties, great though they are, appear all the more severe in that they were incurred in the course of a few days, instead of being spread over a much longer period, although the net result would have been the same. Our troops have shown in attack, as they already had shown in defence, that they can endure the highest test of all. 

Priest Died for Church

Father d'Argent Suffered Horrible Mutilation and Death at Hands of

London, Feb. 26 .- In a pastoral letter, Cardinal Mercier wrote: "A par ish priest of Gelrode suffered, I believe, veritable martyrdom." Particulars of the death of this priest are published in The Tablet of the testimony of an eye-witness, Father Vertreken, professor at the college of St. Stanislaus, Antwerp, who is now in London. His testimony is as fol-

"On August 20th the Germans entered Gelrode. For no other reason save their pleasure, they shot several young men and women. Bseides these two persons were severely injured by bullets. Father d'Argent took the unfortunate people in a cart to Aerschot, in which work of charity he was helped by my brother.

"While in the street of Aerschot his horse and cart were seized. He and the driver were made prisoners and after charges had been brought against them they were shut up in the cellar of the town hall for the night. Afterwards I saw Father d'Argent standing against the wall of a church. His hands and feet were bound with copper wire and he was forced to stand on tiptoe with his hands above his head. Owing to the blows he had already received his face looked blue and the blood dripped down to his bare feet. In that way he was for three hours subjected to the most scandalous treatment, of which I dare not here give particulars. He was mocked and laughed at by the soldiers. When they were tired of this, Father d'Argent was given two conditions to fulfill to obtain his release, from torture. One was to abjure his faith as a Catholic; the other to cry 'Germany for ever!' Although repeatedly urged by the soldiers to consent, the priest always gave one answer-'No never!' He was then taken by the soldiers to a house about 200 yards distant from the church. He was led behind it and then killed with two rifle shots. The body was thrown into the river and found two days afterwards quiet nak-

The German's **English Dictionary.**

Hospital in France has been the neans of bringing to light a new document bearing on the war and Germany's preparedness for aggression. A German corporal wounded in the recent fight near La Bassee presented to the Rev. G. Anderson vells, Church of England Army Chaplain at the hospital, a little red book entitled "Tornister Worterbuch Englisch" (meaning an English dictionary for the knapsack), and added that there had been issued to several other army corps similar dictionaries not only in French, but in Russian.

The book appears to have been prepared for the use not of the German army as a whole, but of an expeditionary force especially designed to land on our shores. It contains over 4,000 words, more than half of which apply to naval and military operations, and includes a list, with ronunciation, of most points of military importance in the United Kingdom. The little work, which seems, from internal evidence to have been published in 1912, is described by the special correspondent of the Glasgow Herald into whose possession it has come, as another example of German thoroughness and forethought, coupled with that cocksureness which has been followed by so many disappointments, and the contents of two chapters of phrases for invading troops, if they had come to the notice of any British publicist befcre August last, would have most Mallibly precipitated the world.

WHY GREECE DID NOT ENTER WAR.

London, March 17 .- A Reuter despatch from Rome gives an interview which the correspondent of the Corriere Della Sera has had with M. Venizelos, the former Premier of Greece, in which M. Venizelos is quoted as saying that twice since the outbreak of the war the Allies have asked Greece to send men to help Serbia; but the attitude of Bulgaria prevented Greece from doing so.

When the operations against the Dardanelles began, the Allies semiofficially inquired whether the King was disposed to intervene at the Crown Council. M. Venizelos, who was then Premier, proposed that fifty thousand men should be sent to aid the Allies, and urged that in return Greece should obtain the vilayet

Owing to objections which were immediately raised, M. Venizelos reduced his figures to fifteen thousand men and proposed co-operation of the Greek navy and the use of naval base. The entire proposal was rejected by the Crown Council, and M. Venizelos, resigned.


